## Several New Wells in Ft. Chadbourne Field

In the Bronte Field, Humble No. 4 J. L. Brunson, on the southeast side of the field, has been completed on the pump for 76.5 barrels of 45.4 gravity oil in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 397-1. The new producer is located in N. Eastland survey 330.

Humble No. B-1 D. K. Glenn was shut in early this week after swabbing some oil. No report on the quantity was available, but observers thought it would make a producer. However, a pumping unit will have to be installed, as the formation appeared to be "pretty tight".

In the Fort Chadbourne Field Humble has completed four wells on the Odom estate. No. 47-B Sallie Odom flowed 464.65 barrels of 45.1 gravity oil in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 821-1.

Humble No. 48-B Odom was rated as a 438.52 barrel producer after a 24 hour potential test. The oil tested 45 gravity and gas-oil ratio was 773-1.

## FUNERAL SERVICES HELD HERE TUESDAY FOR MRS. E. E. RAY, 33

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock for Mrs. E. E. Ray, 33, who died Sunday night at her home here. Mrs. Ray was discovered unconscious by her 15-year old son Sunday night and was pronounced dead upon arrival at the local hospital.

Justice of the Peace A. E. (Bud) Bell returned a verdict of suicide by poison after an investigation. Members of the family told the Enterprise editor that, with their knowledge of Mrs. Ray, they believed that the poison was administered accidentally.

The funeral services were held at the First Baptist church here with Rev. J. E. Fuller, pastor of the Bronte Methodist church officiating. He was assisted by Leon Sharp, local Church of

Christ minister. Mrs. Ray is survived by her husband; a 15-year-old son, Bennie; a 13-year-old daughter, Sallie; her mother, Mrs. W. H. Bosworth, a sister, Mrs. Joe Smith, a brother, Fred Bosworth, all of Springtown.

Pallbearers were Johnny Cockburn of Fort Worth, O. G. Cheek of Odessa, R. E. Bodine of Midland, F. M. Early of Midland, Clint Coughran of Midland and Harold Sheppard of Bronte. Clift Funeral home was in charge of arrangements and interment was in the Fairview cemetery here.

Relatives of Mrs. Ray said that she had been ill for eight or ten years and that she had undergone several major operations in that time.

## ED DIXON, 83, DIES AT HOME TUESDAY NIGHT

The final rites for Edward Benjamin Dixon, retired Bronte stock farmer, were conducted Thursday afternoon at 4 p. m. at the funeral home.

Mr. Dixon died at his home here in Bronte at the age of 83. Death came at 12:30 a. m. Wednesday, August 8, following a period of heart trouble which became worse about ten days before his death.

Minister Louis Pearl of London, Texas, officiated at the funeral service. He was assisted by Rev. V. D. Price, pastor of the Bronte Baptist church. Pallbearers were grandsons and grandsons-in-law of the deceased. Interment was in the Fairview cemetery here under the direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Edward Dixon was born in Delto County, near Paris, Texas, on April 3, 1868. He was married to Miss Sallie Leona Hodges at London, Texas on July 16, 1891. The couple came to Bronte in the fall of 1905 from Menard County. He had been a stock farmer in the area from that time until his retirement.

Surviving are Mrs. Dixon; two daughters, Mrs. Margaret Lee Hageman of Bronte and Mrs. Emma Velma Henderson of San Angelo; three sons, Johnnie Hodges Dixon of Red Rock, Arizona, Roy Samuel Dixon of Cooldidge, Arizona and Jack Dixon of Bronte; two half-sisters, Mrs. Ola Gentry of San Angelo and Mrs. Mattie Spoon of Menard and thirteen grandchildren and eleven great grandchildren.

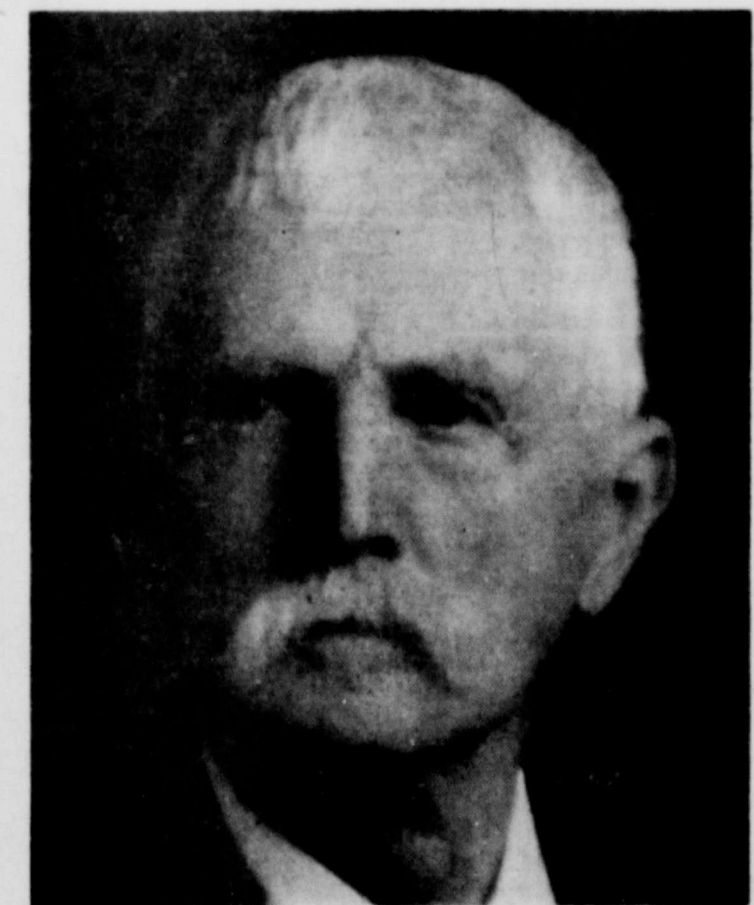

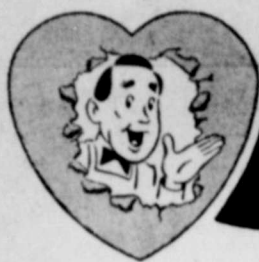

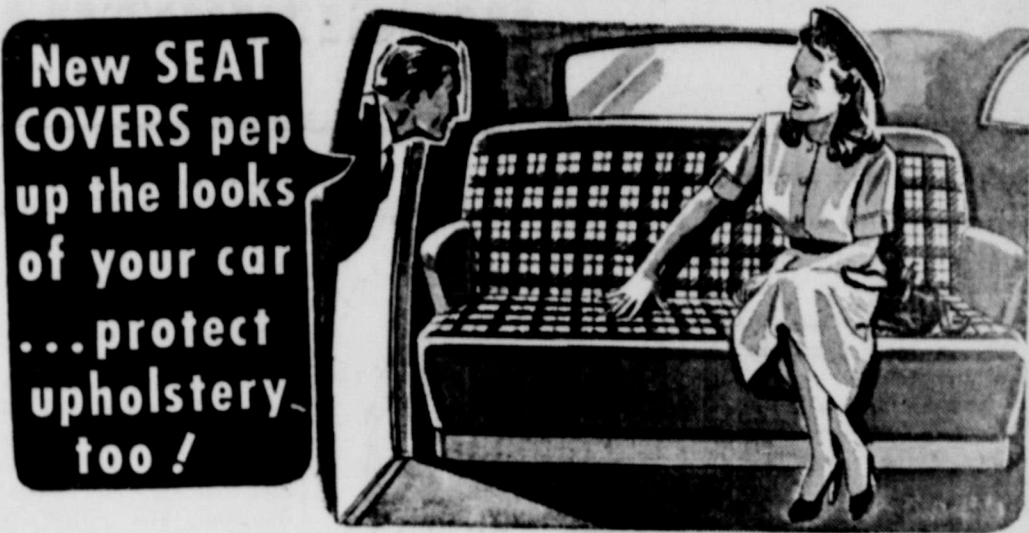
