We have been asked many times this week what we think of the Korea incident. What we think does'nt make any difference, the Russians don't and won't act according to any established line of thinking in international affairs. They make their own rules and do as they please. The only way we can deal with them is to make our rules and see that they stand up. We don't believe that there is anyone that can tell what the reaction in the Kremlin will be to the support the United States is giving South Korea. General opinion is that we will have to fight Russia, if not now, within two to five years. We are a peace loving and easy going people and time would probably be to the Russians advantage as the idea of having to surpress their ideology by force might deminish in the peaceloving countries of the world. If the issue comes to armed conflict or an all out war, which is highly probable, the Russians can't win. Their cause is unholy and its only aim is greed while the United Nations, led by America, will for the third time in a generation be fighting a war for the freedom of men everywhere, a just cause. The thought of war is horrible, the results of war in misery and chaos is appalling, but the idea of submitting to world rule by the Communist Butchers of the Kremlin is far more repulsive. The Russians best weapons are ideas they have stolen from other countries. In this time of rapid development in science a stolen idea might be obsolete by the time it is put into production. Let's hope there will not be a war, but if it has to be that the quickest methods of bringing it to an end will be used by our leaders. If it takes atomic or H bombs then deliver them as quickly and rapidly as possible. Boys who have been through a five or ten year war, if not physically injured in any way, are great losers because of the time they have lost in constructive living.

Less than 45,000 bushels of wheat was brought to elevators in Dimmitt. Although this does not indicate the total amount produced in Castro County, it does show that a poor hahvest was made in comparison with past years.

Some of Castro County's wheat went to Hereford, Summerfield. and Tulia. But local elevators received most of the wheat produced in the county and they still have an uncomfortable amount of storage space left.

Guesses on the average yield of wheat land in the county ranged from 7 to 15 bushels per acre. Last year the county had about a 25 bushel per acre average. However the wheat cut was of a good grade, with low moisture content and fairly heavy.





Union leaders' answer to Board is..

In face of Board findings to the contrary, union leaders insist on 48 hours pay for 40 hours work. This would be an average increase of 31 cents an hour, or \$2.48 a day. So Union leaders have called a completely unjustified strike on 5 Western railroads, effective June 25.

On June 15, an Emergency Board appointed by President Truman under the terms of the Railway Labor Act recommended the railroads grant switchmen a 40-hour week and a wage increase of 18 cents an hour, or \$1.44 for an 8-hour day.

Despite the added financial burden inwolved, the railroads are ready to accept these recommendations, as they have always accepted Emergency Board recommendations on national issues.

But the leaders of the Switchmen's Union refuse to accept! They demand an average increase of 31 cents an hour or \$2.48 A DAY—although their present earnings are substantially higher than those of workers in other industries!

Board Says Demands Unjustified

In its report, the Board declared this demand unjustified by all the evidence presented. It also pointed out that it would give the switchmen an unfair pay advanstage over other groups of railroad employes, and would add too great a burden to railroad costs.

Here is another case of a railroad union flouting the findings of an Emergency Board—another case of calling a crippling

strike in an outrageous and reckless attempt to force demands which the Board clearly labels as unjustified!

Leaders of the Switchmen's Union are calling this strike in defiance of the Board -in defiance of the facts-and at the expense of the public!

In its report on this case, the Board made this statement:

"The railroad industry, the Board believes, needs above all else a period of relative stability to adjust and adapt itself to present competitive post-war conditions."

Despite this warning, the leaders of the Switchmen's Union are upsetting the apple-cart-forcing a completely unjustified strike against everybody who uses the railroads.

Dysentery on Increase In Texas Says Health Officer

AUSTIN, June 29, Commenting on the unusually high incidence of dysentery in Texas at the present time, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer described dysentery as being an infectious disease characterized by diarrhea, pain in the abdomen, and toxemia. It is caused by a specific bacteria or germ. These germs cause inflammation of the lining of the intestinal tract which produces pain throughout the abdomen and the discharge of many loose stools that frequently contain blood and mucous. Toxemia results from absorption of the poisonous substances produced by



DEMAND STRONGER FOR LIGHTER WEIGHT HOGS

COLLEGE STATION, June 29 -Swine producers may hold the answer to better prices. The lighter weight hogs, those weighing from 200 to 230 pounds, stand the best chance of topping the market, says E. M. Regenbrecht, extension swine husbandman of Texas A&M College.

He says that hogs weighing more than 230 pounds are not in strong demand because of their lardiness, and too, after they pass this weight they become less efficient utilizers of the feed they consume.

He recommends watching the hog gains very closely and topping out the animals as they reach the 200 and 230 pound weight range.

Regenbrecht says that Texas s still a heavy pork importing state and he believes that Texas producers can profitably increase their output of hogs.

He says that hog producers should strive to continually improve the quality of the hogs they produce for market and that good pastures and more efficient feeding and management practices should be followed to cut down the production costs.




