Health Dept. Finds 115 Cases Rabies in Month
AUSTIN, TEXAS - Posttive evidence of rabies infection was discovered in 115 animal heads autopsied by State Health Department laboratories in Austin during the past month, the
partment announced today
By species, positive heads included 104 dogs, 4 cats, 3 skunks,
cows and 2 calves. Heads from 27 counties made up last month's tabulation. Harris County was high with 73 subAustin, Brazoria, Caldwell, Col lin, Comal, Fort Bend, Guadalupe, Harrison, Houston, Leon Liberty, Matagorda, Red River, Rusk, Tarrant, Travis, Washington and Wood with one submission each.
Brazos, Cameron, Maverick, and Webb Counties submitted 2 heads each, and Bexar and Jefferson turned in 3 apiece. Waller County submitted 4, while Dallas had 6.
The tabulation was made in a regular morithly rabies report, a departmental public service which shows rabies incidence throughout the state. It lists the species involved and gives the date and county of occurence.
Meanwhile, state laboratory officials are still surveying insecteating bats for rabies infection. A total of 105 of the fiying mammals have been checked so far with negative results in each instance. The study began two became suspicious that bats here tofore thought to be entirely ben eficial might be harboring the deadly rabies virus.

## Highlights and Sidelights from Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas - Liberals and conservatives apparently agreed on one thing: Texas is in no

danger of becoming a republican tate.
Governor Allan Shivers told reporters that "Texas is an overwhelmingly Democratic State and, in my opinion, will be that way for a long time to come.' Shivers, of course, is bitterly opposed to the liberal Denocrats who stuck with Adai Stevenson last year. The Governor led the ful Eisenhower campaign.
ul Eisenhower campaign. viewed recent elections around viewed recent elections around the party fold."
A typical comment was that of Congressman Homer Thornberry, who said that while he didn't consider the Democratic victories a reflection on the president, he did see "a trend away from the Republicans and a feeling that they are not performing on their promises."
One point of contention between the liberals and the conservatives is the matter of states' rights.
Shivers established his viewpoint on the subject at a session southern governors in Hot Springs, Va.
"We have allowed ourselves to be bribed with our own money," the governor said, adding: "The matching dollar vith strings attached has carried the federal government into nearly every phase of state activity.

Prospective candidates for the governorship of Texas still are waiting for Shivers to make up his mind. Their places hinge on his decision. It presents a pecu-
liar case of the political fortunes
of many men hinging on the decision of one. He refuses to be counted in or out of the picture. Many who might run wonder whether they would be respected more for making up their own minds, rather than waiting for the govenor to decide for them. At the Virginia meeting, Shivers was asked whether he might run for the U. S. Senate against Lyndon Johnson.
Shivers responded that he hadn't any idea of running for anything right now, but "don't construe that as saying that I would not be a candidate for the Senate."
Mayor Roy Hofheinz of Houston was one of the many who sat waiting for Shivers.
He told reporters that he does not intend to run for governor if Shivers is a candidate for reelection.
Did that mean that he would run for governor if Shivers is not a candidate?
Mayor Hofheinz did not say. Another man who ha thoughts of politics in his mind
was Congressman Lloyd M. Bent sen Jr. Here is a newspaper's comment on the occasion of his visit to Austin to address the junior chamber of commerce:
"Bentsen's plans for next year have provided one of the state's best political guessing games. To dote he " o say.
Our guess is that Bentsen will not say until he hears what Shivers is going to do.
