Blackwell To Get Oak Creek Water

Mail Packages **Early To Insure Delivery**. By Xmas

Bronte Postmaster, Mrs. Carrie G. Williams, issued her annual appeal this week for correct addressing and early mailing of Christmas greetings and gifts.

Time for mailing Christmas gifts overseas has already passed, Mrs. Williams said, and packages destined for distant points in the United States should already have been mailed. Christmas gifts going by parcel post to nearby points should be in the mail as coon as possible.

Christmas cards for out of the state should be deposited in the post office by Dec. 15. Mrs. Williams said that in order for cards to be delivered promptly they should have a 3-cent stamp, so they will go first class. Also, she added that a return address may be placed on first class mail, so that they will be returned if not




However, Christmas cards may be sent for 2 cents but are classed as third-class mail and will not be handled as promptly as first class.

Old wethers recalled this tragic day when the cashed at \$7 to \$10, and old infamous Jap attack took place bucks drew \$3 to \$4. in various ways.

A group of us at the Fort Worth Stockyards got to talking about it and the question came up, "How do livestock prices today, compare with those the week before the Pearl Harbor attack?"

We looked it up and got a surprise. We think the comparison of pre-World War II prices with those paid at Fort Worth Monday will be interesting to you, too!

One thing sure is that you'll agree that "a lot of water has run under the bridge" since Dec. 7, 1941!

At Forth Worth Monday fat steers and yearlings and slaughter cows were about steady in a slow trade. Some toppy fat calves were strong to 50c higher. Bulls and stocker and feeder cattle and calves were fully steady.

Comparing prices with Dec. 7, 1941: Good and choice fed steers and yearlings today sold for \$16 to \$22.50-the same grades 12 years ago sold for \$9 to \$11.75 at Fort Worth!

Common and medium slaughter steers and heifers at \$10 to \$15 Monday, sold from \$6.50 to \$9.

Fat cows at Fort Worth Monday brought \$9.50 to \$12.50. And 12 years ago they drew \$6.25 to \$7.75. Canner and cutters sold then for \$3 to \$6.25, and this week sold from \$6 to \$10.

Bulls at \$5.75 to \$7.60 then, sold at \$7 to \$12.50 this week.

On Monday good and choice slaughter calves sold at \$14 to \$20, a load at the latter figure from Graham. Twelve years ago on the first Pearl Harbor day their value was \$9.50 to \$11.75. Cull and medium slaughter calves this week drew \$8 to \$13.50, and then they sold from \$6 to \$9.50. Good and choice stocker and feeder steers and yearlings a dozen years ago sold at \$8.50 to \$10 --75, and toppy steer calves reached \$12. On Monday at Fort Worth similar steers and yearlings drew \$14 to \$18, and calves reached \$19. Stocker cows the first week of December 1941 sold from \$5.25 to \$7.50, this week from \$8 to \$13.




Heifers and stocker heifer calves presently sell around \$2 under steers, and at that time averaged \$1 or \$1.25 less.


Slaughter yearlings sold here Monday at \$10 to \$14, compared with yearlings at \$8 to \$9.50 12 years ago.
