

#### SMALL SCHOOLS ASS'N PASS SPECIAL RESOLUTION'S

The Texas Small Schoots Association meeting at Austin on March 28 passed some resulations which will be of interest to residents of this area.

Purpose fo the resolutions are to "improve and strengthen the small schools for the purpose of offering better educational opportunities to the boys and girls in each community."

The group resolved that the basis for accreditation should be based on the needs of the boys and girls in each community rather than upon college entrance requirements.

It was also resolved that teachers be allowed at least three field endorsements, thus making them more versatile and of more value to the small schools where the number of teachers is limited.

The resolution read further that the association recommended that the minimum salary for a eacher with a degree should be \$3,000 per year.




