DICK RUSSELL BACKS ADLAI

RUSSELL IS THE GEORGIA SENATOR FOR WHOM GOVERNOR SHIVERS AND TEXAS DELEGATION VOTED UNANIMOUSLY ON ALL BALLOTS AT DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION IN CHICAGO

Senator Dick Russell of Georgia, the man the Texas Delegation headed by Gov. Allan Shivers supported on all ballots at the national Democratic convention in Chicago, predicted last week that Adlai Stevenson and John J. Sparkman will be elected by one of the largest majorities given a national ticket in recent years.

Senator Russell, who is chairman of the senate armed services committee and of the senate subcommittee on agriculture, said: "General Eisenhower's evident confusion in his efforts to grapple with vital political issues has clearly demonstrated to the American people the grave danger of placing our government in the hands of a military man. . . . No military career, however great, can be a substitute for familiarity with the operation of a government which traditionally and by law is dependent on civilian control. . . ."

"As one who has admired General Eisenhower as a military leader, I have been bewildered by the endless contradictions of his political pronouncements. It would require a book to catalog them. "Shortly after stating that he did not understand the term 'Farm Parity,' he assured the American farmer of 100% parity for all the products of his toil. As one who has devoted a large part of his legislative service to overcoming Republican opposition to fair farm legislation I have vainly awaited an endorsement of this last farm statement from General Eisenhower's Republican congressional supporters. I have failed to see where one of them has disclaimed his record of opposition to the soil conservation program and to the laws which enabled these farmers to have some idea when they plant their crops what they will receive from their harvest."

"The American voters are thinking for themselves in 1952. Neither the bedlam of this campaign nor the military glamor of the Republican candidate will confuse them. They will go to the polls in the greatest number in our history on November 4 to maintain in power the party of the people. . . ."

"Governor Stevenson has the potentialities which can make him one of the greatest presidents who has ever served our country. With the support and prayers of the American people and the aid of the Almighty he devoutly worships, he will see this nation safely through the dangers of today's world."

SANTA FE URGE EMPLOYEES TO VOTE TUESDAY

Sixty-six thousand employees of the Santa Fe Railway have heard the words "VOTE! VOTE! VOTE!" so many times since the first of August it's doubtful any of them will fail to show up at the polls on November 4.

Probably one of the most extensive company programs attempted in connection with the "Get Out the Vote" campaign, Santa Fe started by circulating lapel pins in red, white and blue, reading "Let's all vote." Following that, individual letters were sent to all employees and officials in all of the states served by Santa Fe listing important information in connection with the laws and regulations of each state pertaining to registration and voting. Posters have been placed on all bulletin boards over the entire system and various articles have appeared in the company magazine — the October cover was dedicated to the program.

Window displays all over the country in Santa Fe offices have been decorated with the vote theme and all Santa Fe advertising appearing in more than 1,000 publications, carries a plea to the general public. All mail sent by the railroad is sent through a postage meter stating "Vote as you please — but Vote!"

houses on Santa Fe have an attractive card on each table reminding the traveling public to register and vote. Radio and TV shows sponsored by Santa Fe also carry the message.

In addition a non-partisan motion picture entitled "Government is Your Business" produced by the Christophers is being circulated throughout the system. More than 45,000 Santa Fe employees have viewed the picture. The whole theme is "It makes no difference how you vote — just vote."

Boy Scouts Sponsor "Get Out The Vote" Move

As Election Day, Nov. 4, approaches, the Boy Scouts of America, now nearly 3,000,000 strong, are ready to wind up their nationwide "Get Out The Vote" Campaign.

In an unprecedented turnout in nearly every community in the nation, about two million boys will go forward on Saturday, Nov. 1, to call on thirty million American homes. They will leave

a message that should awaken all citizens to the fact that voters have a real voice in who shall lead the nation.

The Scouts will hang a small Liberty Bell cutout on the front doorknob, bearing this simple, yet effective message:

"Vote as you think. Think as you vote, Tuesday, Nov. 4. Today's youth counts on you. Use your freedom to vote."

The Scouts' "Get Out The Vote" Campaign is undertaken with the cooperation of the Freedoms Foundation. It is strictly non-partisan, without reference to candidates or parties, and has the enthusiastic endorsement of the nation's leaders.

Reminding the entire membership of the organization that only 50 percent of eligible voters voted in 1948, Dr. Arthur A.

Schuck, Chief Scout Executive, said:

"This year there will be about 97,000,000 eligible voters. Our objective is to increase the voting percentage. We feel that America will be strengthened by our efforts in doing this service which we are equipped to do. Over 2,000,000 boys will learn a great lesson of participating citizenship as they perform a significant service to our country."

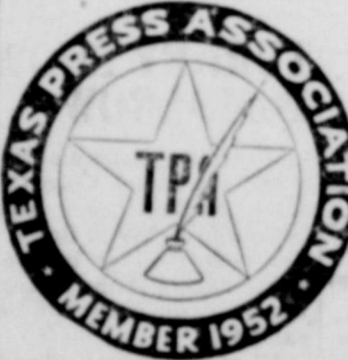

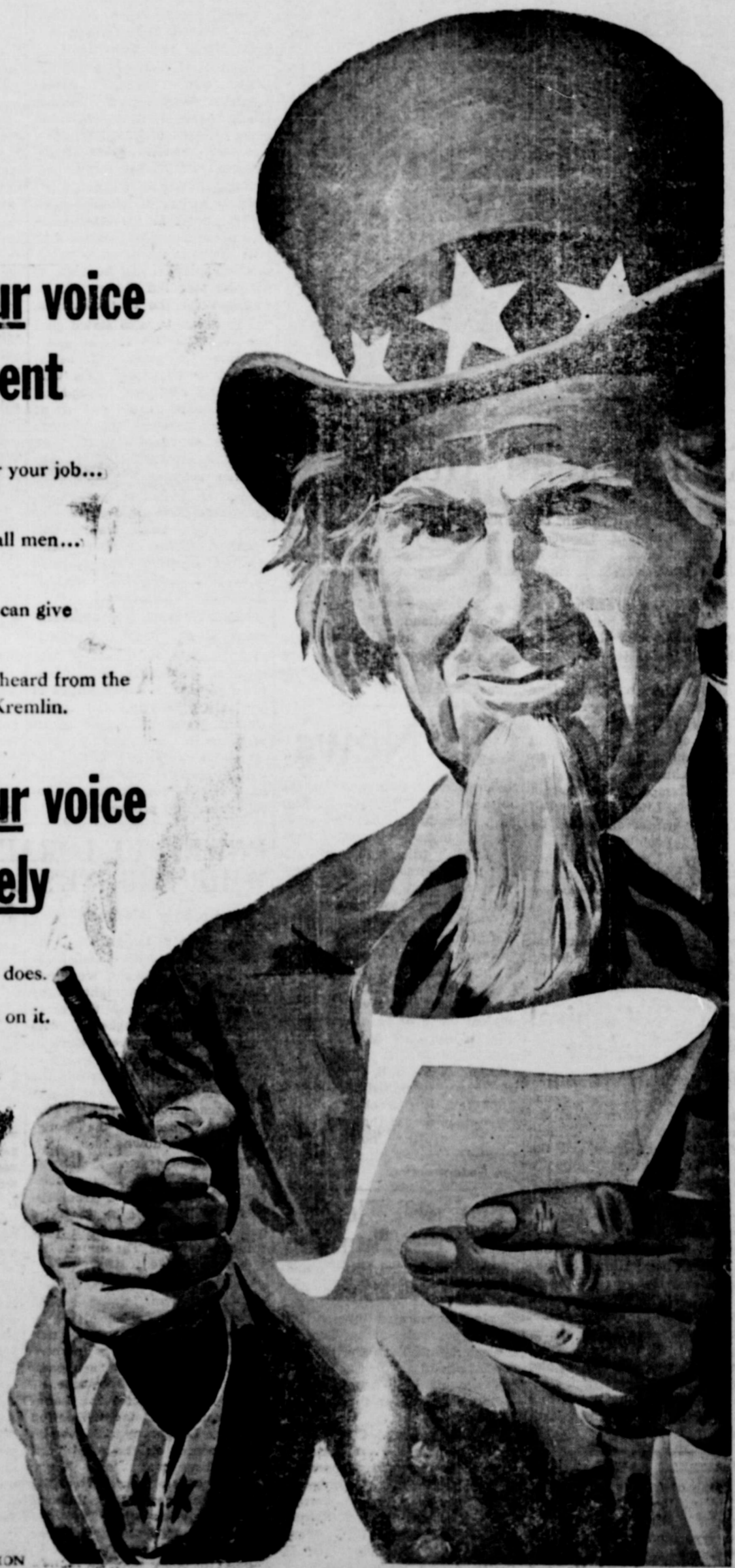
