Self-Employed Need SS Cards

Self-employed persons in a trade or business who came under the Social Security for the first time January 1, 1951, should make sure that they have a social security card, according to George D. Clark, manager of the San Angelo Social Security office. These persons will need a social security number at the time they file their first social security return, says Mr. Clark. This report will be filed in conjunction with income tax returns. The first such report from self-

employed persons will be made in 1952 for the year 1951.

It is pointed out by Clark that under the terms of the amended Social Security Act, Federal Old-age and survivors insurance is extended to most nonfarm and self-employed persons who have incomes from trades or businesses which they operate either as sole owners or partners.

Self-employed persons who have never had a social security account number card or who have lost their card are urged to secure one now in order that they may be able to file complete information with their tax return next year.

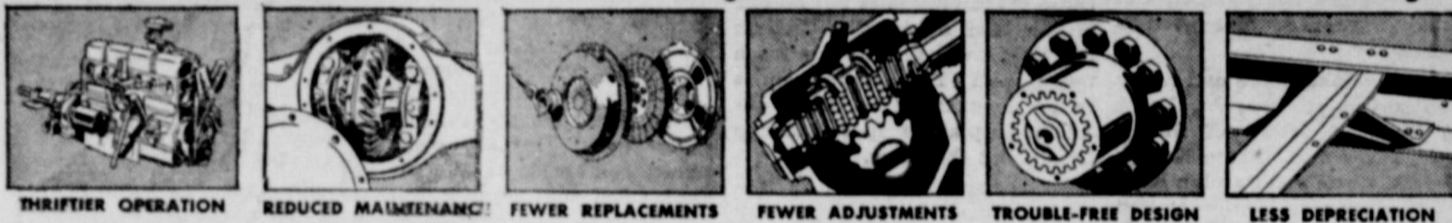

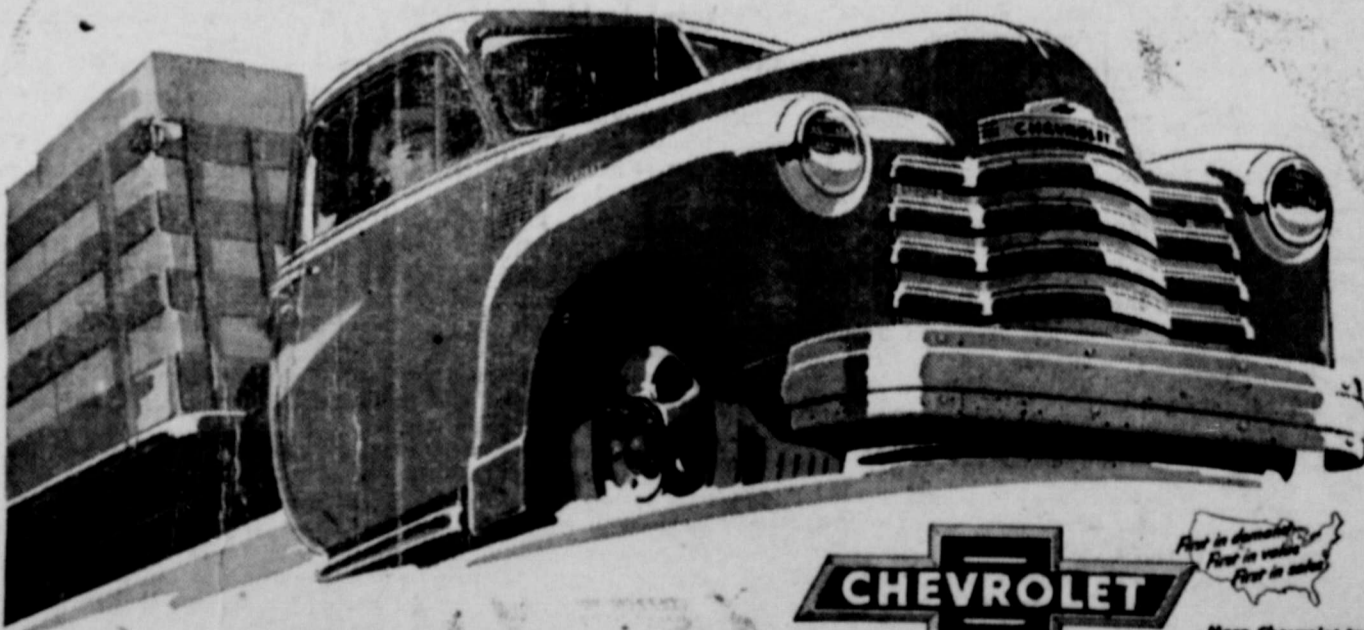

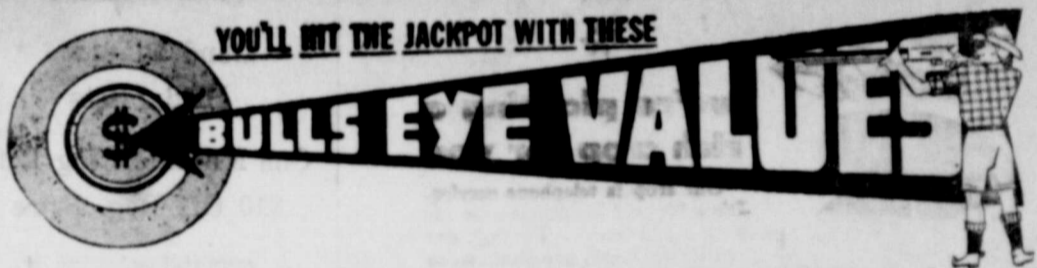

"Home Building" was the subject discussed when the Diversity club met in the home of Mrs. Robert Forman Thursday night, December 6.

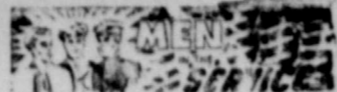
