MAYOR WARNS RESIDENTS OF FIRE DANGER

Mayor H. O. Whitt this week issued a warning to all residents of Bronte concerning the danger of burning paper and other trash in an open fire.

Whitt said that a complaint had been made by the Bronte Lions club several members of the organization reported Wednesday that burning paper had blown against their places of business and the club went on record as requesting that city ordinances relative to the matter be enforced.

Whitt said that ordinances of the town make it a punishable offense to burn trash in an open fire and that he intends that the law be enforced.

The ordinance says that such matter must be burned in an incinerator.

ONE DEAD, FIVE HURT IN CRASH AT OAK CREEK

Ollie Carnathan, 21, of Rotan died Wednesday night in a San Angelo hospital as a result of injuries received in an automobile accident Saturday night on the Oak Creek bridge 12 miles north of Bronte. Carnathan suffered a broken back and was paralyzed from the waist down. His body was sent to Rotan for burial.

Five others were also treated for less serious injuries. They were: Miss Fannie Carnathan, 19, Forrest Smith, Lora Gravelly, 25, William Joshua Langham, Jr., 27, all of Rotan, and Winona Critz, 17, of Sweetwater. Uninjured in the accident was Joe McDonald, 19, also of Rotan.

The group was brought to Bronte in a Clift ambulance, given emergency treatment at the Karen-Gay hospital and hospitalized in the Robert Lee hospital.

Sunday, Carnathan was transferred to a San Angelo hospital, others were dismissed and one transferred to a Rotan hospital.

Belva Ends Long Vigil; Funeral Conducted Here Wednesday



Funeral services for Belva Karen Rippetoe, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Rippetoe, were conducted here Wednesday afternoon at 3 p.m., thus ending a long vigil conducted by herself, her parents, this community and scores of others throughout the nation. For Belva, in her eighteen-month struggle against neuroblastoma, an inoperable form of cancer, has attracted the attention of persons everywhere.

In a simple ceremony from the First Methodist church, planned by herself, the services were read by the Rev. J. E. Eldridge, pastor of the Eldorado Baptist church, assisted by Rev. V. D. Price, pastor of the First Baptist church at Bronte, and Rev. C. R. Blake, pastor of the Sylvester Baptist church.

Special music included her favorite song, "That Little Girl of Mine," sung by her cousin, Jeanne Bernard of Dallas, accompanied by another of her cousins, Mrs. Dick Smith, of Robert Lee. Miss Bernard also sang "Gathering Buds." Other music included "Precious Memories" and "We'll Understand Some By and By."

Pallbearers were her uncles, including Jarvis Littlefield of Robert Lee, Walker Bernard of Rosenberg, Fred Renschler of Emporia, Kans., and Don Rippetoe of Lipan.

Interment was in the Fairview cemetery here under the direction of Clift Funeral home.

Belva died at 5:30 Tuesday morning, January 2, at her home in Bronte. Most of her story is well known—it has been told many times.

She was 8 years, 2 months and 24 days old at the time of her death, having been born in Mineral Wells on October 9, 1942. She and her sister, Nona, came to Bronte to live in March, 1944. Her illness began on May 29, 1949 and it was believed that she had polio.

At that time her stay in hospitals began—in Bronte, San Antonio and San Angelo—and in September, 1949, she was taken to Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., where medical au-

thorities diagnosed her disease and pronounced her sentence—less than a year to live. In November of that year, the Rippetoes took Belva to New York where she underwent treatments from Dr. Henry Wachtel, cancer research specialist, but the slight improvement she made was only temporary.

She outlived her year by some three months and during the intervening time many other treatments were tried—some still in experimental stages. But her condition gradually became worse and she had been in a critical condition for several months at the time of her death.

Her illness was made more bearable by the constant attention of her friends, by thousands of cards, letters and gifts from all over the United States, and by special attention, including a telephone call and gifts, from her idol, Movie Star Roy Rogers. Her many gifts included dolls, dogs and a life-sized portrait of herself from a San Antonio artist.

She was a member of the First Baptist church of Bronte, having joined in April of this year. She was carried to the church in the little red-wagon bed which had become a familiar sight in Bronte as long as she was able to be out. Her only schooling was three weeks in the first grade in 1949, after she became ill.

Her survivors are her foster parents, her father, Mr. and Mrs. Gaylord Bernard of Fort Worth; her mother, Mrs. Clara Bell Rinchler of Fort Worth; one sister, Nona Gayl Rippetoe of Bronte; one brother, Larry Zane Bernard of Fort Worth; two grandmothers, Mrs. J. D. Bernard of Bronte and Mrs. Cora Rinchler of Hamlin and two grandfathers, P. L. Rinchler of Emporia, Kans., and Elte Rippetoe of Lipan.

Bank Deposits Up \$331,735 in 1950

Bank deposits in the First National Bank of Bronte showed an increase of \$331,735.21 and exceeded the two million mark for the first time in the bank's history during 1950. The report issued this week showed \$2,230,832.42 was on deposit in the local bank at the close of business Dec. 30, 1950 as compared with \$1,905,097.21 at the close of business Dec. 31, 1949.

Deposits exceeded the two million mark with \$2,094,028.84 on deposit when the Comptroller of the Currency called for a statement on April 24 of this year.

On the December 30, 1950, statement, loans and discounts totaled \$561,618.84 as compared with \$410,203.44 a year ago.

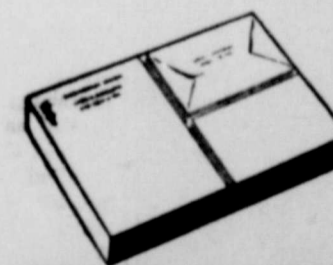

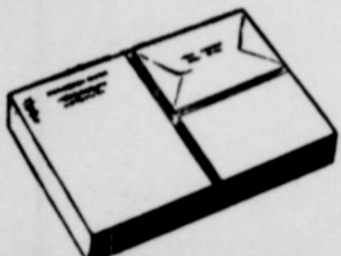
