Flag Presented to George Scott Post

In an impressive and beautiful ceremony Saturday morning at the Legion Hall, a gold star mother presented the flag which draped the casket of her son, to the local legion post. The presentation was made by Mrs. G. R. Scott of Lubbock. Her son, George Scott, was the first man from Bronte to give his life in World War I and the local legion post is named in his honor.

Attorney Fred Young of Lubbock made the presentation address, saying that he knew of no precedent where a gold star mother had given her son's flag to the Legion Post named in his honor. He said he thought it would be a noble gesture for more gold star mothers to follow Mrs. Scott's example.

Mayor H. O. Whitt made the acceptance speech for the George Scott Post and pledged the members to building a continuation of those freedoms for which George

Scott gave his life. Whitt urged Americans to turn to God and put their faith in Him with the same willingness which they are spending billions of dollars to build atom bombs, airplanes and other weapons of destruction.

"When I take a last look at this nation's flag may it not be over the broken fragments of a land filled with civil strife or a world drenched with blood," said the Mayor. "I want to see the gorgeous banner of a glorious republic honored and respected throughout the world and see emblazoned there the words 'liberty and freedom now and forever'" he said.

The body of George Scott was brought home for burial in 1921. He was killed Oct. 8, 1919, in the Argonne Forest battle by a German sniper. Hubert A. Hayley of Lufkin, but then from Bronte, was one of the first to reach him after he was hit. Hayley was present for the first interment in Europe, as well as for the second at Lubbock in 1921.

C. R. Smith & Co. Busy Remodeling

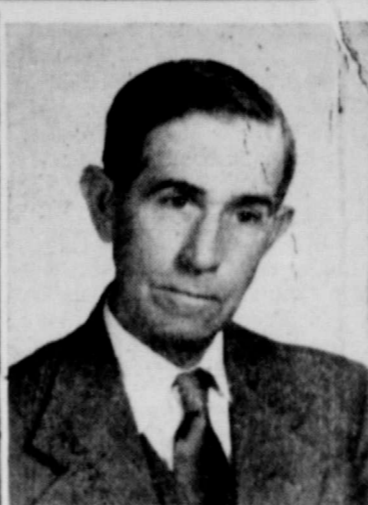
Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Smith have moved their stock of dry goods to the building just vacated by the Bronte Pharmacy and have started remodeling their store.

The public is invited to inspect Bronte's new filter plant and pumping station in the north part of town Sunday from 2 to 5 p. m. Water Supt. Otis Smith announced Wednesday.

Smith said "This plant is something that everybody in Bronte

should be proud of and I feel that most of the people here would like to see it."

The equipment in the filtering plant is of the very latest type, the water superintendent said. The contractors were scheduled to complete their work here Wednesday and it is expected that they will turn the job, including the filter plant, pipeline and pump station over to the UCRA in the near future.

Smith said that samples from over the water works system will be sent in to the State Health Department within the next few days and that city officials are hopeful that the reports will be good. He stated that most of the mains in town have been flushed out since Oak Creek water started coming into the system and that the water should be in good condition.

Bronte water users will have their bills raised starting with June, to \$4.00 per month minimum with a 25 cents per thousand excess rate. The first bills to show the new rate will be sent out July 1.

YOUR SENATOR REPORTS

VA CUTS: Many Texas servicemen are writing me to protest a proposed cut in appropriations for Veterans Administration. The President's budget calls for a reduction of over

\$275,000,000 in VA appropriations.

Veterans hospitals even now are having to let beds stand unused because of lack of funds. Congressman Olin Teague of College Station has compiled figures showing that the 38 VA hospitals in the country are financially unable to use 2,393 of their beds. And 24,834 veterans approved for admission to VA hospitals can't get in because no beds are available. The hospital at Houston has 252 unused beds, that at McKinney 26.

I do not see how anybody can justify neglect of our ex-servicemen.

DEFENSE: Can we get more defense for less money? Will 120 air wings give us more defense than 143 wings? Secretary of Defense Wilson says so, in defending the proposed cut of over five billion dollars in Air Force appropriations.

Some of us are going to examine the reductions very carefully.

WHAT'S AHEAD? — Proposals have been made to increase interest rates charged REA cooperatives on Government loans.

Chances of extending excess profits tax beyond June 30, as requested by the President, looks slimmer every day.

Some of Texas' surplus wheat will be shipped to Pakistan if Congress approves the President's proposal to lend that country a million bushels, payment to be made later.

Expect the doctors' draft law to be extended, with some easing up on those who have as much as 12 months of military service.

Majors Field near Greenville and Galveston Air Force Base are victims of the policy of cutting down the Air Force.

BRICKER AMENDMENT: I have as yet taken no definite stand on the Bricker Amendment. I support its aims and principles, as they are generally understood. The amendment is now being revised in Committee. It is not yet clear what the amendment's final form will be.
