The Blackwell baseball boys lost to Divide. They will play Norton Tuesday afternoon at Blackwell.

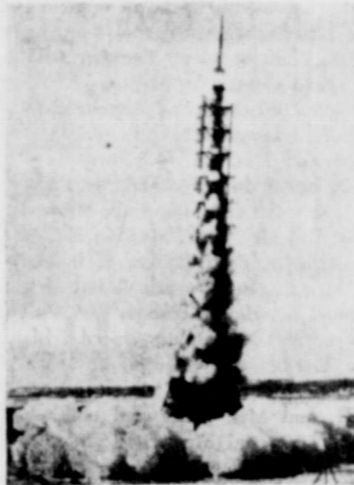
