On the day of the gigantic state-wide campaign, J. Walter Hammond, state president, stressed the need for a stronger state Farm Bureau in a letter sent to all county Farm Bureau officials.

"The people engaged in farming and ranching have a great responsibility facing them this year," he declared. "This is a year of decision. Farmers must decide what policies we want incorporated into the national farm program, and then must decide who shall speak for farmers."

Oil News

John J. Eisner of San Angelo has filed application to drill a 6,400-foot rotary project 3/4-mile east of Bronte (Ellenburger) field opener. It will be his No. 1 Mrs. Ruth A. Spencer.

Location will be 660 feet from south and 330 feet from east lines of 364-1A-H&TC, on a 106.6 acre lease. Drilling will start immediately. Elevation is 1,924 feet, ground level.

The opener, Lion 1 Edward, was completed March 6 for a daily flowing potential of 265.60 barrels of 49 gravity oil thru a 10-64 inch choke and perforations between 5,760-665 feet.

F. Kirk Johnson of Fort Worth has filed application to drill his 2 H. G. Wendland as a 1 1/8-mile southwest outpost to production in the two well Wend Kirk (Clasco) field, four miles southwest of here. Rotary drilling to 4,000 feet will begin immediately.

Location on a 364.38 acre tract, is 1,000 feet from the southwest and 330 feet from the southeast lines of 546-Erdmann Girke, abstract 160.

The Rawlings 4100 field gained its second producer and a 3/4-mile north extension with the dual completion of Humble 6-C Butner from the upper Canyon.

It was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 110.44 barrels of 44-gravity oil plus two-tenths of 1 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 507-1. Production was through a 16-64 inch choke and perforations between 4,106-30 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing cemented at 4,481 feet on total depth of 4,551 feet. Top of pay was picked at 4,106 feet on estimated elevation of 1,89 feet. Pay section was acidized with 500 gallons.

Location is in 397-1A-H&TC. The well was finalized in the Rawlings 4500 field (Palo Pinto) August 2, for a daily flowing potential of 119.03 barrels of 44.1 gravity oil, plus four-tenths of 1 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 294-1. Production was from between 4,481-551 feet. Top of pay was picked at 4,481 feet on elevation of 1,892 feet.

Locations spotted in this area recently are Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 13 Irene Morrow, 330 gravity oil plus 86.84 barrels of 999 feet from the northeast lines J. M. Lindley survey 25; 5,600 foot with rotary. Ft. Chadbourne Field.

Also in the Ft. Chadbourne field, Humble Oil & Refining Co. 85 Sallie Odum, 9,570 feet from south line and 7,558 feet from the east line F. Sosa survey 302; 5,700 foot-rotary.

A 5,000 foot rotary wildcat will be Kewanee Oil Co. 1-B Wend, 330 feet from northwest lines and 971.4 feet from the northeast line, Thos. Hennessy survey 1.

The Fort Chadbourne Field has been extended 3/4-mile on the west side with the completion of Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. 1 Thos. W. Smith for a daily pumping potential of 25.05 barrels of 45-pne souj psequinos api worj 1099 water, with gas-oil ratio of 373-1.

Production was through perforations between 5,552-58 feet and 5,563-70 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing cemented at 5,610 feet, the total depth. Plugged back total depth is 5,591 feet. Top of pay was picked at 5,550 on derrick floor elevation of 2,061 feet.

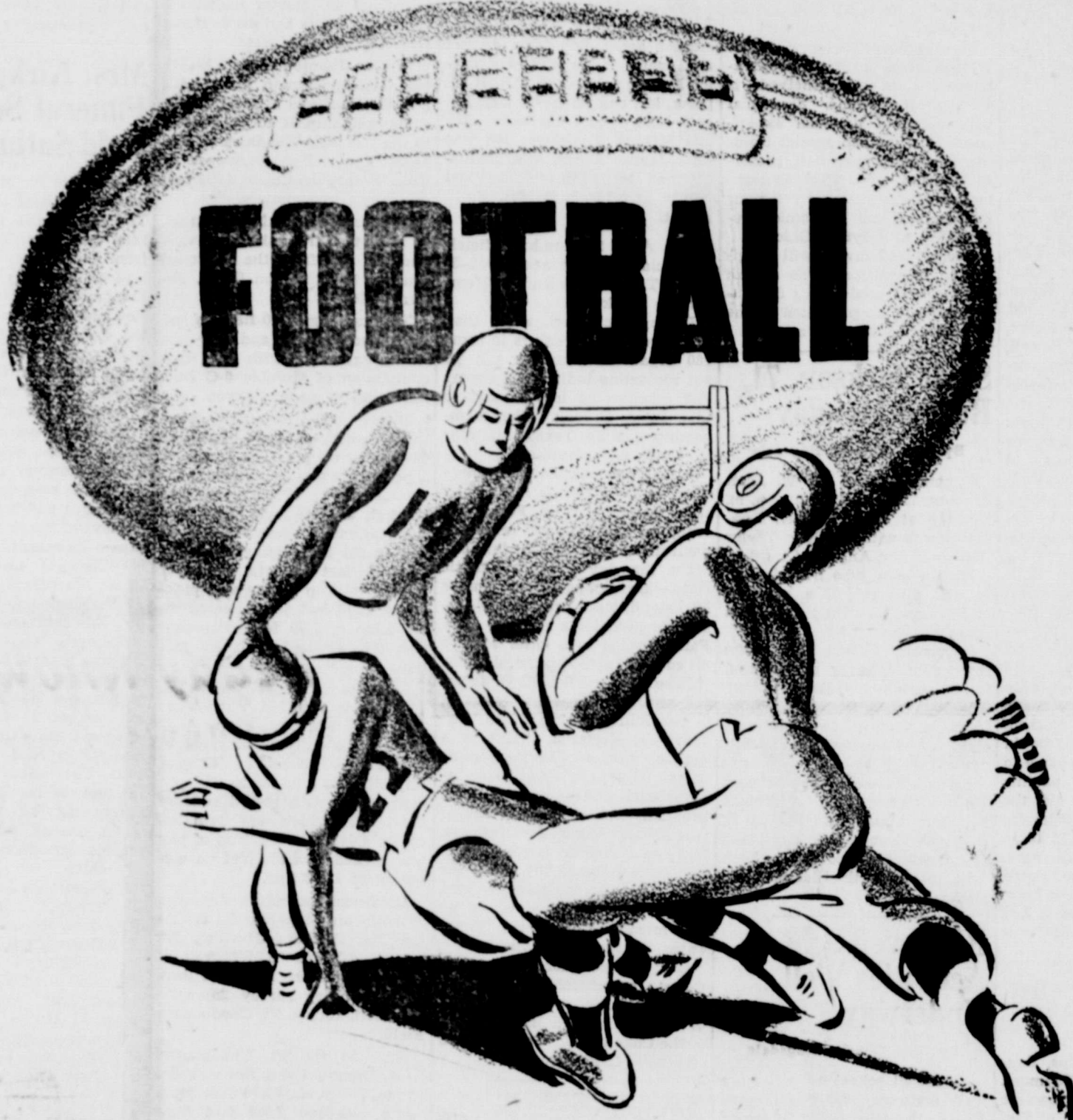

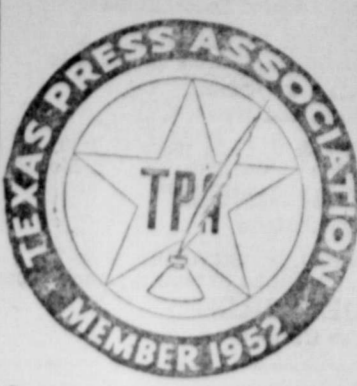
Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Bruton are about to get settled in their house on the highway. They are completely remodeling the house and said Wednesday that they are about through with the job.

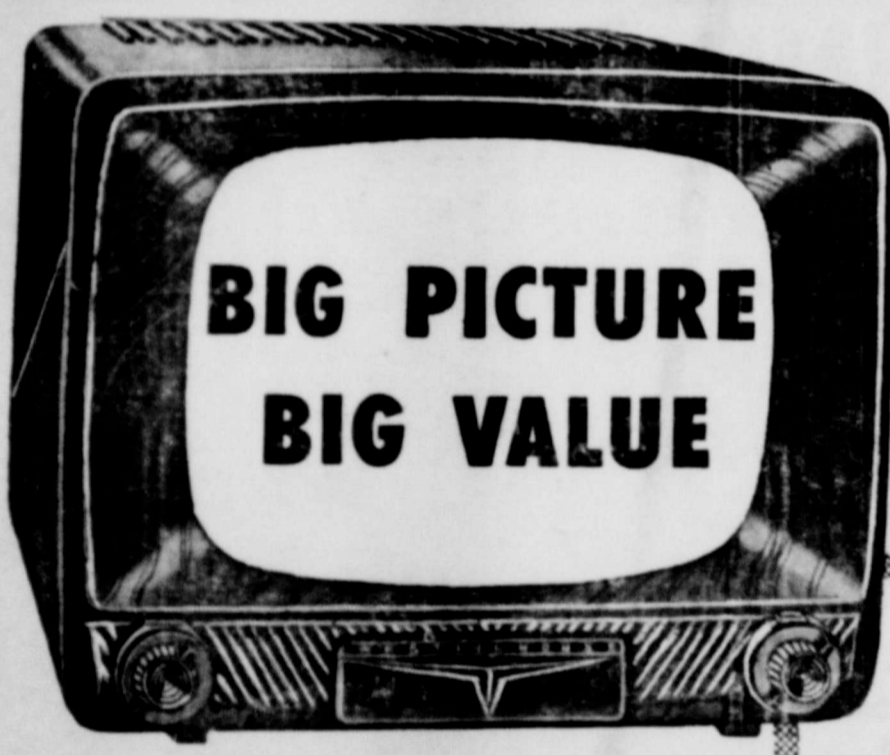
