IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY WEDS OLLIE SUE GLENN AND MR. COLE

Before an altar banked with palms and urns filled with white gladioli Ollie Sue Glenn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Glenn of Winters, became the bride of Douglas Cole, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Cole of Winters, Wednesday evening in the First Methodist church of Winters.

The double ring ceremony was read by candlelight by the Rev. Thomas B. Granger. Cathedral tapers set in graduated candelabra were lighted by Jimmy Glenn, brother of the bride.

Mrs. M. E. Leeman, organist, played the traditional Wagner and Mendelssohn wedding music, and accompanied Bob Shytles as he sang "Ah Sweet Mystery of Life" and "I Love Thee," preceding the ceremony, and "The Lord's Prayer" as part of the rites.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a gown of bridal white lace and marquisette, fashioned with a tight fitting bodice with a bias fold of marquisette to form an off-the-shoulder effect. A lace yoke extended to a small round collar. The lace under skirt was overlaid with panniers of marquisette styled in soft unpressed pleats, sweeping into a slight train. Her fingertip length veil of bridal illusion edged with lace cascaded from a tiara of pearlized orange blossoms. White lace mits completed the costume. For something old the bride wore a diamond brooch belonging to her aunt, Mrs. F. G. Guitard of Waco, something borrowed was a white Bible belonging to Mrs. Tommy Rugas of Winters, something new was a strand of pearls which was a gift of the bridegroom, and something blue was a garter. The bridal bouquet was formed of white rosebuds in a modified nosegay arrangement, with showers of white satin.

The bride's maid of honor was her cousin, Betty Jo Glenn of Bronte, who wore a frock of white embroidered organdy over leaf green taffeta. The dress was cut with a U neckline, revealing scallops of the green accenting a wide looped sash of taffeta, and extending from the bodice to a bouffant skirt. She wore a demi-hat of braided green taffeta and matching slippers. She carried a small cascade arrangement of pale lavender gladioli with showers of lavender satin ribbons.

The bride's other attendants were Jeanelle Glenn of Snyder, cousin of the bride, and Ann Leeman of Winters. Miss Glenn wore a ballerina length gown of white organdy over daisy yellow taffeta duplicating the style of that of the maid of honor. Her accessories were yellow and she carried a cascade bouquet of yellow carnations. Miss Leeman's identical costume featured accents of Wedgewood blue and she carried matching carnations.

Acting as flower girls were the small nieces of the bridegroom, Bonnie Lou and Mary Lynn Richey, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. John Richey of Littlefield. Their dresses were of pastel pink shadow organdy with touches of deep lavender. Lavender was repeated in decorations on their natural straw baskets filled with pink rose petals.

The bridegroom chose for his best man his brother-in-law, John Richey of Littlefield, and ushers were Paris Burnham and Fred Brown.

Following the ceremony the bridal party greeted guests at a reception in the home of the bride's parents. The bride's table was laid with a cloth of sheer white embroidered linen and centered with an arrangement of yellow roses combined with white carnations in a crystal container. The table was lighted with white tapers included in the floral decorations. The three-tiered heart shaped wedding cake was decorated with touches of pale yellow in sugar rosebuds and the central decoration featured a pair of white doves bearing wedding rings, placed under an arch of white blossoms. The cake was cut by Mrs. Guitard. Mrs. C. C. Glenn of Bronte poured punch from a crystal service set in a wreath of white carnations and yellow roses. Mrs. Carrie Williams of Bronte and Mrs. Jay Gray of Abilene assisted in the house party. Mrs. Don McNeil of Abilene was at the bride's book.

Mrs. Cole was graduated from Bronte high school following which she attended TSCW in Denton. She was later employed in the Bureau of Labor statistics in Austin and prior to her marriage assisted her father as a bookkeeper in his gunning business. Mrs. Cole and her family were formerly residents of Maverick, and she is the granddaughter of Mrs. Louisa Johnson who was in business in Bronte for many years.

Mr. Cole was graduated from Winters high school and served with the Navy for the duration of World War II. He is at present engaged in farming and ranching activities near Winters.

Immediately after the reception the bridal couple left on a wedding trip to points along the Gulf coast. For traveling the bride selected a semi-tailored suit of coral linen, designed by Mrs. Guitard.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Wilma Gladys Green and his mother, Mrs. Vina Green, both of Blackwell. COMMISSIONERS MEET MONDAY

The Coke County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, approved routine bills and had some discussion on the Coke County Memorial hospital.

The Court set aside \$1,000 for the hospital to use in paying its June bills. Also approved by the Court was a \$1,900 bill to pay on the air conditioning system of the hospital. Commissioner Otis Smith of Precinct 2 said that the amount approved Monday made the total expended on the hospital this year reach several thousand dollars.

Commissioner Smith said that he thought the people of this county are entitled to know the facts concerning the finances of the hospital, which is owned by the county. At the end of the second quarter of this year, the hospital had a balance of \$10,119 in its account, according to the quarterly report. These figures are a matter of public record in the courthouse, Smith said.

BIDS ASKED ON HIGHWAY WORK ON OAK CREEK

Bids will be called for July 17 by the State Highway Department for \$7,500,000 worth of highway work including the bridge across the north end of the new Oak Creek reservoir.

The new bridge will be located on highway 70 some three and one-half miles south of Blackwell. It is expected that the bridge will be between one-quarter and one-half mile long. Its construction will involve straightening a hazardous bend in highway 70 and considerable fill work to build up lengthy approaches. No cost estimate on the project was available.

Funeral services for Howard Leyon Fuqua, 14 year old Blackwell youth, who drowned in a stock tank five miles south of Merkel last Friday, were held Saturday afternoon at the Merkel Church of Christ with the minister Paul Rogers officiating.

Young Fuqua was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Fuqua of Blackwell.

The youth was visiting his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Fuqua of Vies, and had gone with a friend, Leonard Boden, to swim in the Boden stock tank. The boys had swum out to an old raft when young Fuqua became cold and started to the bank. He sank and Leonard Boden, unable to rescue him, ran for help. The body was recovered 20 minutes later by two men who lived nearby. The victim failed to respond to resuscitation efforts.

Interment was in the Rose Hill cemetery at Merkel beside another Fuqua child.

D. W. SIMS IN SHRINE HOSPITAL AT DALLAS

D. W. Sims, 9-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Sims, was admitted to the Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children in Dallas on Friday, June 27. He underwent surgery for the second time in recent weeks. He was scheduled to return home by the last of this week.

Date Set For Testing Cows

Friday, July 27, has been set as the date to test milk cows in Coke County. The test will be for tuberculosis and Bang's disease. Cost will be \$2.00 per cow. This is the same price as charged when the animal is taken to the veterinarian for testing.

County Agent T. B. Hicks said that the fact that a cow may have a tag in the ear does not necessarily guarantee the animal free of disease. It simply shows that the animal was clear when tested, however long ago it might have been.

All farmers who have turned their names in the the agent's office will be notified directly. Any others who wish to take advantage of having their cows tested by having the veterinarian come to their place, should register their names with the county agent.

Spraying the city with DDT solution, as has been done the past two years, was discussed by city councilmen this week. Joe George Wilkins, member of the council, said that the work would have to be done with donations from the citizens of the town. This health measure has been financed in this manner the past two years. About \$400 is the estimated cost of spraying the entire city two times.

No decision has been made, according to members of the council, but it is generally felt that spraying the town with insecticide would help rid Bronte of flies, mosquitos and other insects and might well prevent the outbreak of disease. Flies have been particularly bad here the past few weeks.

A city-wide garbage collection was completed this past week and another spokesman for the council asked that citizens clear their property of all trash and weeds. If the spraying is done, he said, it will be more effective if the city is clean to start with.

Councilman H. A. Springer said that he talked with Dr. John R. Harris concerning these clean-up measures and that the city health officer heartily endorsed the program which is being considered.

No cases of polio have shown up in the Bronte territory this year, but it is prevalent all around this area. First case for Coke county this year was Atha Hall, 12 years old, of Robert Lee. If Bronte can prevent one case of polio by cleaning up it will be well worth the cost of spraying and the trouble of cleaning up trash, etc., Councilman Wilkins said.

Bronte WOW Camp Takes Part in Move to Help Red Cross Program

The Bronte Camp, No. 663, Woodman of the World, is participating in a nationwide project of the fraternal societies to secure funds to purchase and present to the American Red Cross a number of mobile units for gathering blood for the boys in the military and for civilian needs.

The project, originated by the National Fraternal congress, calls for the 85,000 fraternal beneficiary lodges throughout the United States and Canada to contribute cash and enroll blood donor volunteers from their nine million members.

Camp No. 663 of Bronte has sent its contribution to the Congress National headquarters. Contributions of all the fraternal societies will be transmitted to the American Red Cross by the National Fraternal Congress. In announcing the project to the Camps of the Woodmen of the World, President Farrar Newberry called attention to the great need for blood for men in service.

"If they so patriotically risk their lives for our country and a free world, the least we can do is to help them by generously contributing to this vital, life-saving service of the American Red Cross," Newberry said.
