### **New Trial Granted** In Trimble Case

Judge Joe L. Mays Wednesday granted a new trial in the Jack Trimble damage suit which was recently heard in Robert Lee, in a week long suit that was one of the hardest fought

cases in Coke County history. Trimble was seeking \$438,000 damages from E. P. Dannelley of San Angelo, as a result of injuries received in a car-pickup collision. The jury at the first

trial, denied Trimble camages. Attorneys for the plaintiff laimed jury misconduct as their

pasis for a new trial. At Wednesday's hearing Marvin Hanz, attorney for Trimble, alleged that:

1. Issues submitted precluded the jury from considering evidence as to the speed of Dannelley's vehicle except at the instance of impact. Hanz said the plaintiff had based much of his case on the speed of the car be-

fore the brakes were applied. 2. Two jurors who went to the scene of the accident to reconstruct speed and stops discussed their findings during delibera-

tions and during a jury recess. 3. The jurors considered evidence they were not instructed 220 Lasalle street in San Angelo. to consider. The San Angelo attorney contended that the jurof highway patrolman that Trimole was in violation of the law when he crossed the highway.

"A number of jurors said the decision would have been different had they considered the speed before the accident and not considered testimony of the patrolman." Hanz said.

4. When a dispute arose over the word "immediately", one of the jurors went home and referred to a dictionary for a definition, as well as asking the opinion of a librarian.

5. There is newly-discovered evidence as to the speed of Dannelley's vehicle.

Judge Mays said the new trial will be subject to call after civil jury week begins in August.

Hanz and Jerome Pope of Odessa were attorneys for the plaintiff and Don Case and Henry Strasburger of Dallas and B. W. Smith of San Angelo repre-

sented the defendant. Eleven of the jurors who served at the trial, testified at the Wednesday hearing.
