Funeral services for Charlie H. Conner, 70, were held from the First Baptist church in Bronte Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Interment followed at the Fairview cemetery in Bronte under direction of the Clift Funeral Home.

Mr. Conner, resident of Coke county and Tom Green county since 1916 passed away January 12 at the home of a daughter in San Angelo. He was born in Italy, Texas January 1, 1882. He was married to Miss Anna Bells Hudspeth and they had eight children. Mrs. Conner passed away June 12, 1939. A daughter, Mrs. Frank Davis, is deceased.

A farmer and rancher until the time of his death, Mr. Conner was a member of the Brookshire Baptist church.

The Rev. Floyd Harris of the Harris Avenue Baptist church in San Angelo officiated at the services.

Survivors include four sons, A. J. Conner and Raymond Conner of Bakersfield, California, J. T. Conner of Sweetwater and Geo. Conner of San Angelo; three daughters, Mrs. Clare Beeber of Ventura, California, Mrs. Leonard Blinn of Gliden, Iowa and Mrs. Wylie Therwhanger of San Angelo; fifteen grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

All of his children were present for the funeral. Mrs. Beeber and Mrs. Blinn were visiting their father at the time of death and the two sons from California visited him during Christmas.

BRONTE BOYS, MILES GIRLS WIN TUESDAY

The local basketball clubs gave the Miles teams plenty of trouble Tuesday night in the Bronte gym. The boys' game ended in a 43-11 win for the Bronte Longhorns, and the girls lost 16-18 by an overtime field goal.

The girls game was a thriller from beginning to end. At the end of the regular playing time the score was a 13-13 tie. The officials gave a three minute playoff and at the end of those three minutes the score stood at 16-16. So, an unlimited time count was declared with the first team scoring winning. Miles came in with a field goal to win the game 18-16.

Jo Dell Walton and Kitty Sue Gaddy captained the girls' game and Rita Beth McCutchen led her team mates with 9 points to make high scorer. Muery was high point girl for the Miles team.

In the boys game, J. W. Caudle led in scoring by making 11 points.

The conference game marked the second district loss for the girls, the other loss being to Miles. The boys remain unbeaten in district play.

Bronte boys and girls carried off two trophies in the Robert Lee Invitational-basketball tournament last weekend. Playing three games each, the boys and girls both played in the final games Saturday night with the boys taking the first place trophy and the girls taking second place.

Both teams started off with wins over Christoval Friday night with the boys winning 42 to 30 over the Christoval boys and the Bronte girls winning 23 to 9. Mary Ann Grey and J. O. Bagwell were high point scorers for the local teams.

Saturday morning the boys ran over the San Angelo Kittens with a score of 42 to 19 to put them in the final bracket. J. O. Bagwell tallied 17 points to again cap high scoring honors.

The girls played Divide in a Saturday morning game that ended in a close 15-12 win for the local lassies. Mary Ann Grey scored 8 points for Bronte with McCutchen and Gaddy making the other 7 points. A few good words should be said for the guards, Cora Beth Whatley, Joyce Wrinkle and Camille Martin, who did good defensive work.

In the final games Saturday night, the boys came in close to win over Robert Lee 33 to 30 to make them tournament champs. Bagwell scored 10 points and Brigman followed with 8. Norman Roberts of Robert Lee led his team mates with 11 tallies.

Dimes Drive Underway, But More Funds Needed

March of Dimes contributions are coming in steadily, it was announced this week, but people are reminded that the drive is not yet over and that everyone is urged to contribute.

Mrs. Charlie Boecking, campaign director for the East end of Coke county, announced that \$49.25 was collected in the iron

lung at the City Cafe. The local cafes are charging 10 cents for coffee Friday and Saturday of each week with 5 cents going for the March of Dimes. Other iron lungs have not yet been collected.

nual drive. Several activities have been planned and put over but Mrs. Boecking says that more volunteer workers are yet needed for the drive. ENROLLMENT INCREASE MAKES NEED FOR MORE TEACHERS HERE

Superintendent J. L. Carroll said this week that enrollment in the lower grades in the Bronte schools is up so much that it is very difficult to conduct classes because of the crowded conditions.

The second, third and fourth grades are the worst crowded, with 40, 41 and 52 pupils respectively. Carroll said that the fourth grade especially needs another teacher "since it is impossible for a teacher to seat 52 students in a small classroom and to teach them with any degree of satisfaction."

The superintendent said that with the present attendance he expects the school to gain one additional teacher next year, but

that if students would attend school as they should, two teachers would be gained. The number of teachers allowed a school is based on the average daily attendance, not on enrollment and when a child misses school he is helping to cut down on the number of teachers that will be allowed for the next year.

He added: "School attendance is negotiable, like money, and when a child is absent he not only loses the benefit of the training he misses, but is a drag on the possibilities for the other students." Last year, if the average daily attendance had been only five more the school would have received \$3000 more on which to operate this year.

Commissioners Have Session

Coke County Commissioners Court met Tuesday at Robert Lee and agreed to allow \$800 additional money for use in the county road and bridge fund. It was voted by the court that the money would be evenly divided by the four precincts, giving each of them an additional \$200 for use in maintaining roads.

A bounty of \$12.50 each was paid for 25 bobcats which have been trapped recently. This bounty was agreed upon several weeks ago by members of the court, in an effort to curb this growing menace to the livestock industry in this county.

Hawley C. Allen was appointed as a member of the Coke County Memorial Hospital Board, to succeed Frank McCabe, who resigned his job as chairman of the board.

Other business attended to was approval of the county's bills. It was decided to have a meeting Thursday (yesterday) to determine whether or not county officials and employees will pay social security tax. Payment into this fund is optional with each county.
