Hobbs Falls to Power Of Local Lads, 14-6

Bronte Longhorns won another game Friday night from the Panthers of Hobbs by a score of 14-6. Played at Hobbs, after the Longhorns scored first, their lead, though slim, was never threatened.

First Longhorn score and the first of the ballgame came in the second period after Hobbs had a punt blocked. The Longhorns then took over on the 33-yard line. The local boys took six plays to score, with Denton carrying it over from the 2 for the tally. Arbie Phillips ran the extra point to make the score 7-0.

For the rest of the half and the third quarter, the Longhorns and Panthers played tight football holding each other scoreless.

The Bronte team came back in the fourth period to score their final touchdown of the night. The Longhorns drove 17 yards for the score after Kenneth Scott recovered a Hobbs fumble. The Longhorns had to make two TDs before one counted. The last one went on a pass from Stevenson to Johnny Smith from the Hobbs 9. Stevenson then passed to Harold Denton for the extra point to make the score 14-0.

Hobbs made their last bid in the fading minutes of the game. Their score came on a ten yard pass from Cavitt to Hardin for the touchdown. Cavitt tried to run the conversion, but was stopped to make the final score 14-6.

The Longhorns outclassed the Panthers in first downs 10 to 5. The Longhorns threw 6 passes and completed 4 for 64 yards while Hobbs threw 11 passes and completed 5 for 107 yards. The Longhorns gained 264 yards rushing to 39 for Hobbs.

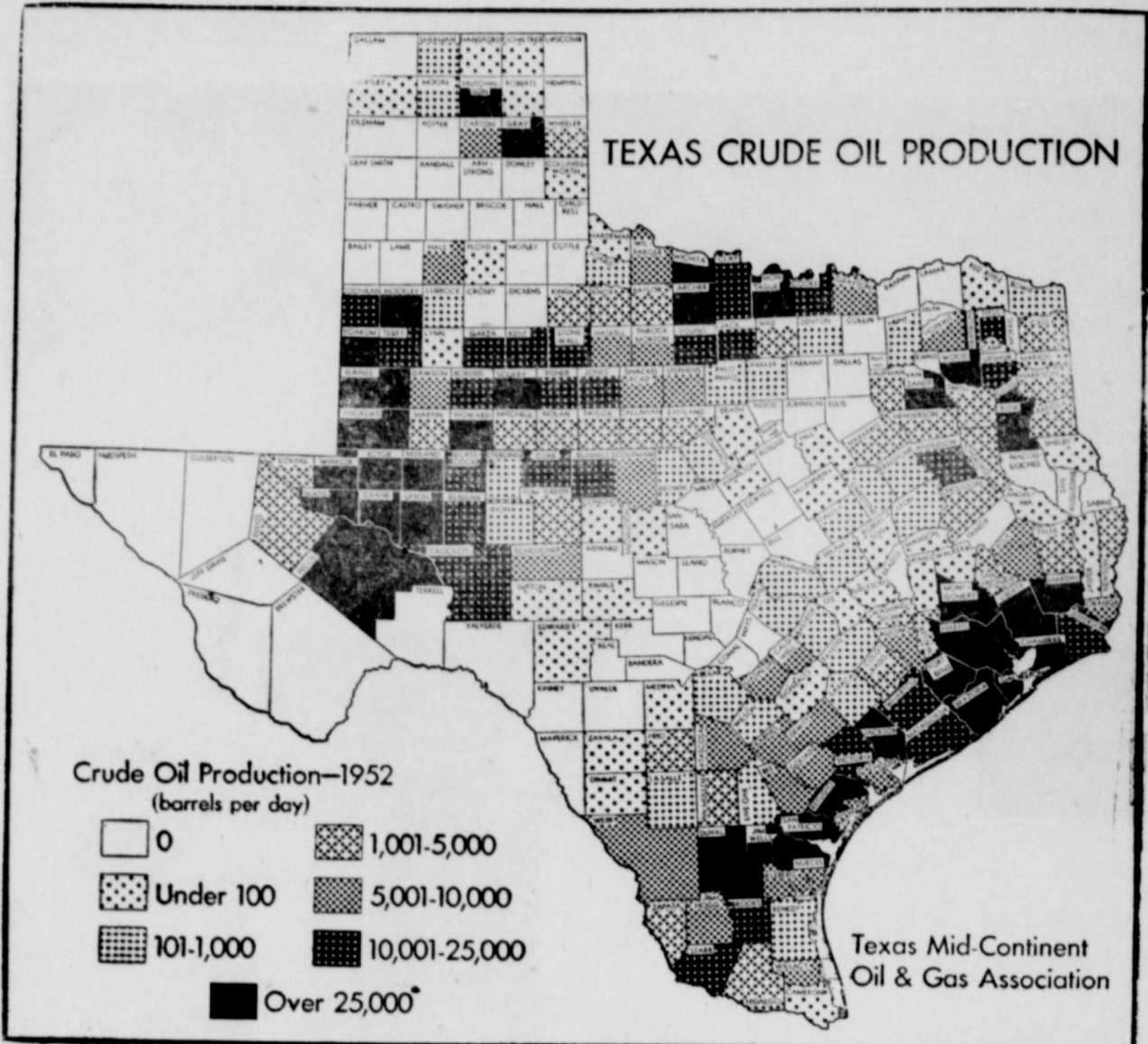

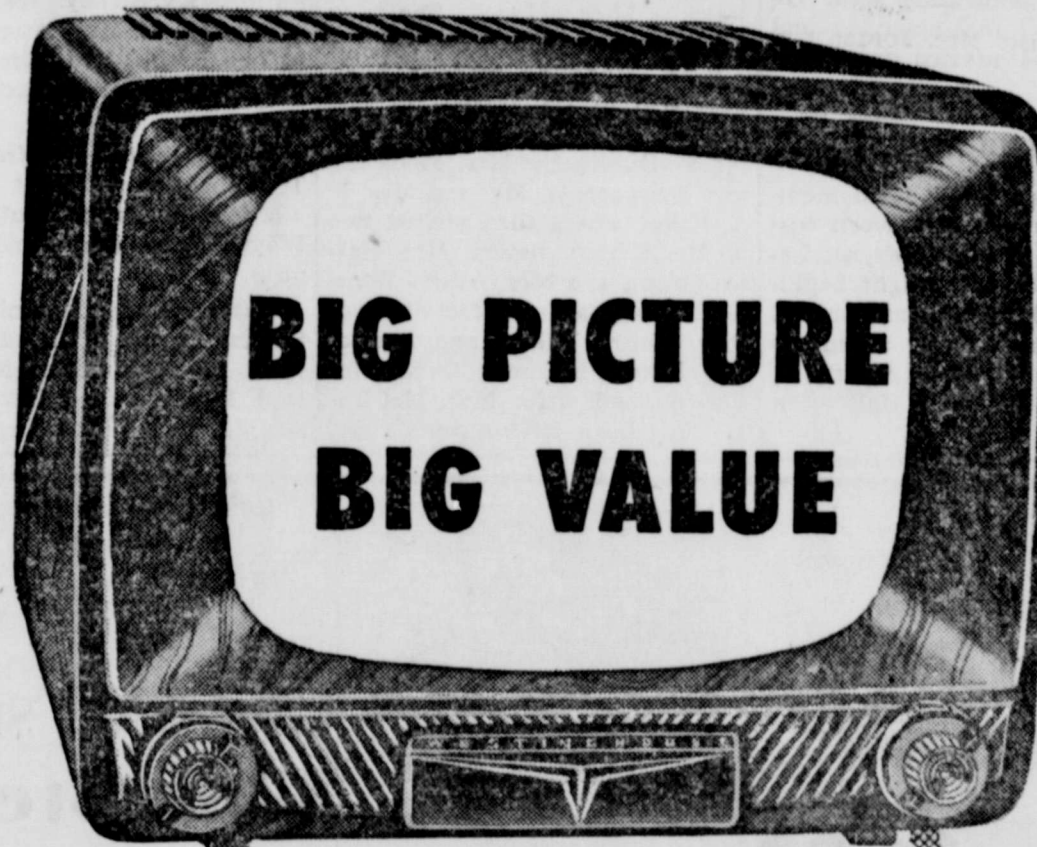

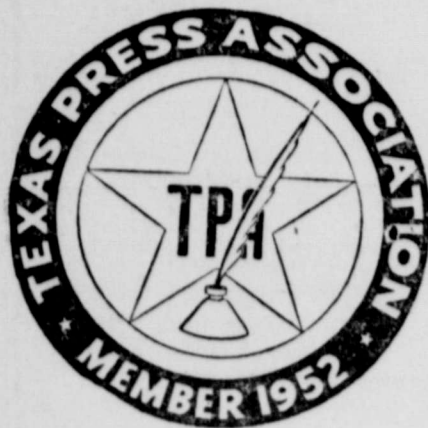
