Construction on New Baptist Church Started

A new Baptist church will be built in Bronte, according to an announcement made this week by Rev. V. D. Price, pastor of the church.

The new structure is estimated to cost about \$30,000, but the exact figure is not known, since the members decided to hire the work done

and buy the materials themselves rather than contract the job.

The new building will seat an estimated 400 persons. The auditorium will be 36 by 59 feet and will have a balcony. The two-story education building will be 36 by 70 feet. The structure will be an L-shaped building

with the auditorium forming one wing and the education building forming the other.

Workmen have been busy this week tearing down the old church building. Material from the 46-year-old building will be used in the new structure. Work on the new building is expected to begin Monday. A finish of brick veneer will be used and a steeple will be built on the front of the new church.

Dee Armon of San Angelo has been selected as forman for the project. The architect is Dewey Horton of Amarillo, who is employed by the Texas Baptist association to plan church buildings for association members.

The inside of the building will contain two rows of pews, with a wide aisle running through the center of the church and a smaller aisle will be on either side. Opalescent glass windows will be installed in the auditorium. The choir and baptistry will be located behind the pulpit, in the education building.

While the new church building is under construction, the congregation will meet in the tabernacle behind the present building, for services, Rev. Price said.

Coach Price has only six returning lettermen from last year's team to field for tonight's game. However, spirit is high among the players and a good season is predicted for the Longhorns.

The brightest spot in Bronte's team will be the backfield, which will be bolstered by four lettermen. A large part of the punting and ball carrying will be the responsibility of Gerald Sandusky, a big, rugged, three year letterman who will be playing

his last year for Bronte. Another valuable player will be Marlon McCutchen, who was not used on last year's team because of ineligibility. He is fast and should turn out to be an outstanding ball carrier or passer. He has three full years ahead of him to play on Bronte's teams.

McCutchen Well Flows 1320 Barrels in 24 Hours

Union Oil Co. of California this week ran a potential on its No. 2-B Mrs. Daisy McCutchen. The north offset to the pool opener, No. 1-B McCutchen, flowed at the rate of 1,320 barrels in 24 hours. Production was from 3,958 to 3,980 feet in the Cisco sand section of the Pennsylvania.

The No. 2-B McCutchen is 527 feet from the north and 580 feet from the west lines of section 455, block 1-A, H&TC survey. It is approximately seven miles west of

Bronte. The rig which drilled the No. 2-B McCutchen has been moved one location east of the recently completed producer.

Union No. 2 Jim McCutchen, west offset to the discovery, and American Republics No. 1 Daisy McCutchen, south offset to the discovery, were both plugged and abandoned.

Humble No. 1 Noah Pruitt was drilling Wednesday at 5,050 feet. Several drillstem tests have been run the past week, but no production was indicated except in the Palo Pinto section, which was tested last week.

The Palo Pinto test recovered 480 feet of oil and oil cut mud and 222 feet of salt water. The test was from 4,374 to 4,414 feet. This wildcat is located about two miles northeast of Bronte.

Another Coke County wildcat was announced this week. It will be the No. 1 J. B. Glenn, 330 feet from the south and 479 feet from the west line of Mrs. C. C. Hudson subdivision 14 of HE&WT Ry. survey 1.

Owners of the lease include Stekol Petroleum Co. of Dallas, Claude R. McSpadden of San Angelo, and the Marx Brothers, Groncho, Harpo, Chico and Gummo, of Hollywood.

The test will be drilled by Dykes and St. John of Ballinger. It is scheduled to go to 6,300 feet or production. The drillsite of six miles south-east of Bronte.

Lion Oil Co. No. 1 Runie Waldrop, wildcat in the Hayrick community, was drilling below 4,400 feet early this week.

Humble No. 1 E. H. Schuch, wildcat southwest of Bronte, was drilling this week below 2,000 feet in lime and shale.

Humble No. 1 Wiley-Bolin was plugged back to 5,470 feet in the Gray sand after failing to show production in the Odom lime section of the Strawn.

On a drillstem test of the Gray several days ago the well flowed an estimated 30 barrels of 46.8 gravity oil per hour. Some salt water was also found.

Humble No. 1 Odom-State was swabbing early this week and recovering four barrels of fluid hourly, about half oil and half salt water. Perforations were made at 5,690 to 5,700 feet in the Ellenburger.

N. P. Powell has staked his No. 5-C Sallie Odom in the Fort Chadbourne field. It will be drilled to 5,400 feet or production, and is located 955 feet east of the same operator's No. 4-C Odom.

Humble No. 11 Mrs. Sallie Odom, a one-location west extension to the Fort Chadbourne field, has been completed for a daily flow of 172.9 barrels of oil. It is one location west of Humble No. 1 Odom, the field opener.

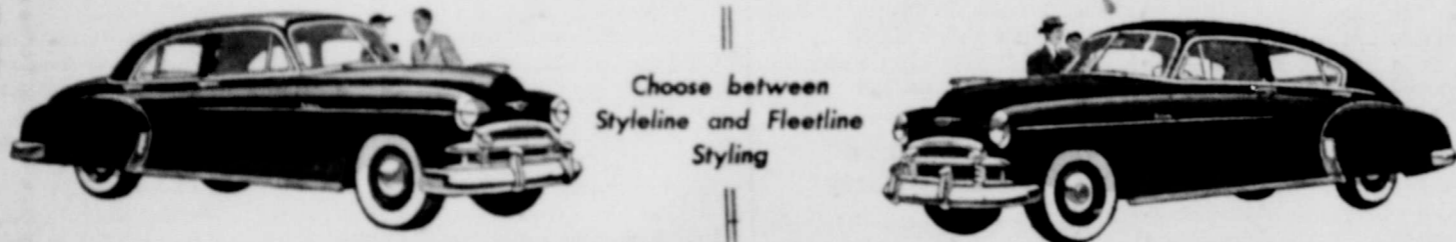

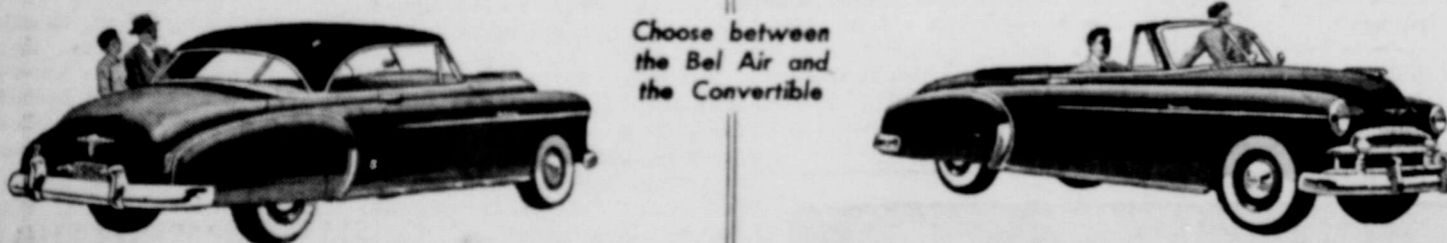
