A well equipped farm shop needs at least 2 electric drills, Schwaller believes. He has a small one that may be held in one hand like a pistol, the story in the nationally circulated farm magazine points out. It will take bits up to five sixteenth of an inch. For heavier jobs, Schwaller has a larger drill, but it lacks the convenience of handling that the smaller one has.

Sheriff Garland Brown, investigating the death, said a stool found overturned on the bed was believed to have been used by the boy to reach the rafter. He said the boy apparently was unable to hold tothe rafter long enought to free himself from the noose.

Investigators said the boy had been dead about an hour when discovered by his father. Mrs. Hankins, owner of the home, 5 miles northeatst of Hart, was away at the time of the accident.
