

A booster pump was being installed Wednesday to help in getting water into town. It is being set at the south edge of the city. Officials said they believe it will help a great deal in increasing the amount of water which can be pumped through the four inch line from the river.

The pipeline from Oak Creek lake is within 31/2 miles of Bronte and the filter plant on the north side of town is coming along according to schedule, it was reported. Once this line is completed and the lake gets some water in it, Bronte will have an abundant water supply.



## Santa Fe Trucks On New Routes

Direct truck service between Galveston and Houston in the Gulf area and Lubbock and Amarillo in the Panhandle will be inaugurated today (August 11) by the Santa Fe Trail Transportation Company, J. P. Cowley, vicepresident and general manager of the Santa Fe Railway, Galveston, announced today. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 50A which shall read as follows:
"Sec. 50A. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and

whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, leans or scholarships to students loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vet of the qualified

mitted to a vete of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:
