DO AWAY WITH all organizations and the world would be a sorry place to live in. Very few people, for instance, would receive an education. A school with its principal, its dean, its trained teachers, its regular hours, regular curriculum, system of discipline is a highly organized institution.

Forbid organizations and your health will suffer also, because right away you erase the hospital, the orphanage, the old people's home. Your life will become insecure because you remove the police force, the fire department, the bureau of sanitation. You would even miss much of your entertainment if you suppressed organizations. Hollywood, the radio, your daily newspaper, the theatre are all efficiently organized.

When you want to honor a distinguished visitor to your town, you form a welcoming organization—a committee, a chairman. Without such an organization, your visitor might not be greeted at the station, might have difficulty getting a lodging for the night, would not be called upon to make a speech. And he wouldn't like it either.

Catholics believe that religion is a school. God has told us many things that people are obliged to learn. Why then should religion not be organized as well as our secular schools? Besides, religion must promote any number of good causes—right living, family preservation, brotherly love and a host of others. If people organize merely to promote humane treatment of animals, why shouldn't religion

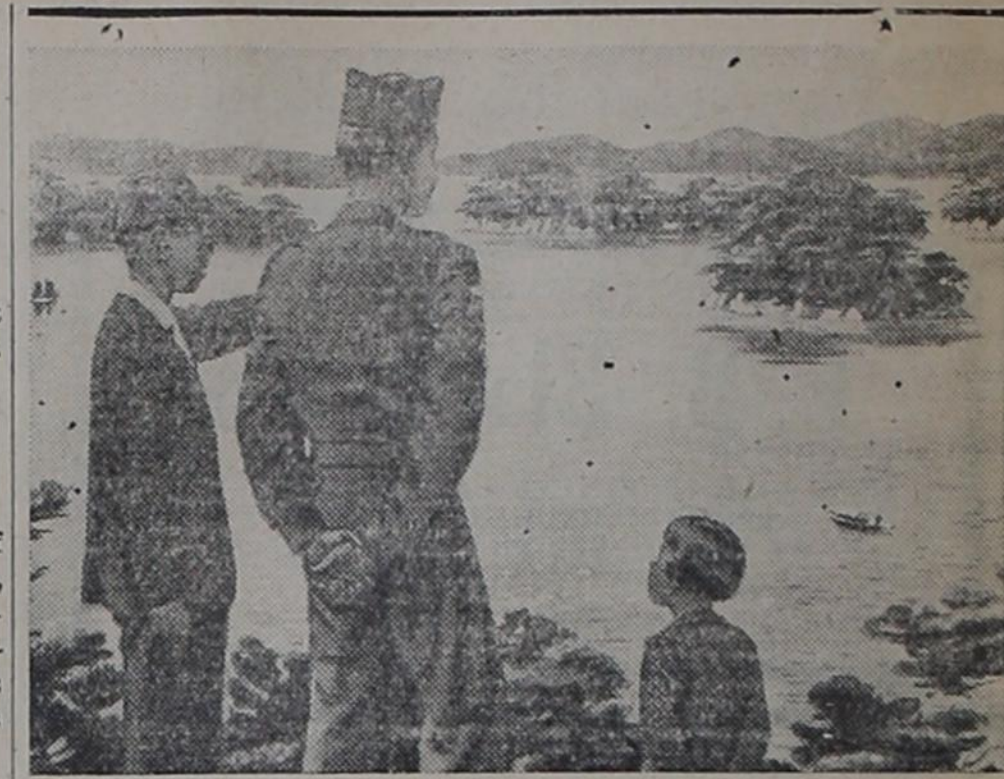

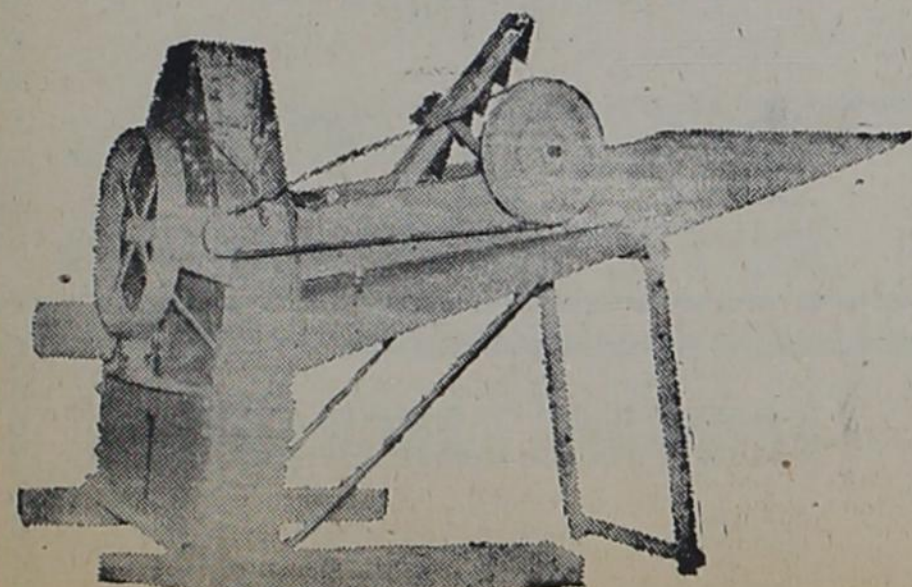
