



By and large, however, there is no particular value in antagonizing your thoughtless friends and relatives.

Take time to have a good, heart-toheart talk with them, in which you help them to see that your daughter rapidly is becoming spoiled because of the attention she is getting from outsiders. have no doubt that many of your friends, when they see how earnest and sincere you are, will make a definite effort to cooperate with you.

In spite of everything you can do however, there probably will be those who continue to spoil your daughter. Your clue, then, is to follow the procedure you evidently are following now that is, you will refuse to spoil her at home. Remember that it is possible to be firm with her and at the same tim to give her plenty of affection and understanding. The latter are tremer dously important for your child's sens of security, as you realize, but it should be remembered that the feeling of insecurity does not are but of firmness by parents so much a it does out of their lack of consistency.
