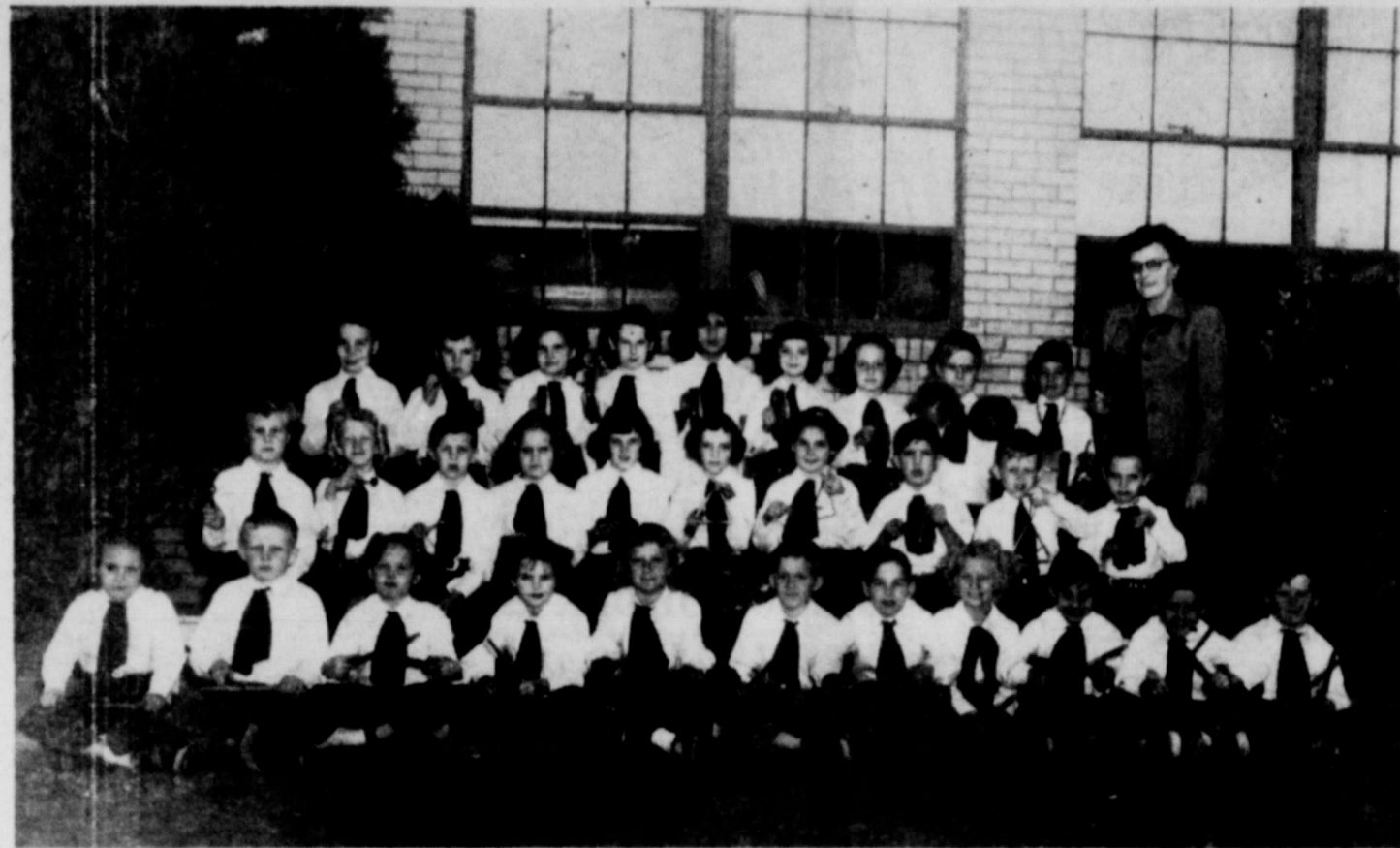

Red Cross Fund Reaches \$637

More than half of the county Red Cross quota has been raised by the east side of Coke county up to Wednesday. H. A. Springer, county chairman of the Red Cross, said that \$637.36 had been turned in to him. He said there

are still a few persons who have not been contacted for their donation and he is hopeful the east side of the county will raise at least \$700.

Other sections of the county have not reported as yet. The county quota is \$1,209 this year and since it is somewhat higher than previously, officials urged everyone who has not done so to contribute just as soon as possible in order that the campaign may be closed.

The Bronte Grade school turned in \$27.50, according to Fund Chairman Mrs. A. S. Whatley. The first, second and sixth grades were 100 per cent, with each child in these grades making a contribution.

BRONTE TEAM PLACES SECOND IN CONTEST

The Bronte FFA judging team placed second in the livestock judging contest held in Alpine last Saturday. The team was high in both sheep and hog judging and Robert Melvin Brown was high point man of the contest in each of these divisions.

J. Lee Ensor was second high point man in the entire contest. Billy Jack Gentry was also on the team and Dean Stephenson was an alternate. He was seventh high man in the judging.

Schools which had teams in the Alpine contest were: Wiley, San Angelo, Del Rio, Alpine, Garden City, Marathon, New Home, Bronte, Iraan, Odessa, Sanderson, Colorado City, Van Horn, Pecos, Ft. Davis, Brownfield, Borden County at Gail, Reagan County at Big Lake, Roscoe, Marfa and Plains.

Odessa was in the number one spot at this contest.

Monday J. T. Henry's judging teams went to Abilene where they entered contests at ACC. Henry said he did not know how they placed, but that they were not in the first ten places, which were announced. There were 96 teams entered in the Abilene contests.

88 Pints of Blood Given to Red Cross

Officials of the Red Cross, the Bloodmobile unit, the City of Bronte and others considered the Red Cross Bloodmobile Unit visit to Bronte last Monday a success in every respect. Of the 142 who signed the pledges, 108 actually came and, in addition, 15 more persons came to the unit who had not signed cards.

There were 123 would-be donors who went through the unit, but on order from the local physicians, Dr. John Harris and Dr. Armond Goldman, thirty-five were not permitted to donate blood. This left a total of 88 pints of blood donated by citizens of Coke County to Civil Defense. The unit went the next day, Tuesday, to San Angelo and a report was given that they collected only 94 pints there.

Those in charge of arrangements wished to make honorable mention to those who offered to give blood but were not permitted to do so. They also expressed appreciation to the men from the Sun Oil Camp at Silver and other industrial groups who cooperated generously.

Elections Scheduled for Saturday and Tuesday

Qualified voters in the city of Bronte and in the Bronte school district are reminded that it is their duty to vote in two important elections coming up Saturday and Tuesday.

SCHOOL ELECTION SAT.

First on the agenda is school trustee election which will be held tomorrow, Saturday, April

4. The names of C. L. Brown, Marvin Corley, Cullen Luttrell, M. D. Stephenson, Bill Looney, and Clark Glenn appear on the ballot. Two will be elected to fill the vacancies created by the expiring terms of C. L. Brown and W. W. Millikin.

Voters will also choose members to the county board of trustees.

In his precinct Noah Pruitt is up for re-election without opposition, while in precinct 4, at Tennyson, L. Y. Harrell is on the ticket for re-election and Otto Finck's name is also on the ballot. W. D. McAdams of Robert Lee is a candidate to succeed himself as member at large.

D. K. Glenn will be the election judge and voting boxes will be placed at four places in the school district for the convenience of voters. Mrs. Frank Keeney will be in charge of the Bronte box; Osmo Black in charge at Oak Creek-Marie; W. T. Green at Tennyson and T. G. Gleghorn at Brookshire.

Qualified voters in the school district include anyone who lives in this school district and who has paid their poll tax, with the exception of those becoming 21 this year, who are entitled to a free vote and those over 60.

Polls will be open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m. at all voting boxes.

Hold over trustees are Dr. John Harris, Mathew Caperton, Sid Evans, Jesse Parker and Aubrey Denman.

CITY ELECTION

Bronte voters will name two city councilmen from four candidates next Tuesday, April 7. H. A. Springer and Sam Spruell are on the ballot to succeed themselves and A. F. Ball and Leonard Fletcher are also seeking the offices.

Voters are urged to remember this date and express their wish in connection with this important election.

D. K. Glenn will also be the presiding judge in this election which will also be held in the City Hall. Holdover councilmen are Paul McGuire, J. B. Mackey, and Joe George Wilkins. The term of Mayor H. O. Whitt also has another year to run.

Qualified voters for this election include those who have lived in the city limits for six months or more and who hold a poll tax receipt or exemption.

Railroad Board Approves Raise In Gas Rates

The Railroad Commission of Texas has approved Lone Star Gas Company's application to increase residential and commercial rates for natural gas service outside the corporate limits of Bronte and in unincorporated towns and communities in the vicinity, according to an announcement by M. L. Bird of Dallas, operating manager for Lone Star's general division of distribution.

The railroad Commission order authorizing the rate adjustment calls for an increase of 13 cents per thousand cubic feet of gas. Mr. Bird said. He pointed out that Lone Star has been granted similar rate adjustments by city councils in Bronte and in more than 240 other incorporated towns in Texas since last September.

Mr. Bird stated that residential and commercial rates charged by Lone Star had not been increased generally within the last twenty-five years, but, conversely, were reduced ten cents per thousand cubic feet in May, 1940. He said the new rate for the unincorporated areas is only three cents per thousand cubic feet higher than the rate charged by Lone Star prior to the 1942 reduction.

The Lone Star operating manager expressed appreciation to the Railroad Commission for "consideration of the gas company application," pointing out that the "new rate makes it possible for us to continue to maintain our high standard of service on the plane desired and expected by our customers."

The Railroad Commission has original jurisdiction of natural gas rates in unincorporated areas and towns in Texas.

until the fall of 1937. I first saw Bronte in the fall of 1896. We had moved from Taylor, Texas to near Ballinger. I moved Uncle Tom Luttrell to Bronte late in the P. M. and unloaded in back of a store building and slept in there. It started raining that night and how it did rain. Bronte was very small at that time—the Post office, drug store in post office and two more stores, I believe.

I have cut feed with a binder where the main business part is. I used to know most everyone there but now a lot of the older ones have passed on.

My father, paid the first \$10 per acre for land near Bronte. He owned 160 acres just west then of the Lowry place and Cedar Mountain where a lot of the oil is. I also owned 340 acres of

the Ash place or Wilkins farm. I am sending a 6-months subscription for The Bronte Enterprise.

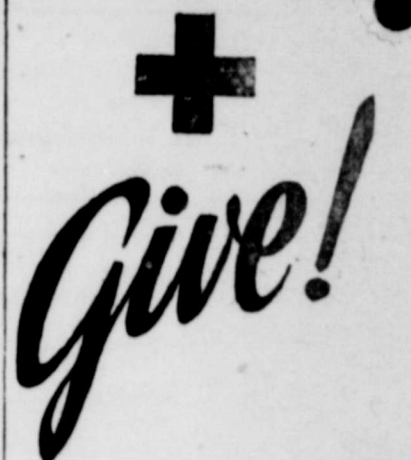
