Frequent statements have been made that would lead the public to believe that prices received by farmprimary cause of inflation. These statements have directed public opinion away from the real cause of in-

It is well to examine the facts to determine to what extent this may of Agricultural Economics (USDA) and based on December 1950 prices:

If a farmer gave away the wool in a \$50.00 suit of clothing, the suit would still cost \$40.50. If the farme gave his wheat away, a 16 cent .oat If the dairyman gave his milk away, it would cost the housewife 11.8 cents per quart. If the beans in a can of pork and beans were donated, the pack would still cost 14 cents.

Average net farm income in Coke has risen approximately twenty-five percent while the things farmers have to buy have risen 100 percent. The average farmer makes five perent on his investment while taking un told risks which include weather, insects, and price fluctuations. The average corporation makes 15.5 percent after corporation taxes. (Federal Trade Commission 1950.)




