The pair, Scottie Ray Muckelrath, 23, of Cayuga, Texas and Byron Ralph Moore, 24, of East Alton, Ill., pleaded guilty to the armed robbery, which is a federal offense.

Moore and Muckelrath entered the bank on the afternoon of January 27 when there were few people on the streets of Bronte because of a funeral which was being conducted. They tied up Cashier Douglas Snead and Assistant Cachier Mrs. W. W. Millikin, put them in the bank's vault and escaped with almost \$9,000

In their haste they failed to take about \$30,000 which was also in the vault. They also left behind a .38 caliber Smith and Wesson revolver which was later traced to Moore.
