





Austin, Texas-The production nd distribution of milk is a busihandling of the product, as it is highly subject to contamination. Inasmuch as milk can be readily contaminated, control of production and distribution is necessary in the form of sanitary regulations. from farm to consumer, where sanitary precautions have been taken to make it a clean, whoesome product, is designated a Grade A milk, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State

In the production of Grade A healthy cows. It is produced under conditions that will insure freedom from dust, dirt, and fly contamination in both the dairy barn and milk house. The dairy barn construction is such that it can be easily cleaned. Facilities are provided in the milk house to wash and sanitize utensils and equipment easily and quickly, and to store them in a place protected from contaminaare provided in the milk house so that the temperature of the milk can be lowered immediately after milking. 


