Drouth Brings Need For Cover Crops

The drouth continues. And to what extent no one can guess. We can guess, though, what condition our pastures and range lands will be in if we continue the present level of use. Quite a large percent of the areas' grass lands are now completely bare of effective cover.

Let us think about COVER for a moment. Why is it so important in the management of grass lands? First of all, cover is what our livestock feed on and that alone is why we must keep cover. Other functions of cover are also important. It protects our soils which are the factories for our grasses. Protects the soils from the damaging effects of water, wind, and sun.

Rangelands that are permitted to become bare are subject to either water or wind erosion or both. Much of the pasture lands of this area are the steeper, hilly lands which are stabilized with grass cover but will suffer severe damage from erosion when that cover is removed. Tests made during the summer of 1952 by the Soil Conservation Service

in the Abilene area revealed that the soil temperature in bare spots in a pasture rose to 140 F. while under good grass cover the soil temperature was only 101 F. These tests show that evaporation of soil moisture is considerably less when good cover is present.

In addition to protecting the soils from excessive evaporation, cover acts as a sponge. Catching and holding water where it falls, giving the soil time to soak up large amounts. Cover also prevents the soil from packing and sealing over, leaving openings which water can penetrate more readily.

Water. Rain, when it comes, is not the complete answer to our problems. We cannot expect our grasslands to go back into high production until we have given them some rest and extra care.

The treatment for bringing pastures back will vary; depending largely on how seriously those pastures have been damaged. The treatment may be a short period of rest, a long deferment, mechanical reseeding, or a combination of several practices.

Inquiries regarding equipment, grass seeds, and soil conservation needs should be directed to your office. Personnel of these offices local Soil Conservation Service will be glad to schedule a visit to your farm or ranch to study your individual problem. Every effort will be made to work out a plan that will suit your needs.
