### Wildcat Staked on W. H. Mackey Place

The Bronte area drew a new wildcat location this week when Fullerton Oil Co. of Hobbs, N. M., No. 1 W. H. Mackey was spotted as a Coke County wildcat.

It has a contract depth of 5,800 feet with rotary. Drillsite is four miles northeast of Bronte, 660 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the west lines of BBB&C Survey.

In the Bronte 4,800-Foot field, Humble Oil & Refining Co. staked location for No. 3 Olive May Keeney.

Slated for 5,100 feet with rotary, site for No. 3 Keeney is two miles southwest of Bronte, 467 feet from the west and 660 feet from the south lines of Section 453, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey.

Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 11 Edna Wylie, P. Martinez Survey 299, has been completed in the Fort Chadbourne Field, four miles southeast of Ft. Chadbourne in Coke County.

During the daily potential test No. 11 Wylie gauged 123.23 barrels of oil, flowing through an 8/64-inch choke with 275 pounds pressure on the casing and 675 pounds on the tubing. It is producing oil from perforations at 5,445-70 and 5,478-89 feet. Operator set casing at 5,508 feet. Total depth was 5,508 feet, plugged back to 5,495 feet.

In that same field, three miles southeast of Fort Chadbourne, Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 13 Edna Wylie, P. Martinez Survey 299, was drilling below 4,940 feet. Slated depth is 5,600 feet.

Three miles east of Fort Chadbourne in that same field Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 9 Irene Morrow, J. M. Lindley Survey 26, at last report was drilling below 3,152 feet. It has a contract depth of 5,600 feet.

Jameson Field, five miles southwest of Silver in Coke county, has a new producer at Chester Hunter of Dallas No. 1 J. B. Walker, Jr., Section 1, W. H. Wylie Survey.

No. 1 Walker had a daily potential of 165 barrels of 48 gravity oil, plus 33 percent water. Completion was on a 1/4 inch choke with 1,350 pounds casing and 700 pounds tubing pressures. It is producing from an open hole at 6,376-6,430 feet, pay section topped at 6,366 feet. Having a gas-oil ratio of 1,705-1, the well was treated with 3,000 gallons of acid.

In that same field, 1 1/2 miles northwest of Robert Lee, Sun Oil Co. No. 5-A Jameson Reef Unit was spotted as a 7,500-foot rotary project.

### School Board Has Meeting to Talk Of New Building

Members of the school board and Supt. J. L. Carroll met Monday night, May 12, at the school. Main item of business before the group was the discussion of building a new elementary school here.

Five members of the board including Jesse Parker, president, Matthew Caperton, secretary, W. W. Milliken, Dr. J. R. Harris and Sid Evans.

The board voted to employ Strout and Maddox of Austin and San Angelo to make preliminary plans and specifications for a new elementary school, which will accommodate grades 1 through 6. Bids were taken for bonds for financing the new building. Low bidder was R. K. Dunlap Co. of San Antonio.

Trustees are working on securing a possible site for the new building. They emphasized, however, that an election voting bonds will have to be called before the school can be built. The tax rate will not be raised in the event the bonds are voted. More detailed figures, such as the type of building and amount of money it will cost, has not yet been determined.



### Joe L. Mays In Dist. Judge Race

Joe L. Mays, County Judge of Tom Green County, has made his formal announcement for the office of Judge of the 51st Judicial District of Texas, subject to the action of the Democratic Primaries.

Judge Mays was born in Bell County, Texas, May 3, 1903, grew up in Hill County, near Covington Texas and graduated from high school there in 1920. He attended the University of Texas for 7 years and received a BA degree in 1926 and a LLB degree in 1929. He came to San Angelo in June 1929, and began the practice of law.

In making his announcement, Judge Mays said:

"The importance of the District Court to our citizens cannot be over estimated. Every good citizen wants to see justice done, and expects justice from our courts. It is the duty of our courts to investigate and fairly determine all questions of fact before them and to correctly apply the law. In the district Court the most valuable property rights, and personal rights beyond price, liberty, and life itself are put in issue and are determined by the judgements of that court.

"The judicial process involves a constant search for the true intent and meaning of the law as applied to each particular case. The efficient and alert conduct of court business requires a knowledge of the law and practical skill in its application. But the moving force behind successful court operation is the public will and demand that justice be done.

"I will make an active campaign and look forward to seeing the voters throughout the five counties in the 51st Judicial District. However, I will not neglect my present duties as county judge.

"I respectfully submit my candidacy to the voters in the belief that my experience as a lawyer, as county judge and as a citizen merit my promotion to the office of 51st District Judge."

Judge Mays was elected to his present position in 1950, without opposition. He had served as special judge on three previous occasions. During World War II, he was on active duty 33 months as a captain in the U. S. Marine Corps, stationed at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, and at Washington, D. C. Judge Mays is married to the former Miss Brevard Burk of San Angelo. The couple has one son, Joel, 16, attending high school. They reside at 228 West Harris Avenue, in San Angelo.

### RULING MADE ON FULLER CANDIDACY

The County Judge and the District Attorney have received a ruling from the Attorney General to the effect that E. B. Fuller, who has filed for County Attorney, is eligible to have his name printed upon the Primary Ballot in July.

Fuller has consistently contended he had such a right but a rumor has persisted that he was ineligible and that he was ineligible to run. The Attorney General's ruling should clarify the situation.

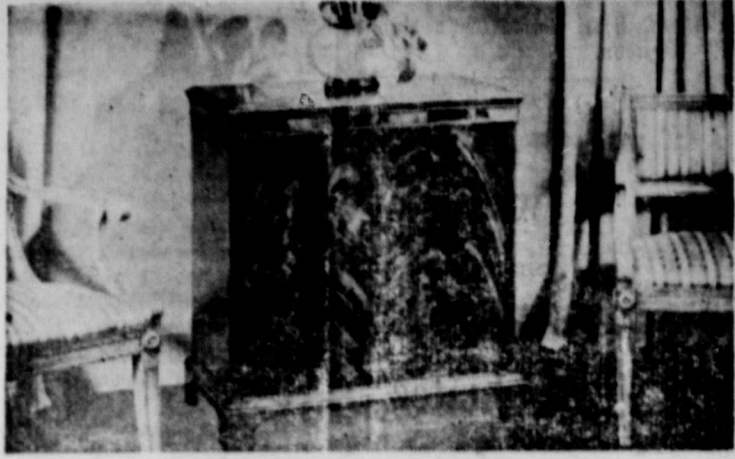

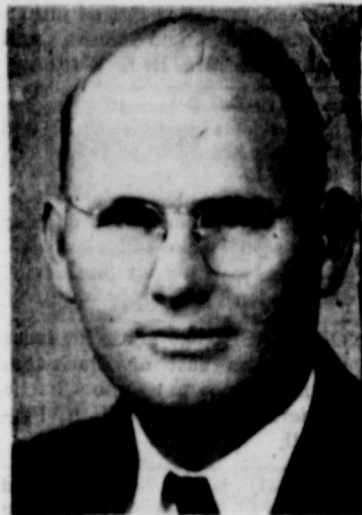

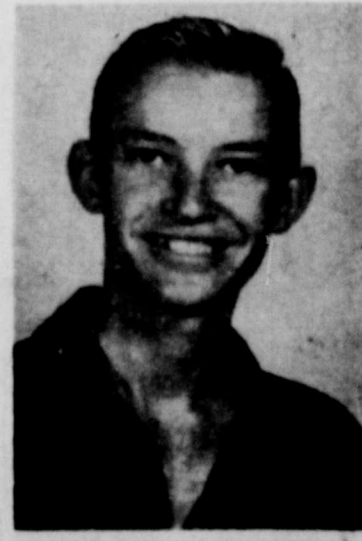

The class worked to get their nominees for Halloween King and Queen in the winning position. King and Queen were Lyndon Waldrop and Camille Martin.

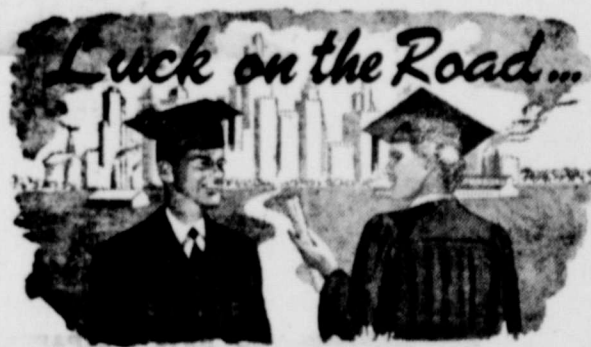
