Billy Graham Preaches

A week ago Sunday Rev. Billy Graham made history by preaching a sermon from the steps of the Capitol. It was a rainy, cold day, and it looked for a while like the meeting would be a wash-out. But despite the bad weather, the crowd was estimated at from 20 to 40 thousand. I have seen two inaugurations of Presidents since I came to Congress, and cannot recall ever seeing a turn-out that surpassed this one.

The dynamic Evangelist has been conducting a revival at the National Guard Armory here for more than a month. There the crowds have averaged from five to ten thousand each night.

Calling for a return to Christ if our strength and moral fiber is to endure and meet the test of these critical times when "humanity stands at the crossroads,' the speaker urged that a day of national prayer be designated similar to the one ordered by Abraham Lincoln while he was president.
