### Peace Or A Sword

Are we on the road to peace — real peace? That is the major question before all of us.

The Russians have indicated a willingness to settle some of the questions that have kept the Korean War alive. Possibly there will be a Korean truce by the time this appears in print.

Of course, we are ready for a truce on honorable terms. Every American wants to end the Korean fighting at the earliest possible moment. We cannot, however, permit the prospects for a Korean truce to lull us into a false sense of security that will cause us to weaken our defenses.

We must be vigilant — ready to discuss and accept proposals that will lead to real peace, but refusing to let down our guard.

### Our Government Is Strong

Our system of government has weathered all the storms of its history. It is a system resting upon three pillars — a legislative branch that is a deliberative body and not a grand jury; a judiciary that determines the guilt or innocence of those accused of breaking the law; an executive who conducts the business of the United States and its relations with other countries.

Let one wage guerrilla warfare against the others, and our freedoms are weakened. Let one surrender its rights and authority to another and our freedoms are gone.

Whether we be Democrats or Republicans, it will certainly serve none of us as Americans to use tactics of the jungle against our fellow Americans. Still less will it serve us to use those tactics to tear down the great foundations of our government.

We cannot tear down the foundations without pulling down the house itself. If we pull down the house, we will all be buried in the ruins.

### Can We Cut The Budget?

The budget can and should be cut. We must not forget that 87 cents of every Federal dollar goes to pay for past wars, foreign aid, defense, veterans' aid, and interest on the national debt. Even in the field of defense, there is much waste that should be eliminated. But it is hard to make any astronomical cuts out of that 87 cents.

Any saving will be welcomed by the hard-pressed taxpayers. But we are headed for a letdown if we look for "big savings" — savings that will balance the budget — this year.

## Cotton Classing Is Offered Free

The annual Smith-Doxey program is ready for Coke County cotton farmers, H. J. Matejowsky, in charge Abilene Cotton Classing Office, announced this week.

Sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's PMA Cotton Branch, the Smith-Doxey program enable cooperating Cotton Improvement Groups to get their cotton classed without cost. They can also get free market price quotations from which they can gauge local cotton values.

Application forms for the 1953 program can be obtained from the County Agent, Abilene Cotton Classing Office, or local ginners. One application by the Group leader covers all members.

Last year 157 farmers in the County took advantage of these services, Matejowsky said.

Builders tools were stolen from the building site at the Cumbie place. They were the property of Arthur Crockett of Ballinger, who is contractor for the new house. The place was entered through a window on the night of April 11 or 12, Good said.

Crockett's loss amounted to several hundred dollars and he has put up a \$100 reward for their recovery.

Household goods and personal property were stolen from the Higginbotham residence. Mr. and Mrs. Higginbotham were out of town when the theft occurred. Two radios, shoes, a rifle, a floor fan, suit case, some watches and gasoline and oil were among the articles taken.

The third theft occurred three miles south of Robert Lee. A small light plant was taken. It belonged to the contractor who is

doing some work on the highway.

In addition to local officers, Alfred Watts of Archer City, and Sid Johnson of Seminole, special officers for the Hughes Tool Co., are helping to investigate the thefts. They have been in this area for some time working on other theft cases involving material belonging to their firm and think there may be some connection between the cases.

The couple moved to Bronte in 1906 and lived in the Marie community, four miles east of here.

They lived there until Mr. Landers death in August, 1951 when she moved to Abilene.

She was a member of the Baptist church.

She is survived by five daughters, Mrs. Arrant, Mrs. Sam Seay of Bronte, Mrs. Monroe Turner of Wingate, Mrs. Underwood Cope of Norton and Mrs. E. E. Holt of San Benito, Calif.; two sons, A. F. Landers, Jr., of Fort Stockton and Cecil (Billy) Landers of San Angelo; eight grandchildren; nine great grandchildren; two brothers, Henry Clark of Bronte and Emmett Clark of San Angelo and three sisters, Mrs. P. 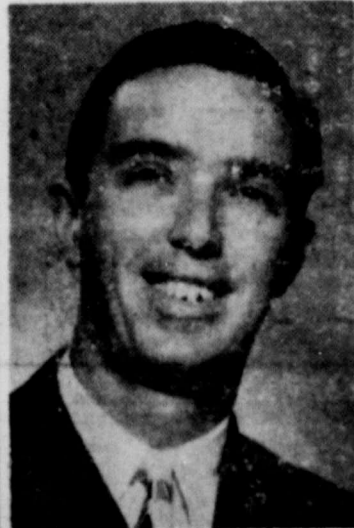
## GLENN T. HURT PROMOTED TO SGT.

## Bronte Bank Robbers Get Seven-Year Terms

The two men who robbed the First National Bank in Bronte of \$8,900 last January 27 were each sentenced to seven years in prison by a Federal Court in Dallas last Friday.

The pair, Scottie Ray Muckelrath, 23, of Cayuga, Texas and Byron Ralph Moore, 24, of East Alton, Ill., pleaded guilty to the armed robbery, which is a federal offense.

Moore and Muckelrath entered the bank on the afternoon of January 27 when there were few people on the streets of Bronte because of a funeral which was being conducted. They tied up Cashier Douglas Sneed and Assistant Cashier Mrs. W. W. Millikin, put them in the bank's vault and escaped with almost \$9,000 dollars.

In their haste they failed to take about \$30,000 which was also in the vault. They also left behind a .38 caliber Smith and Wesson revolver which was later traced to Moore.

After the robbery, the men led officers on a manhunt practically all the way across the United States. They purchased a flashy convertible in Florida and were reported seen in several other places before officers of the FBI and local officers in Las Vegas, Nev., spotted the car in that city.

After a patient wait by officers near the automobile, the two wanted men appeared and were captured. They were returned to Texas where they were identified by Sneed and Mrs. Millikin. After this it was just a matter of time until the two were convicted.

This ends one of the most spectacular stories that has occurred in Bronte in a long time. Excitement was high that windy January afternoon when the robbery occurred, and a person on the streets of Bronte could hear just about any kind of story he wanted to about which way the robbers went, what kind of car they were driving and when they would be caught. Officers of all varieties from many points over this section crowded in here for days. Coffee drinking spaces in local cafes were hard to find for several days as the robbery was discussed.

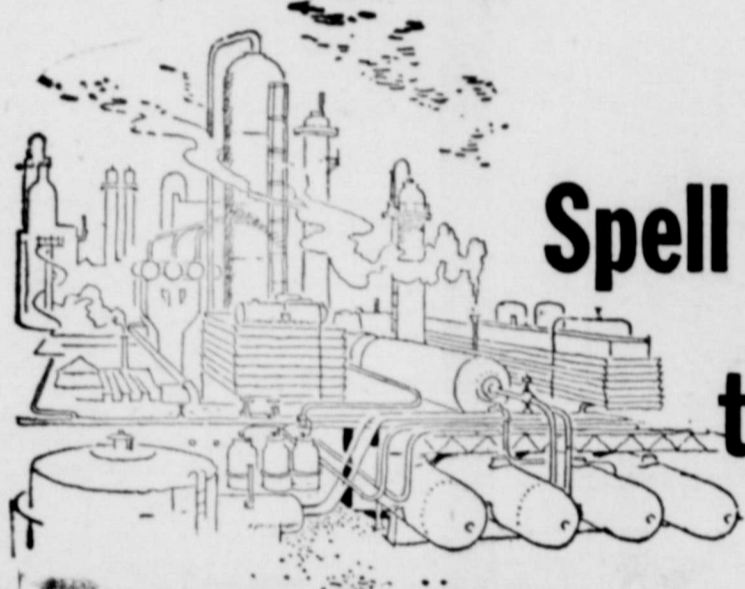

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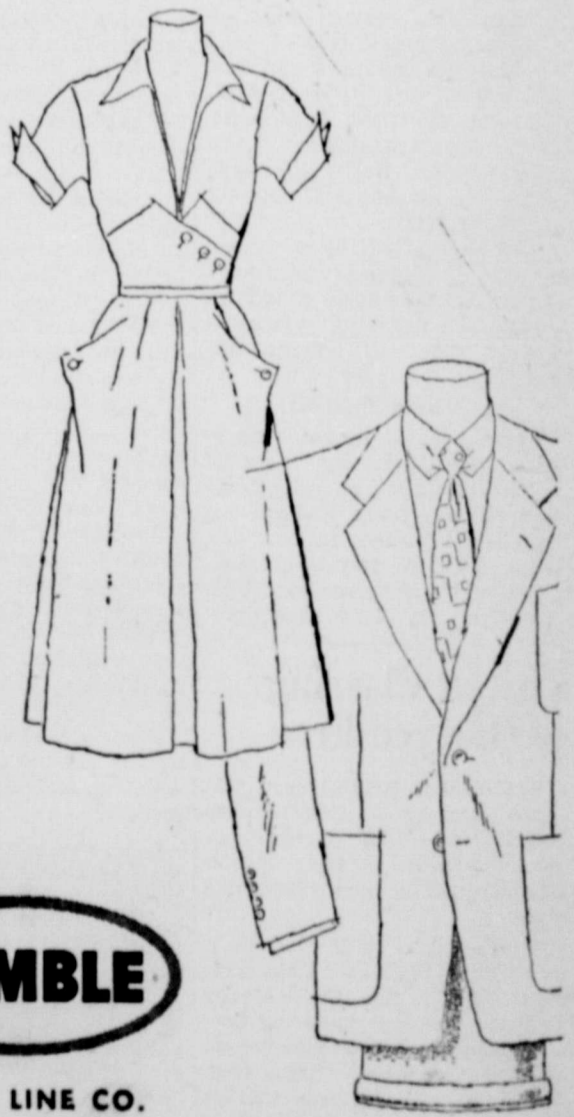
Progress in finding and producing oil is an old story to the oil country. Nearly everybody has heard about the oil industry's day-to-day miracles in exploration and production.

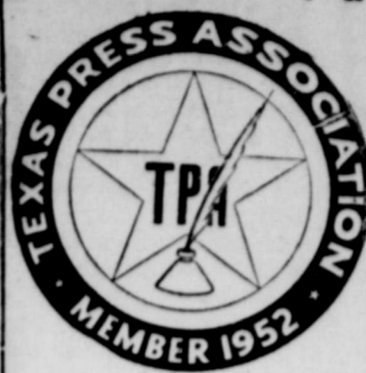

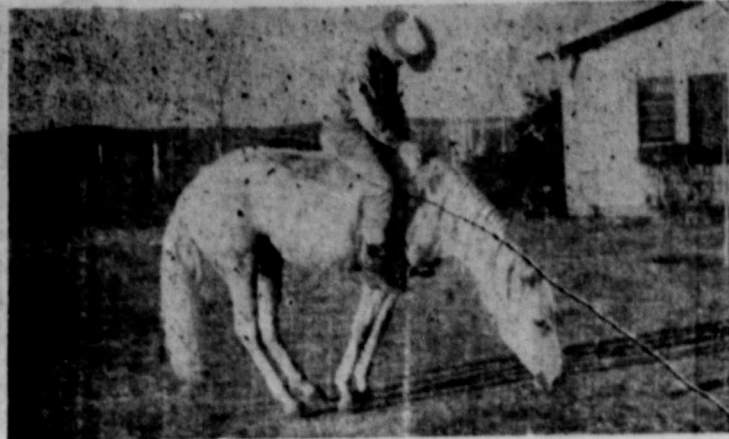

Trouble in the sky

This is a tornado, like the one that struck the town of Eola, Knob, Arkansas, shortly before 7:30 p.m. on March 21, 1952. With a roar like that of an express train, the twister swept through the town. Total 53 homes destroyed, 125 badly damaged out of a total of 512 in the Bald Knob community. 8 people killed, more than 125 injured. In less than an hour, the Red Cross
