CONSERVATION PROGRAM RULES GOVERNING SHUTDOWN STRIKE FOR YEAR GIVEN

Reasons why farmers must obtain "prior approval" of conservation practices in order to qualify for payment under the Agricultural Conservation Program have been set forth by Production and Marketing officials here.

In the 1946 conservation program each county has received an allotment of a limited amount of money to be used in paying for conservation work done. B.F. Vance, State Director of PMA's Field Service Branch, said, since the amount of work for which payment can be made is limited by the size of the county budget, if the payments are to be apportioned fairly throughout the county, farmers must inform the county ACA committee just what conservation work they expect to carry out in earning payments. he committee will authorize the practice if funds are available.

If such a system of obtaining "prior approval" was not followed, some ACA cooperators probably would do conservation work expecting to earn payments and then find the county had exhausted its funds. In such an event, no payment could be made, Vance explained. Another purpose of the "prior approval" system is to make certain that practices which are to qualify for payment will contribute to conservation on the farm and fit into the over-all conservation program of the county, Vance declared.

AMARILLO FIRM TO PLAN HOSPITAL

A contract for the services of the E. F. and J. F. Rittenberry Architect Firm of Amarillo, was secured by the Board of Directors of the Plains Memorial Hospital, Inc., at a meeting of the board held here Wednesday night. Mr. E. F. Rittenberry was here to represent the architect firm and to advise with the board on the preliminary steps necessary leading up to the hospital's building project. Mr. Rittenberry was formally employed by the hospital following his recommendation by the board's architect committee.

Although no definite plans as to the type of building or arrangement of rooms were made, other than that the building would be absolutely fire proof and built in a manner so that additions could be made later without marring its appearance. After discussing the needs of the community with the board Mr. Rittenberry requested time to make a preliminary drawing of the proposed building project to be submitted to the board in the near future, for approval or alterations as deemed necessary by the board and management of the hospital. He also declared that it was his opinion that by the time the necessary preliminary work on the building project is completed, the building material situation will be greatly improved. When the preliminary plans are completed architect's drawing of the proposed building with detailed information will be published in the News.

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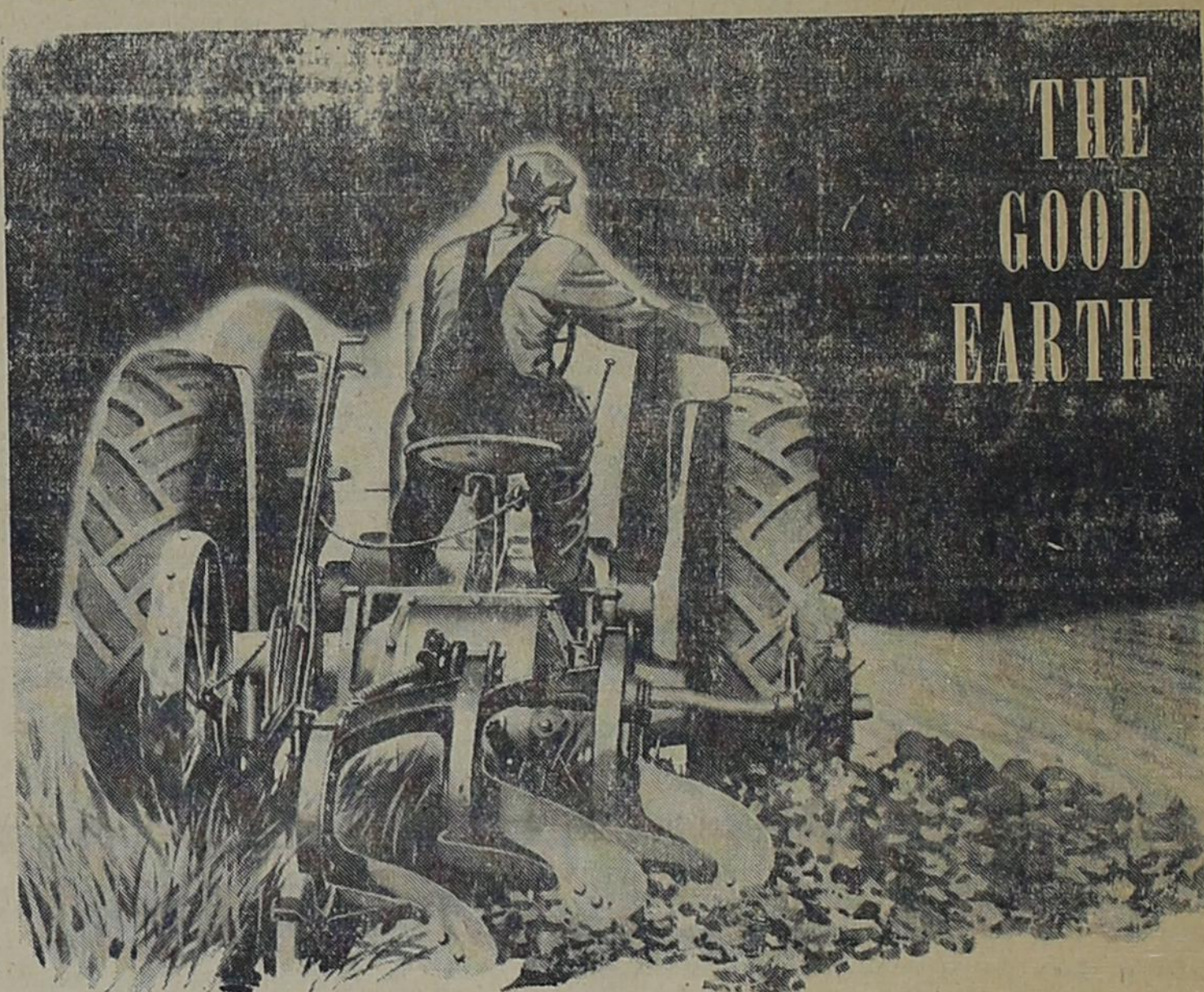
