## Bronte Store to Close on July 4

Merchants of Bronte indicated Wednesday that they are in favor of closing for a holiday on July 4, next Wednesday.

A few of those contacted said they would like to have the day off to go somewhere, but for the most part, Bronte businessmen were more in favor of staying at home in front of their air conditioners.

Mrs. Carrie G. Williams, postmaster, said that the local postoffice will be closed and that there will be no rural deliveries on the Fourth.

The First National Bank will be closed and President L. T. Youngblood urged patrons to take care of their banking business next Tuesday.

Part of the service stations and cafes in town indicated they would remain open to care for holiday business. W. W. Millikin of Bronte Ice Co., said he will keep his ice house open but will close his grocery store.

## Cornerstone Laid For New Church

The cornerstone for the new Methodist church was laid in a ceremony held at 7:45 o'clock Tuesday night. Aside from Rev. J. E. Fuller, Methodist pastor here, two other Methodist Ministers were present for the service. They were Rev. Ray Lee of Robert Lee and Rev. Fred Brucks, district superintendent.

Among articles sealed in the cornerstone were a copy of "The Christian Advocate," the Methodist hymnal, the New Testament, the Methodist Discipline, a complete membership roll, a list of group and special contributions to the building fund, a list of officials of the church including the present Sunday School superintendent, the pastor and president of the WSCS, clippings from the San Angelo Standard-Times giving the history of the Methodist church in Bronte, the program for the golden jubilee held several years ago, the names of the building committee, and a recent copy of The Bronte Enterprise.

Rev. Fuller said that work on the new church is now progressing rapidly. Two new brick masons have been secured and the walls of the sanctuary are practically complete. The workers are now preparing to start laying the concrete and tile floors in the educational part of the building. It is believed that the building will be completed by the middle of September.

## NO VERDICT GIVEN IN COPELAND CASE

A jury at Robert Lee last week failed to agree on a verdict in the damage case of Charles Copeland vs. the City of Sweetwater.

A Board of Appraisers in March awarded Copeland \$140.00 or acre, but he appealed from the findings. The disputed property will be inundated by the reservoir on Oak Creek now being built by Sweetwater.

The case reopened Thursday morning and continued for three days. The jury was reported hopelessly deadlocked after a three hour session Saturday evening. Members of the jury were F. C. Clark, J. F. McCabe, Jr., Marvin Stewart, J. L. Brunson, George Thomas and Chester Derrick.

Frank C. Dickey and George Ritchey of Mineral Wells were attorneys for Copeland and the City of Sweetwater was represented by Ney Sheridan, Jr., City Attorney, Ed Yates and Davis Scarborough.

Mr. Dickey has asked for a new trial for Copeland as soon as possible. The next term of County Court will be in September.

## 4 Sentenced in District Court

Cody William Mayes, R. J. Shupperd, Raymond Harris and Johnny Cook were all given penitentiary sentences in the 51st District Court in Robert Lee last week. Harris and Cook, negroes, were charged separately with burglary and charged jointly with theft. Both waived jury trials and entered pleas of guilty in open court.

The two were assessed three-year penitentiary sentences in each case, with the sentences to run concurrently. The pair allegedly burglarized homes of James Counts and Fred McCabe and stole a tire, wheel and tube from Leon Byrne.

Cody William Mayes was found guilty of robbery by assault and sentenced to five years in prison. His companion, R. J. Shupperd, was also convicted and sentenced to five years in prison. Mayes was charged with taking \$15 from Carlos Fournier, San Angelo cafe employee, last February. The incident occurred on the highway near Tennyson. Shupperd was charged with accompanying Mayes at the time of the crime.

The cases were tried before Judge John F. Sutton in 51st District Court.

Earlier in the week, a continuance request was granted to Glenn R. Lewis and B. W. Smith, attorneys for Harry Washburn of Houston, after a charge of attempted extortion against Washburn was called for trial. The continuance was asked on the grounds of insufficient time to prepare a de-

fense. Two other cases against the Houston man, burglary and assault with intent to murder, were passed until the next term of court. A Coke county grand jury returned the three indictments against him week before last and he was returned to Coke county from Houston last week.

Washburn allegedly entered the Coke county ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Weaver the night of April 23 and, brandishing two pistols, demanded \$20,000 after threatening to kill the couple. Mrs. Weaver is the mother of Washburn's estranged wife, Helen. It is charged that Washburn gave Mrs. Weaver a typed suicide note, ordering that she copy it in writing and send it to her daughter. It was said that Washburn left after Weaver offered to assist in bringing about a reconciliation between Washburn and his wife. The couple have a three-year-old son and a daughter, 8 months old.

Defense counsel for Washburn also filed a motion alleging that Washburn's office, automobile and home had been illegally searched after his arrest in Houston June 14. The motion asked that the court enter an order requiring arresting officers to make and file a list of all property and papers taken from the defendant, and to return the property to the owner. Judge Sutton set hearing on the motion for 10 o'clock Monday morning, October 15, in 51st District Court.

## BRONTE WINS FROM VERIBEST WITH 7 RUNS IN SEVENTH INNING

Bronte scored seven times in the last inning Monday night to knot up a free scoring ball game which they won in the eighth from Veribest, 18 to 17. It was Bronte's third win over Veribest this season.

Bob Wilson went seven innings on the mound for Bronte. After seven innings he had given up 15 hits and 16 runs which looked like defeat for Bronte. Things looked better after a Bronte rally which saw six runs scamper across the plate after two were out in the final frame. At the end of the regulation seven innings the score stood at 16 to 16.

Little Lyndon Waldrop, who even-

tually scored the winning run, came on to pitch in the eighth. He yielded one run before retiring the side. With one runner on Waldrop came to bat in the last of the eighth. An unexpected triple tied the game and Waldrop came in later on a passed ball with the winning run.

Bronte collected 16 base hits off Fuddy Feist of Veribest. Marlin McCutchen continued to hit the ball in his usual style. He pounded a home run and two doubles. Judge Sandusky walloped a long home run, a double and single. Pitcher Bob Wilson had a single, double and home run. Two of his hits came in the seventh inning when they counted most. Other Bronte hitters were Duane Tucker, Jack Vaughn, and Delbert Coalson, each with two singles.

## Parents' Problems

By DONALD M. MAYNARD

### The Importance of Age

How important is it for a ten-year-old boy to play with boys his own age outside of school? The boys his age live several blocks away—and this association could be encouraged. At present my son plays with a seven-year-old who lives in our block.

It is exceedingly important that your boy play with those of his own age. It is in the rough and tumble play with one's peers that a child learns to give and take which is so essential if he is to adjust himself happily to his fellows.

If he plays only with the seven-year-old, he is likely so to dominate him that soon he will have an exalted opinion of his own powers and abilities. When he finds himself with those of his own age, whom he cannot dominate and with whom he cannot have his own way, he may develop feelings of inferiority and insecurity that will remain with him throughout life.

Let me suggest, therefore, that you have boys of his own age in your own home frequently—and encourage him to visit them. The seven-year-old neighbor can play with the older boys, too, and of course there will continue to be many occasions on which your son and the younger boy will continue to play alone.

### Watch the Luxuries!

To what extent should parents provide their children with all the toys and luxuries the children want? Is there a danger that children will get to expecting anything they may take a fancy to, and get the idea that in life they can have whatever they want?

You have placed your finger on one of the most frequent mistakes that parents make. In their desire to make their children happy and to see to it that they have some of the joys they missed as children, parents not only give them all the toys and luxuries they want, but in many cases more than they want. Is it any wonder, then, that children go into life utterly unprepared for the hardships and deprivations that fall to the lot of all?

When children are small, therefore, let us guard against giving them everything they want. Our primary concern will be to help them discover how to be happy with what they have.

As children get older and the things they want become more expensive most family incomes automatically put a stop to the getting of everything they want. It is exceedingly important that boys and girls should learn to get satisfaction and happiness out of experiences that do not require a large expenditure of money.

### Family Councils

Do you approve of family councils? If they are democratic, the majority opinion will rule. What about the needs of the minority—let us say the child who is overruled by the others? Should not his needs be considered?

Yes, I heartily approve of family councils if they are entered into willingly and cheerfully by each member of the family and if they are conducted on a democratic basis.
