July 20, 1951 CHANGES IN DRAFT LAWS **EXPLAINED**

The draft law, which expired July 9, has been extended in amended form to July 1, 1955, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, recently reminded Texas

General Wakefield noted the folowing important changes in the Se ective Service Act:

1. Men inducted will serve for 24 months as compared to 21 under the old law. Males must register at age of 18, as formerly.

2. Men are liable for induction a age 181/2 instead of 19. No man be low 19 can be inducted so long as a board has eligible older men.

3. Physical and mental standards service have been lowered, with 1879. the result that some men, now classified 4-F will be found suitable for

4. The present strength of the arm ed forces, approximately 31/2 million, can be raised to 5 million men.

5. Except for cases of extreme hardship, a man-may not be deferred for dependency on the basis of a

6. Men now or hereafter deferred on educational, occupational, farmng or dependency grounds will remain liable for service until age 35. Men not deferred are liable only to 26th birthday.

7. Conscientious objectors to military service shall be ordered by local boards, subject to regulations prescribed by the President, to perform civilian work in the national interest for 24 months.

Parents' **Problems**

I have tried many ways to get him to eat, but my husband believes the only way is to force him to eat and spank him when he spits out the food that is forced down him. I tried to discourage my husband but it did no good, so my husband but it did no good, so raising youngsters.
finally I let him handle it his way. He It would not be scolded the baby, shook and spanked him until the baby was so upset that he vomited several times. How can I help my husband see how harmful his attitude is toward the child?

First of all, let me commend you on your understanding of your prob-lem. Forcing children to eat not only tends to create a violent dislike for the food forced upon them but, also, to create an emotional state that takes away their appetite and makes it diffiult to digest the food that is eaten.

If your husband but knew it, he is ising the method almost universally condemned by experts in child pamphlets on eating issued by the Children's Bureau, The United States Department of Labor, Washington, D. C. It might be worth your while to order these and have them around the house, hoping your husband will pick one up






