Soaking Rains Fall Over Entire Section

Bronte, along with the rest of West Texas, has received wonderful rains the past few days. Unofficially, most of the rain gauges around here read a total of about four inches.

Rain started falling Sunday night and continued intermittently until Monday morning. About three inches was recorded here Monday morning. Another inch fell in showers Tuesday afternoon and night, bringing the amount to four inches.

OAK CREEK LAKE UP

Bronte residents were doubly happy about the rain because it put five feet of water in Oak Creek Lake, the city's water supply source.

Otis Smith, city water superintendent, said that the lake is about three feet higher now than it has ever been. He estimated that the lake now has a two year supply in it for both Bronte and Sweetwater. Water now stands 21 feet deep over Bronte's intake pipe, Smith added.

Farmers and ranchers had no way of estimating the value of the rain to them. It came too late to be of much help to small grains, but an abundance of weeds is expected in a few days. The parched pastures of Coke County didn't soak up the water as they should have, but ranchers expect them to take on a different look within a few days.

SOME RAIN DAMAGE

Quite a lot of damage was caused by the rain north of here in Scurry County when a dam on Bull Creek was washed out. Dozens of oil wells were flooded and many storage tanks floated away.

A rig drilling a test ten miles north of Bronte, near the Oak Creek Lake, was endangered by high water, but with the help of a large number of workers, serious damage was averted. The rig belongs to the Frank Frawley Drilling Co. and the test is being drilled for Sunray Oil Co. Joe Rose, local oil field construction contractor directed the operations of saving the rig from the flood waters.

Meanwhile, citizens of Robert Lee have been worried over the safety of their Mountain Creek reservoir, since flood waters this week have again caused heavy damage to the spillway.

UCRA Chairman L. T. Youngblood has called a special meeting in Robert Lee Saturday for the purpose of inspecting the damage and planning some method of preventing further damage to the dam. Heavy rains last August washed out part of the spillway and damaged the concrete baffles. More than \$4,000 was spent in repairing the damage.

Weather forecasters say that the possibilities for thunder showers will remain good for the next few days. Wednesday afternoon, however, the sun was shining and it looked as though farmers would be cranking up their tractors within a few days.

AD-LIB-BEN

Death is never a pleasant thought. But some deaths are more peaceful than others. And, as death must come to everyone, the ambition of the medical world is to make it is painless and delayed as possible. There should be no reason for persons dying before the age of 100 or for any horrible deaths other than by accidents. Medical science has almost progressed to this stage.

Cancer Crusade Now Underway In Coke County

For the first time Coke County this year is taking part in the American Cancer Society's Crusade. Officials of the county chapter met in Bronte Monday night and outlined plans.

Purpose of the Crusade is to bring information on cancer to everyone and also raise funds to carry on the Society's wonderful work. The American Cancer Society strikes back at the disease in three main ways; through research in more than a score of fields, by public and professional education and by service to cancer patients.

Any final answer about the cause and complete means of control of cancer will come from scientific research, to which the American Cancer Society has devoted more than 29 million dollars since 1942. Some 1,800 scientists, including many in Texas, are at work on the problem and their work already has made cancer cures possible that were not possible ten years ago.

The Society's program is carried on entirely through voluntary contributions. Sixty per cent of the money contributed to the Cancer Crusade stays in Texas to carry on a year-around program of education and service. Coke County's quota is \$400.

A. J. Kirkpatrick of Robert Lee is county chairman for the Crusade in the county. Mrs. J. B. Mackey is vice chairman and in charge of the program on the east side. E. F. Glenn is county treasurer and Rev. M. R. Rogers is east side committeeman.

Committee Makes Interesting Report on Local School Finances

The discussion this week concerning the Programming of the Bronte Schools will concern the financial structure as determined by a study of the Finance Committee, C. E. Bruton, Chairman.

This committee held many meetings and did much valuable work covering various sources of revenue involved in the operation of a school system. For the year 1952-53, the last full school year, a total expenditure of \$135,207.32 was required to operate the school. These funds are provided thru taxation, per capita and State and County aid funds. The total tax rolls for the year 1952 was \$67,341.57. Of this amount, \$66,376.96 was collected. Per capita apportionment provided \$26,028.55 and State Aid on Instructional Services another \$19,402.00. Bus Transportation reimbursement was \$10,677.00. Vocational Aid \$914.13. Other miscellaneous cash items, such as delinquent tax collections, short

time loans, bond sales, insurance adjustments etc. brought the total cash receipts up to approximately \$142,892.03.

TAX VALUATIONS

From a study of the property valuations, it was developed that the average tax valuation on acreage in the district was \$5.72 per acre. On town residences \$1775.00. The tax rate for the Bronte Schools is \$1.00 per \$100.00 valuation, the only school district in this area that has less than a \$1.50 tax rate.

The financial condition of the school is excellent. At the time of this survey the bonded indebtedness of the entire district was \$20,500.00 and warrants outstanding totaled \$6,683.30. The school's financial statement show a total of \$21,231.62 cash in the bank.

Bonds are due annually. The 1922 issue expiring in 1962, the 1950 issue in 1965 and the Oak Creek issue in 1964.




New Tax Exemptions

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

Sam Connally Candidate For Congressman



SAM CONNALLY

Sam Connally of San Saba, officially announced this week that he will be a candidate for U. S. Representative from the 21st Congressional District of Texas, and spelled out some of the issues on which he will base his campaign.

Heading the list is his proposal to work for an increase in the income tax exemption, which he says is essential to bolster the drouth-stricken economy in this congressional district. Connally's stand on this issue is in direct opposition to action taken by the incumbent Congressman from this district, who voted against a similar proposal and was instrumental in having it defeated.

"I strongly favor raising the income tax exemption from \$600 to \$700 per year," Connally said. "Drouth-hit taxpayers must have some relief. The fellows who need it most and who would be

helped most are the little fellows, not the big corporations. My father always told me that the big fellow can take care of himself, and that we need able representation to take care of the little man."

Another proposal voiced by Connally is to work for a comprehensive water conservation program with less federal control and greater participation and control on the state and local levels. This he sees as one of the most vital problems facing Texas today.

Connally said his decision to be a candidate for Congress was prompted "by my desire to serve the people and because I feel that I can offer representation in Congress that will more truly reflect the thinking and wishes of the people in this district."

"As long as I am your Congressman I will stay on the job," he declared, "and will not let Washington social or political life become so engrossing as to lose sight of the fact that I am a representative of all the people of my district."

Now serving his third consecutive term as district attorney of the seven-county 33rd Judicial District is a 38-year-old Air Force veteran of World War II. He is married and has a 6-year-old daughter, Terry, named after former U. S. Senator Tom T. Connally, a distant relative.

A native of Rosebud, Connally grew up in Brownwood and received his public school education there. He received his B. A. degree from Daniel Baker College, Brownwood, later attending George Washington University and National University in Washington, D. C., where he received the LL.B. degree. Connally was admitted to the bar in 1940 and practiced in the Brownwood law firm of Wilkin-

son, Johnson & Griffin before entering military service in World War II.

Volunteering into the Air Force as a private in 1942, he subsequently was assigned to Aviation Cadet Communications School at Yale University where he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Air Force in 1943. He served in New Guinea, the Philippines and finally in Japan. Upon being separated from the military service in 1946 as a captain, he returned to law practice in Brownwood. He was serving as president of the Brownwood Junior Chamber of Commerce when he moved to San Saba several months later. He was elected district attorney in 1948.

Connally is a member of the board of trustees of the First Methodist Church in San Saba, a member of the Chamber of Commerce and the Masonic Lodge, and is a member and past commander of the Wiley B. Murray Post of the American Legion.

\$6 Million Stock Issue Sold by Utilities Firm

Abilene—West Texas Utilities Co. has accepted the bid from Harriman, Ripley & Co. and associates of New York for the underwriting of its 60,000 share (\$6 million) issue of new preferred stock, \$100 par, Price Campbell, WTU president, said last Friday night.

Campbell said the Harriman, Ripley group, lowest of five bidders, named an offering price of \$105 a share for stock with a \$4.40 dividend, less an underwriting compensation of \$2.25 per share.

A total of 47,370 shares of the new senior equity issue will be offered on an exchange basis to holders of the utility's \$6 no par

preferred stock. The other 12,630 shares will be put on the public market by the underwriters, also at \$105 a share.

WTU will call for retirement on May 24 of any shares of the present \$6 unexchanged at the close of the offering period on April 19. The redemption price for this stock is \$110 a share and the holders making the exchange will receive a cash adjustment.

The underwriters agreement was signed by Campbell in Chicago Thursday.

Campbell reported that of the 47,370 shares offered on an exchange basis to holders of the utility's \$6 par preferred stock that 62 per cent of the stock was in Texas and that 65 per cent of the holders were also in Texas.

"We are going to try to keep this stock in Texas," he said.





QUICK ACTION DESIRABLE
A further study of the valuation of this district shows that the Oil Companies are paying \$8.00 in taxes to \$2.00 for the average property owner. This fact reveals the importance of quick action in accomplishing any further developments that are necessary.

This committee found that if it should become necessary to erect new buildings to take care of the present and future needs of the school that a bond issue of \$250,000.00 would require an amount of \$22,549.00 annually for a period of 15 years, based on a valuation of \$7,189,590 (the 1953 valuation) and a tax rate of 35 cents on 90 percent collections. A \$300,000.000 issue would require \$26,800.00 annually and a 42 cent tax rate on 90 percent collection, same valuation. Above figures would also take care of the present bonded indebtedness of the district. Tax collections have been running about 98 percent of the tax roll and delinquent payments are sufficient to bring the totals up to a total tax collection equal to 100 percent of the current tax roll.

BUILDING REPORT NEXT
The Committee reports for next week will complete the survey and the discussion for that time will be the finding of the buildings committee as to whether or not new buildings are recommended, type, cost etc.
