Aunt of Local Man Killed in Tornado

Mrs. Annice Brown, aunt of E. L. Coward was killed in the tornado which roared through the business district of Waco late last Monday, according to word received by Mr. Coward last Thursday.

Mrs. Brown's husband, George, is still listed among the missing.

The body of Mrs. Brown was recovered between 3 and 4 o'clock Wednesday morning from a pile of scrap which had been a five-story building housing the R. T. Dennis Furniture Store of which she was an employee.

Mrs. Brown was employed in the upholstery department of the huge furniture store in which more than a score of workers were trapped, most of them losing their lives.

Mr. Brown, who was a retired railroad man, usually called at the store for his wife at closing time. The tornado struck just before closing time and at noon Thursday local relatives had not received any word of the husband. Some of the relatives are awaiting developments in the search for Mr. Brown before making arrangements for the funeral services for Mrs. Brown.

Memorial Program To Be Sponsored By Legion Post

The George Scott Post of the American Legion at Bronte will have a special Memorial Day ceremony at 11 o'clock Saturday, May 30. At that time Mrs. George Scott of Lubbock, formerly of Bronte, will present the flag which was used at her son's funeral to the local Legion Post.

George Scott was killed during World War I, the first man from Bronte to give his life in that conflict, and the Legion Post here was named for him.

In addition to Mrs. Scott, her daughter and Attorney Fred E. Young, of Lubbock, will be present for the ceremonies. Mayor H. O. Whitt will make the acceptance speech for the Legion. Immediately following the presentation, the flag will be raised atop the new flag pole in front of the Legion building.

The public is invited to be present.

Oil News

Kewanee Oil Co. of Tulsa will drill its No. 1-A Wendland, a 5,000-foot rotary wildcat, one location north of F. Kirk Johnson 1 Wendland, a recently-completed upper Cisco sand discovery 5 1/2 miles southwest of Bronte. Operations on the project will begin when permit is approved.

Location on an 85-acre tract, is 330 feet from the northwest and southwest lines of the southwest half of 455-F Merkel survey, Abst. 516.

Johnson 1 Wendland was finished recently for a daily flowing potential of 95 barrels of 40 gravity oil with gas-oil ratio of 250-1. Production was through a 14-64th-inch choke from open hole between 3,691 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, and total depth of 3,695 feet. Tubing pressure was 250 pounds and casing pressure was 400 pounds. Top of the Cisco sand was picked at 3,691 feet on kelly bushing elevation.

The Kewanee test is four miles west and slightly south of the Bronte (multipay) field, and 3 3/4 miles south-southeast of the McCutchen field which produces from the Cisco at an average depth of 3,975 feet.

Inca Drilling Co. of Abilene has filed application to drill a 4,000-foot rotary wildcat, its 1 Wilson Estate, in northern Coke County, four miles southwest of Blackwell. Operations are scheduled to start June 1. Location is on a 200-acre tract, 2,550 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 277-1A-H&T.

Lion Oil Co. No. 2 Edward, 1/4 mile north of the Ellenburger discovery in the North Bronte field, recovered 948 feet of 43.6 gravity oil on a one-hour test between 5,786-95 feet.

Lion 6 Mary, west stepout to the North Bronte field, recovered 180 feet of salt water and 60 feet of salt water-cut mud with trace of oil on a 90-minute drillstem test between 5,253-365 feet.

The project is drilling ahead.

Oak Creek Water Flows Into Bronte Reservoir

Oak Creek water flowed into Bronte Tuesday night and a good crowd was on hand to witness the sight.

Up to Thursday, however, officials had been unable to get any of the precious fluid into the standpipe, but they were hopeful that it would be there by Thursday night or Friday morning.

The holdup has been caused by some leaks in the reservoir here in town. Contractor has had

men working on them since they first showed up when the water started flowing into the tank. Mayor H. O. Whitt said Thursday that the delay in getting the water from Oak Creek to Bronte was brought about by the intake pipe silting over. It took about two days for the collection of dirt, etc., to be blown out of the pipe.

The lake north of here is estimated to have 10,000 acre feet of water and one report said that

water is standing 19 feet above Bronte's lower intake pipe. Local residents will be mighty glad to see the Oak Creek water in the mains as the water from the city lake east of town has been muddy and unfit for most domestic uses.

Most folks around Bronte have been up to Oak Creek Lake numerous times the past several days, since the rains started last week. Up to seven inches of moisture has fallen on the Oak Creek watershed bringing the rises which have filled the lake more than most observers were expecting.
