## 1500 Persons Attend Oak Creek Project Ceremonies

A gathering of 1,500 persons were present Sunday when Sweetwater's mayor, Lester Reeves, and Judge R. C. Crane broke the first earth at a point where the Oak Creek dam will be constructed. The ground was broken on the crest of the hill with a 47-year-old shovel. Many citizens

of Bronte and Coke County attended the ceremonies.

While the crowd was gathering at the site of the dam, some 10 miles north of Bronte, the 60-piece Mustang Band of Sweetwater, directed by James Hobbs, entertained with musical selections.

Loy Roberson, Sweetwater businessman, was master of ceremonies. Rev. Bob Bowden, pastor of the First Church of God of Sweetwater, gave the invocation. Mayor Reeves welcomed the crowd to the ceremonies and Judge R. C. Crane of Sweetwater, announced that plaques were to be awarded to the man or woman who had lived the longest, continuously, in either Nolan, Coke, or Fisher counties. The presentations were to have been made Sunday, but will be made later since so few entries were received.

Judge Guy C. Jackson, Jr., of Anahuac, president of the Texas Water Conservation association, gave the principal address of the afternoon. Jackson told the crowd that "this project is an example that all the State of Texas needs to learn." He praised the city of Sweetwater for their initiative in the project, and emphasized the need for water conservation in all Texas.

## Lack of Election In County Causes Much Discussion

Editor's note: Since some discussion has taken place this week concerning the fact that Coke County had no part in last Saturday's election, we received permission from Mayor H. O. Whitt to reprint a letter which he sent to the County Democratic Committee recently. We are printing it below since we believe it to be of public interest.

Dear Dr. Griffith and Members:  
I was terribly disappointed, and I believe a lot of other folks were too, when I learned that Coke County was not holding a second primary election last Saturday.

A right to vote as a free people, according to the dictates of our own conscience, is a citizen's cherished possession.

Only by the exercise of a free vote can the rights and privileges of freedom be kept strong.

We have two ways in which we maintain the freedom for which our forefathers suffered and died. First, it is fought with the blood of our loved ones, who undergo the hardships of battle, the like of which we have in Korea today.

Second, the right to stand in the polling place and cast an undictated ballot for the candidates of our choice is a vital element of freedom for which we have fought in the past and for which the nation is giving itself to defend today. I was denied my part in that privilege last Saturday.

It was done, I am sure, to save expenses. Surely we do not confine our interest in our government to our own county or even district lines. The freedom that we have today was not paid for in dollars and cents. It was bought with blood and sweat and it is our duty to ever protect that freedom.

I love our type of government which is "Of the people, by the people and for the people." I didn't get in on my part of it last Saturday.

## Tests In Area Drilling Ahead

Two wildcats in the Bronte vicinity were drilling ahead this week. No shows had been reported in either of them through Wednesday.

Lion Oil Co. No. 1 Runie Waldrop was drilling at 2,895 feet. It is located one-half mile south and slightly east of Hayrick Mountain.

Humble No. 1 Noah Pruitt was drilling ahead Wednesday at 3,550 feet in line and shale. It is located two and one-half miles northeast of Bronte.

Seven miles west of Bronte American Republics No. 1 Daisy McCutchen, south offset to Union No. 1-B Daisy McCutchen, has been plugged and abandoned after recovering salt water on a drillstem test of the Cisco sand.

Union No. 2-B Daisy McCutchen, which is a north offset to No. 1-B, was drilling ahead Wednesday, and was nearing the Cisco section.

Union Oil Co. was given a discovery allowable for its No. 1-B McCutchen and the field has been designated as the McCutchen Cisco Field.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field, located northeast of Bronte, Humble has been trying to complete its No. 1 Odum-State in the Ellenburger. A section 5,688 to 5,700 feet was to be perforated this week. 890 feet

of free oil was recovered on a drillstem test of the section.

In the east part of the Fort Chadbourne Field, Fred M. Manning, Inc., No. 10 S. L. McNay has been staked, 1,980 feet north of the southeast and 3,300 feet east of the southwest lines of M. C. Zamiga survey 298. It is six miles west of Wingate.

G. W. Strake No. 1 Elv Michaels is 330 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of H. Freiley survey 448, four miles northwest of Wilmet.

Strake has also staked his No. 1 Mary L. Stubblefield. It is 330 feet from the north and 1,880 feet from the east lines of G. Villareal survey 280, and five miles northwest of Wilmet.

Preparations were underway for the first of the week rigging up for Humble No. 1 E. H. Schuch, southwest of Bronte, near the Tom Green County line.

## Clyde Davis Gins First Cotton Bale

J. D. Luttrell, manager of the Farmers Marketing Association gin here, said this week that Bronte's first bale of cotton for 1950 was ginned here this week. The bale was brought in by Clyde Davis and was ginned on Tuesday, August 29. Davis' farm is located near Oak Creek about ten miles east of here.

Luttrell said that it was good quality cotton, but that it has not been sold as yet. The bale weighed 570 pounds.

The bale brought \$18.50 premium money that was given by local people. Some of the merchants here donated merchandise instead of money. Luttrell said the ginning was free. Davis donated \$5.00 of his premium money to the Floyd Bagwell family, whose home was destroyed by fire Sunday.

## Coke's Tax Valuation More Than \$12 Million

Coke County's tax valuation has been set at \$12,358,940 for this year, according to an announcement made this week by Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector Paul Good.

This figure is the highest which has ever been placed on the taxable property in the county. It is an increase of \$3,299,740 over last year's \$9,059,200 valuation.

The state and county tax rates remain the same as last year, 72 cents and 95 cents respectively, on each \$100 valuation.

Good said that the taxes which will be collected by his office will total \$329,722.38. This amount will be divided as follows: \$117,414.06, county taxes; \$83,741.67, state taxes; \$9,437.68, road bond fund; and \$119,128.97, school taxes in the county's common school districts.

A hearing on the budget for 1951 was held at the courthouse in Robert Lee last Friday. The budget for next year has been expanded considerably over this year, due to the increase in incoming tax revenue.

Good said that \$7,412,500 of the tax valuation in the county is the tax value of the oil industry of Coke. This leaves the real and personal valuations at the usual figure of slightly less than \$5,000,000. No valuations were raised on real or personal property. The \$5,000,000 increase was brought about by increased oil activity.

## BRONTE SCHOOLS OPENING IS SCHEDULED FOR SEPTEMBER 11

The newly remodeled Bronte school will open Monday, September 11, according to an announcement made Wednesday by Supt. J. L. Carroll. Three additional teachers have been hired, completing the faculty and bringing the total to 16 teachers for this year.

Mrs. and Mrs. Gordon Creel, of wood and H. M. Daniel of Frost, Texas, will complete the faculty.

## Another Bronte Soldier Is In Korean Battle

Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Mitchell of Bronte heard recently from their son Staff Sergeant James E. Mitchell, who is now with the United Nations forces in Korea.

Sgt. Mitchell, in the Motor Division, wrote that he was O.K. and that it was "hot over here, not speaking entirely of the weather, either."

Mitchell also wrote that at one time since the outbreak of the fighting, his outfit got in a pinch and was evacuated to Japan but that they had since returned to Korea.

Mitchell has been in the Army 12 years. He is a veteran of the Pacific campaign during World War II, having gone from Australia to the Philippines with U.S. forces.

## J. E. Mitchells Attend Funeral of Nephew

Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Mitchell left Wednesday to attend the funeral of Mrs. Mitchell's nephew, Tommy Box, 49, of El Paso. The funeral was to be held at Nevada in Collin County.

Box, airplane pilot for the U. S. Immigration Border Patrol, died in the wreckage of his plane near Anthony, N. M., Tuesday, August 29. The crash occurred about 40 miles northwest of El Paso.

He was on patrol when his plane developed engine trouble and plunged into an irrigation canal. Both wings of the plane were left on the canal banks and most of the fuselage submerged in the ditch.

## F. H. BAGWELL RESIDENCE IS DESTROYED BY FIRE SUNDAY

Fire completely destroyed the F. H. Bagwell home here Sunday when a cook stove that Mrs. Bagwell was lighting exploded. The explosion set the building in flames that were never completely extinguished until the fire had destroyed the home and nearly all of its contents.

The house was owned by Mrs. Zelma Proctor of Bronte and was only partly insured. The house, located in the northeast part of town, had four rooms and a bath. Mrs. Proctor owned an estimated \$500 worth of household goods stored in the building at the time of the fire.

The Bagwells have already totaled \$750 estimated loss in household appliances and furniture and they believe it will be about \$100 total loss of their part of the house's contents after their clothing and miscellaneous items are added. The Bagwells had \$1,000 of insurance but they were uncertain as to whether they would collect any of that amount since they have only recently changed

their residence to Bronte from Kerrville.

The Bronte Volunteer Fire Department arrived at the scene of the fire shortly after the house began burning at approximately 3:30 p.m. Sunday. However, they were unable to get the fire under control before the house was consumed by the flames.

Bagwell said that very little of the contents of the house had been saved but he stated that the people of Bronte and the local churches had been very generous and thoughtful in helping him overcome his loss.

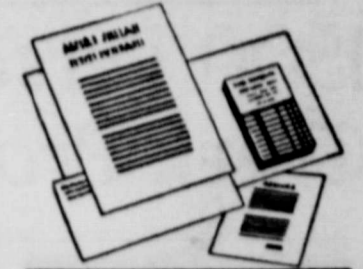

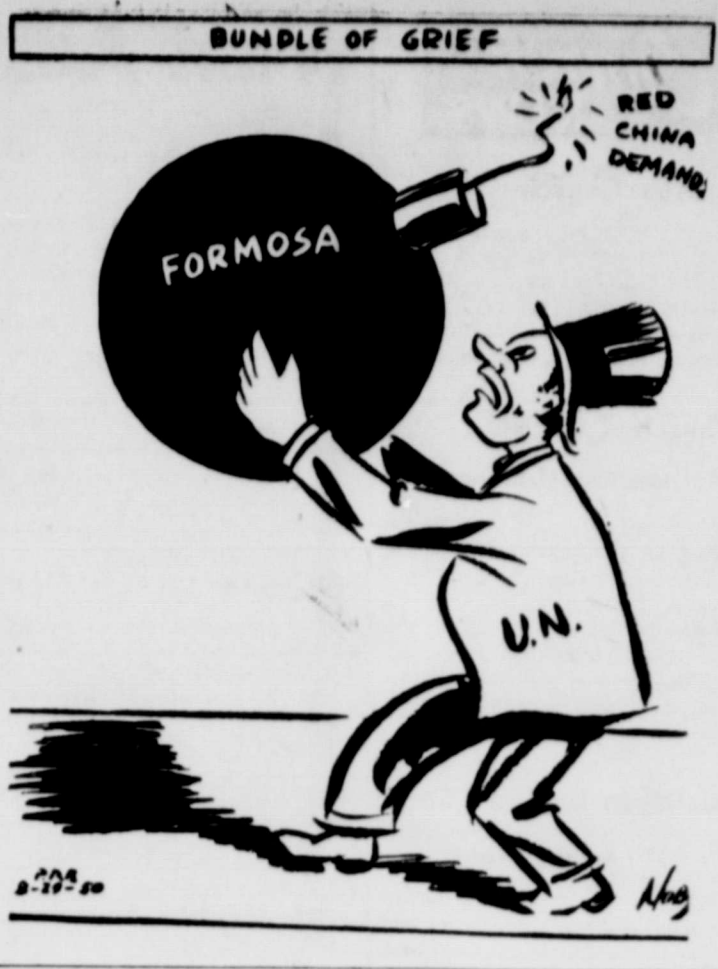
