Casing Is Set on Two Tests in Bronte Field; 1 Rawlings at 1600

Some unconfirmed reports have been circulating this week that Humble Oil & Refining Co. will drill another well nearby to its No. 1 Bronte Gas Unit and try to bring in production in the newly discovered Goens lime show. Oil was discovered in the No. 1 Bronte Gas Unit in a section from 4,840 to 4,890 feet. The well, however, is not being completed in this section as the operator has deepened to about 5,100 feet as called for in the permit. The best showing in the new discovered pay was from 4,855-67 feet, when gas came to the surface in 4 minutes and oil flowed in 11 minutes at an estimated rate of 736 barrels per day. Gas-oil ratio

was 900-1.

Humble No. 2-B D. K. Glenn, in the Bronte Field, set casing to 4,322 feet and will try for completion from open hole below that depth. This test is in the southeast part of the Bronte field.

R. A. Josey of Houston No. 1 E. C. Rawlings is drilling Monday at 1,600 feet. This wildcat is located six miles north of Bronte.

Another wildcat has been staked in the northeastern part of the county 5½ miles west and slightly south of Blackwell. It will be Union No. 1-A Maureen Stewart and will be located 2,310 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the west line of section

269-1A-H&TC survey.

Stanford No. 1 T. P. Carter has plugged back to test a Cisco lime after drilling to 6,600 feet and finding the Ellenburger barren. A showing was recorded at about 4,050 feet, and 5½ inch casing has been set at 4,046 feet. It has to be perforated.

Lester & Duffield, Inc. and the Hanley Co. have staked location for No. 2 Zade Sowell, in the Fort Chadbourne field. It will be 660 feet from the north and east lines of C. H. Williams survey No. 30.

Los Nietos No. 2 H. G. Wendland was making hole early this week at 2,595 feet. This wildcat is located southwest of here.

Longhorns Lose To Steers, 19-25

The Robert Lee Steers won over the Bronte Longhorns 25-19 in the Homecoming game Friday night. It was the final game of the season for both teams.

The first score came late in the first quarter when Robert Lee's Norman Roberts made a 40 yard run through center. The conversion try was unsuccessful.

The Steers failed to slow down in the second quarter and went over for two more touchdowns. After setting up the touchdown play on a short pass from Donny

Duncan to Bill Havins, Duncan then went five yards to score on his own right side. He then kicked the extra point. A few minutes later, he took the ball off the right end and made a spectacular 80 yard run for another tally.

At this time, Robert Lee was weakened considerably by the loss of Norman Roberts who was taken out of the game with a leg injury. The half-time score was 19-0 in the Steer's favor.

The large crowd was entertained at half time with a drill by the Robert Lee and Bronte bands. The Bronte band was wearing their new uniforms and made a striking picture. The bands marched in from separate ends of the field and made the formation in the center of the field facing the Bronte stands. The first formation was EXES in honor of the Bronte homecoming and both bands joined in playing Auld Ang Syne. They then formed RLHS and played the Robert Lee school song. The bands then retired to opposite ends of the field and the game was on again.

Bronte came back in the third with Billy Jack Gentry going through center for five yards and the touchdown. The ball was fumbled on the kick attempt.

The Steer's final score came in the fourth when Milburn Wink broke through for a fifteen yard touchdown run.

At this point in the game, Bronte started evening the score and wearing down the Steer's resistance. J. W. Caudie scored on a pass from Lyndon Waldrop. Another Waldrop pass, this time to Herbert Brigan, was good for another tally. Gentry drove through the line for the extra point, to make the score 25-19. The Longhorns had started a straight downfield drive and were heading back to paydirt when the game ended.

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Jersey Ends Life By Milking It Away



The milking career of the champion lifetime butterfat producer of the nation's dairy cows came to an end this fall. The cause of her death was given as "she just milked away."

Silken Lady's Ruby of F., a registered Jersey cow owned by the Estate of J. W. Coppini, Ferndale, Calif., milked her last at well over 21 years of age, more than three times the average life of a dairy cow.

Her production accumulated in 20 milking years stands at 196,457 pounds milk and 10,936 pounds butterfat, which is equivalent to 91,375 quarts milk and 13,123

pounds butter. This is enough milk to furnish the needs of a family of five for over 60 years and enough butterfat to meet all of its fat requirements for over 77 years.

Old Ruby, as the production champion is known throughout the dairy world, had 18 calves. She is survived by a host of descendants, the exact number of which is not known. She was honored recently at two of the leading dairy cattle shows in the nation by having her picture hung in the show barns with the caption, "Old Jerseys never die, they just milk away." The statement describes Old Ruby's passing. She milked away, but her name will continue to live in the hearts of the nation's dairymen.

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

RED CROSS BRINGS EARLY THANKSGIVING TO FAMILIES HIT BY FOUR-STATE FLOODS



After last July's floods, 82,275 families in Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Illinois were thankful to be alive, but many had lost everything they had worked for. In Wyandotte County, with Kansas City, Kansas, loss was greatest, with 4,729 homes destroyed or damaged. Red Cross, on a scale of individual need, made grants totaling \$5,416,550 for assistance in rebuilding and repairing 2,543 homes in that county alone. In the upper photo, a Red Cross worker examines wreckage of a house, typical of damage in the Argentine and Arapahoe districts of Kansas City. To estimate its replacement cost, in the four states, 32,997 homes were destroyed or damaged.

Thanksgiving came early for Mrs. Hazel Stoberly, below, left, whose house was the first Red Cross new home completed in Kansas City. One of 2,945 being replaced or built new in Wyandotte County by the Red Cross. On October 6, she received the key to the house, rebuilt on the old foundation in Kansas City's Argentine district. Red Cross also provided \$70 worth of essential furniture. After verification of family needs, Red Cross awards—outright gifts, not loans—totaling \$8,945,808.11 have been granted to help in building and repairing 4,900 homes in the four-state flood area. For the more than 25,000 families who applied for Red Cross help, Thanksgiving, 1951, came the day a family received notice that a Red Cross award had been granted to help them come back.
