COKE COMMISSIONERS COURT IS HOST TO FOUR COUNTY MEETING

County officials from Coke, Concho, Runnels and Coleman counties and Rep. W. H. Ramey met for their third joint meeting Saturday in the Bronte city park. A chicken barbecue was served the delegation with the Coke county commissioners as the hosts.

The Saturday session was given to the discussion of the state rural road money. Ramey expressed his belief that county commissioners should have a road program they should control without legislative assistance and said he was convinced that Texas should have a permanent rural road program instead of constant legislative controversies. Ramey also expressed the belief that eastern natural gas interests are influencing the current rural roads-tax bill dispute in the legislature.

The series of meetings with officials of the 92nd legislative district was arranged by Ramey in order that he might keep them informed on legislative action and at the same time have their counsel on legislation concerning county interests.

Jeff Dean, Coke County judge, presided at the meeting. Other county judges present were E. C. Grindstaff of Runnels county; Ira Gallaway of Coleman county, and Carl Peek of Concho county.

J. T. Henry, Bronte vocational agriculture teacher, prepared the barbecue. Other guests present were county commissioners Clyde Chapman, Bill Harman, G. D. Bedford, all of Runnels county; Otis Smith, J. W. Service, T. R. Harmon, Claude Ditmore, all of Coke; Mack Turner, B. Bishop, Wyatt C. Lockett, L. M. Maddox, of Concho; and Earl Hardy of Coleman; Don Atkins, Runnels county sheriff; Paul Good and Weldon Fikens, sheriff and county clerk of Coke county; C. E. Arrott, Coke county farm bureau chairman, and L. T. Youngblood, chairman of the UCRA.

Represented at the meeting were Barnhart, Mertzon, Miles, Rowena, Bronte, Robert Lee, San Angelo and Sterling City.

Whitt was elected chairman of the group and he appointed J. B. Mackey as secretary.

Whitt said that it was agreed that each town prepare a statement concerning the telephone service in their town to present at the next meeting. All of the cities will be represented at the next meeting and a representative of the telephone company will also be invited.

Whitt said that none of the towns will make any proposal concerning the rates until approved by all concerned.

The Monday night meeting was in the city hall in San Angelo.

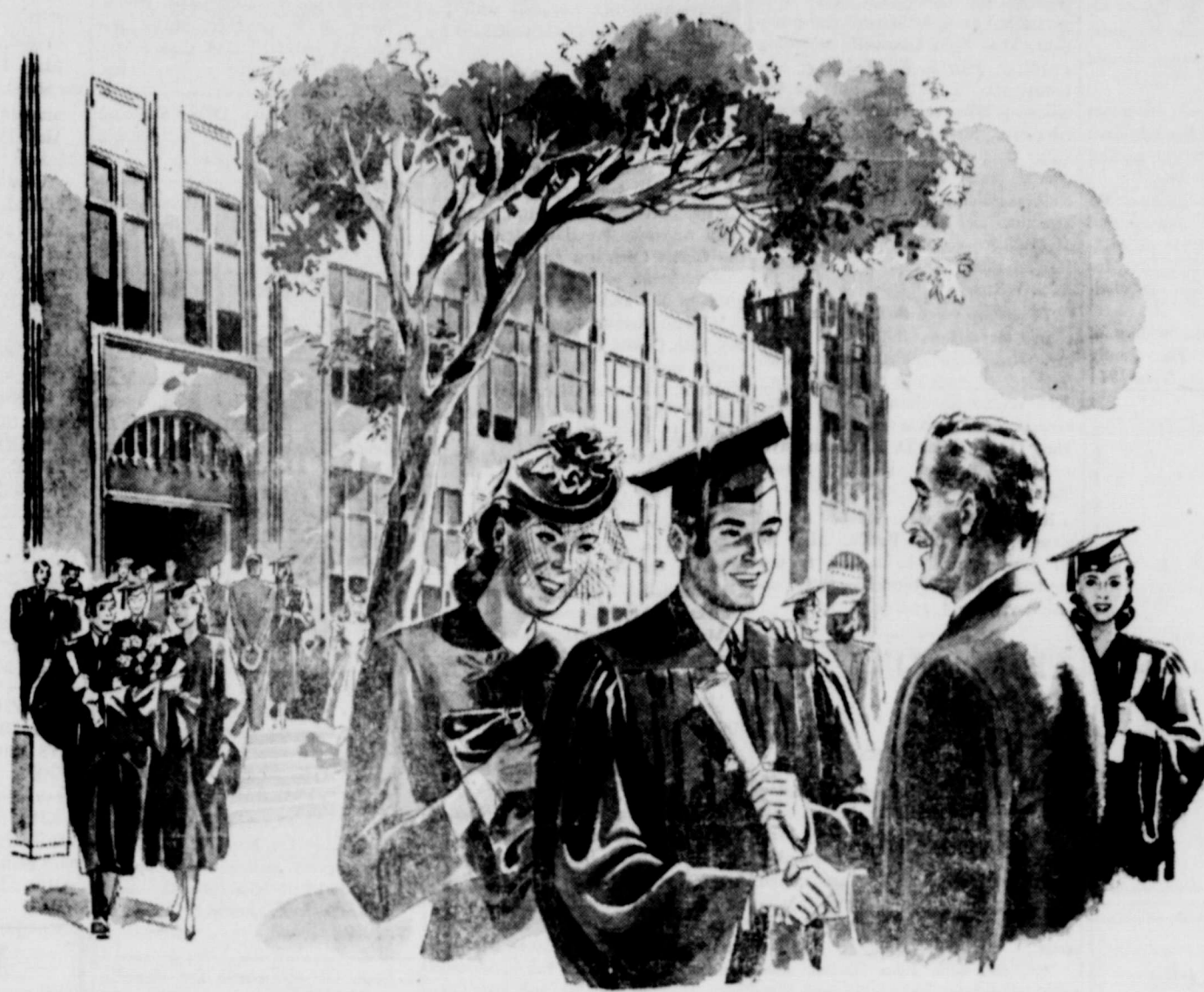

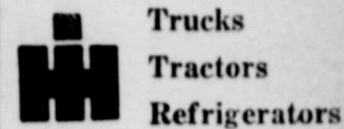
