COKE COUNTIANS CALLED ON TO SUPPORT MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE

The problem of facing a home front war centering around the scourge of polio was put squarely up to the people of Coke County and Texas this week.

All of the state's vaunted resources were being mustered as a mighty "Governor's Fight Polio Committee," named by Governor Allan Shivers, began pushing the urgent drive. Action on the community level will be emphasized through the new 150-man committee which will supplement the local machinery already set up in most areas.

Primary objective of the movement is to overcome a \$300,000 deficit in treating the record number of polio cases which has become so large that Texas in 1950 reported almost one tenth of all the new polio cases in the nation.

The actual drive for funds, so far as the general public is concerned, will center around the 1951 March of Dimes, January 15-31. But emphasis also will be placed on large individual donations.

Members of the "Governor's Fight Polio Committee" attended meetings in Austin over the weekend, carrying through a final pre-campaign state-wide meeting Monday. They took back home the message that polio cripples the economic structure of the community and state just as it cripples the persons who contract the disease.

Leading authorities pointed out that money is needed to care for patients and, above all, to carry out research into the cause of the disease.

In the words of Governor Shivers, "Texas must meet the challenge of this dreaded scourge until science can conquer it."

Dr. John B. Harris, chairman of the Coke County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, has asked the cooperation of everyone in the county in the forthcoming drive. Mrs. Charlie Boecking is chairman of the March of Dimes drive.

The entries, among the first from Coke County, consist of an Aberdeen - Angus 1950 Houston Fat Stock Show scramble steer to be exhibited by the Coke County boys at the 1950 show.

Premium and cash awards to be offered at the 19th annual show will total more than \$102,000, a record for the Houston show. In competing in the fat market show, the exhibitor will also be going after the top monetary paid at Houston auctions.

Six Gas Wells Reported Scheduled for Vicinity

It was announced this week that Humble Oil & Refining Co. is planning on drilling about six gas wells in the Bronte Field, beginning in the near future. The Lowry Estate will have an interest in one and possibly two of the gassers, and R. E. Hickman will have some of the wells drilled on his land. Mrs. Nannie Ash is also scheduled to have a gas well drilled on her property.

No confirmed report was to be had, but talk around Bronte was that the rig now drilling on the J. S. Brunson lease will move from there to the property of D. K. Glenn when the present test is completed.

Union Oil Co. has filed application for permit to deepen their No. 1 City of Robert Lee to 5,500 feet. No shows were found in the Cisco from which the wells in the nearby McCutchen Field produce.

Humble No. 9 Sallie Odom, west offset to No. 1 Wylie-Bolin was spudded in this week. Early in the week it was drilling at 100 feet.

Humble No. 10 Odom has been plugged and abandoned at 6,709 feet in granite. It was an east offset to the No. 1 Wylie-Bolin.

Humble No. 12 Odom had not been completed early this week, but the rig had been moved and a swabbing unit placed over the hole.

Humble No. 29-B Odom was drilling at 800 feet.

Humble No. 13-B Odom has been completed for a daily flow of 405.74 barrels of oil. Gas oil ratio was 723-1.

G. W. Strake No. 3 Elo Michalis rated 254.88 barrels of 45.8 gravi-

ty oil in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 1,100-1.

E. A. Poe and T. W. Murray No. 5 Sallie Odom flowed 453 barrels of 46 gravity oil in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 889-1.

Humble has staked No. 2-D Sallie Odom 337 feet from the south and 355 feet from the west lines of John Bird survey 469. No. 16 Odom will be 660 feet from the south and east lines of S. L. Burns survey 524.

Humble No. 1 E. H. Schuch, wild-

cat near the Tom Green county line, has been plugged and abandoned at a total depth of 6,085 feet in the Ellenburger. After failing in the Ellenburger the test was plugged back and the Pennsylvania was tested. Some oil was found in tests, but not enough was recovered for commercial production.

The Double D Producing corporation of Dallas plans on starting a test five miles west of Robert Lee within 60 days.

The bride is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. Gaines of Robert Lee and was attending the Robert Lee high school at the time of her marriage.

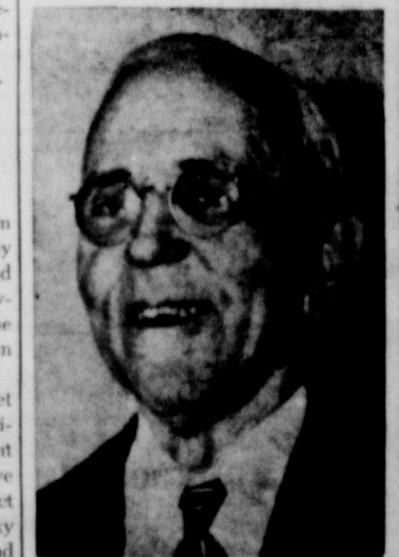

Mrs. Helen Harris Weaver completed a complete soil and water conservation plan on her ranch this week. C. N. Webb, chairman of Board of Supervisors of the Coke County Soil Conservation District, has announced.

The plan on 14,200 acres of range-land and cropland was developed to treat each acre according to its needs to make an economical return, Webb said.

The plan included a three pasture deferred rotation grazing system for faster improvement of range vegetation.

A 3,000 cubic yard ranch pond and 2,800 feet of diversion terrace was completed on B. St. George Tucker's ranch, located one mile south of Robert Lee. The pond was designed to give Tucker permanent livestock water and provide better distribution of livestock water. The pond and diversions are a part of the complete soil and water conservation plan that Tucker is applying on his ranch. - 3/4 cup water
- 1 cup whole cranberry sauce
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Sift together flour, soda and salt. Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add molasses and eggs and beat thoroughly. Combine water and cranberry sauce. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with water and cranberries. Stir in nuts. Pour into greased one and one-half quart mold. Cover, or tie a double layer of waxed paper securely over top of mold. Steam one hour and 15 minutes. Unmold. Serve with whipped cream or hard sauce. Makes one pudding.
