Oak Creek Lake $\frac{1}{4}$ Full; City Is Recovering from Damage

Officials of the City of Sweetwater reported this week that Oak Creek Lake, northeast of here, is about 25 per cent full. City Manager Henry Nabors said that the lake, from which Bronte gets its water supply, contains 12,800 acre feet. The lake has an authorized capacity of 50,000 acre feet.

Water Supt. Otis Smith reported last week after the rains that water is now up over Bronte's second intake pipe. He estimated that the rains brought the lake up some eight to ten feet.

The watershed which feeds the lake received good rains last Tuesday night and Wednesday, at the same time Bronte was flooded with 12 inches and more. Citizens of Bronte are still cleaning up from the flood which put water in practically every business house in town and in scores of residences.

Results of the flood can still be seen everywhere. Water marks on walls of residences are plainly visible. Large piles of gravel can be seen scattered in

most all the streets here. Best result, however, is that one can dig in the ground anywhere and find it damp enough to sprout a seed.

Losses in the flood were heavy for some folks, but most everybody seems to think the benefits of the moisture will more than offset the damage done.

COUNTY AGENT COLUMN

The Coke County Advisory Committee met at the County Agent's office recently for the purpose of discussing Extension work in this county. Discussions centered around economic factors affecting the livelihood of the average small farmer and rancher. Notwithstanding the drought and all other conditions that affect farmers, they need to adjust their living to meet these conditions, it was decided by the group, rather than waiting for the condition to change.

A long range program was formulated by the committee with emphasis on encouraging farmer-ranchers to plan more home production, most especially those products which contribute to family living such as:

Poultry. Each should have 30 to 300 fowls, enough good hens for eggs, broilers and fryers for home use and turkeys where applicable.

Dairy Cows. Enough good cows to provide milk and butter for family use, with some to spare, on a year-round basis and, if applicable, enough dairy cows to sell cream or milk.

Swine. Enough pigs for home consumption and, where applicable, one brood sow per farm.

Crops. A balanced farm crop rotation that should under normal conditions provide for the above livestock and poultry, and in time of surplus production, to provide for silage storage of green forage.

The second point in the long range plan to recognition of outstanding farmers who have made progress in carrying out the program by aiding them in securing the best in poultry, livestock and seed, by encouraging proper use of fertilizers and crop rotation by encouraging and promoting community enterprise including social gatherings, contest, etc., and by carrying the story of a balanced farm program to these community groups.

4-H CLUB WORK

The Advisory Committee, the commissioners, bankers, business men all approved the coordination of 4-H club work with the adult program. That is, the teaching through demonstrations and other means the advantages of a balanced program.

They pointed out that 4-H boys should learn to operate their demonstrations on a profitable basis regardless of prizes that may be won. In so doing they will have instilled into their minds the idea that farm and ranch life can be profitable and worth while.

The Committee and others are taking a realistic view of the future in that they are looking for a leveling off process in prices of farm products. With all the modern conveniences on the farms at the present time, the farm family has opportunity to enjoy every advantage to be found anywhere.

RED CROSS AIDS 18 FAMILIES

Jerome R. Oslund, field representative for the American Red Cross reported Thursday that 18 families received Red Cross aid as a result of the flood which swept through the town last week.

Oslund said that a total of \$637.35 was given to the 18 families. Expenses connected with administering the aid totaled \$9,94, making the entire project cost the Red Cross \$647.29. A \$1,000 contribution was received from the National Red Cross and the remaining \$352.71 is being returned.

Oslund said that \$94.40 was spent for clothing; \$16.00 for building and repair; and \$526.95 for household furnishings, mostly floor coverings.

Twenty-five persons applied for Red Cross aid. Of this number, three withdrew their applications, and investigations showed that four could recover from flood damage without undue hardship, leaving 18 who were helped.

Only one person was injured, due to the flood Oslund's report shows. One hundred residences were damaged and 30 other buildings showed results of flood water, he said.

Three volunteer nurses worked one day, the report shows, and four other persons volunteered their services to the Red Cross for seven days. One paid nurse worked one day and one paid worker put in seven days.

NEW P. O. HOURS SEPTEMBER 1

New post office hours will go into effect next Tuesday, September 1, according to Mrs. Carrie G. Williams, local post master. New hours will be from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m. instead of the hours of 7 a. m. to 4 p. m. which have been in effect for several years.

Mrs. Williams said the new hours were being instituted to better accommodate post office patrons, particularly those who work out from town and are unable to get to the post office earlier in the afternoon.

A new schedule will also be observed on the rural routes. They will leave here at 9 a. m. instead of 8 a. m. as formerly.

Telephone Girls Have It Hard

Telephone operators at the Bronte exchange had a pretty rough time of it last Wednesday and Thursday. An unprecedented number of long distance calls came into the local switchboard from persons seeking to find out if their relatives and friends had suffered damage from the flood waters.

To top it all off, most of the operators over the country are on strike and the switchboards being operated by men. Men just don't know how to operate a telephone switchboard, the local ladies say. They can't remember the numbers and are slow and inexperienced.

The operators here have done their job in connection with the flood calls, but they're still having to put up with the men at the other exchanges.

Supt. J. L. Carroll said that the faculty is complete with the exception of the vacancy created by the resignation of head coach H. A. Jolley Wednesday.

Filling the vacancy caused by the resignation of High School Principal W. N. Gaddy will be Algie Lee Durbin, who has been principal at Balmorhea the past three years. He is a graduate of Abilene Christian College and has a master's degree from Hardin Simmons University. Durbin is married and has a small son. They will move into the house in which H. A. Jolley and his family have been living.

Thomas Knox of Mason has been elected band director for the school. He is a graduate of Sul Ross College where he studied band. He is single and will replace Vershel Smith, who has gone to Grand Falls as band director.

Mrs. H. A. Springer, who is well known here, has been elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. Bob Mayo.

Carroll reported that the athletic field house is nearing completion and that officials hope it will be ready for use by the time school starts. The new drainage system for the school has been completed. Lots of painting has been done and other improvements made during the summer. The superintendent said that the school plant is in good shape and that they are looking forward to a successful year.

So far as could be learned when The Enterprise went to press, school officials were contacting a number of prospects and said that they hoped to have the position filled by the time school starts, although they stated that it would be no easy job.

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




