The action came at a time when Bronte is undergoing the worst water situation the town has ever known. The supply has almost been depleted due to the increase in population and the long drouth which has completely dried out the city lakes.

L. T. Youngblood was reelected hairman of the organization and he said that the cost of the pipeline, estimated a year ago at \$85,000, would probably cost double that figure now, due to the increased cost of pipe. Bronte's right to a water supply from he reservoir was assured when the CRA agreed with the City of Sweetwater on the project.

Frank Cannon of San Angelo was renamed vice-chairman of the group and Gerald C. Allen of Robert Lee

was renamed secretary-treasurer. The UCRA also approved final bills incurred in construction of Robcrt Lee's new Mountain Creek reservoir, at a total cost of \$81,040.50.



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
