A VIEW OF THE SITUATION SINCE REPEAL

Within all probability Texas voters will have an opportunity during 1935 of voting on the question of whether or not state prohibition is to be retained. Since this is the case it is well for all intelligent people who desire to cast a ballot for the best interest of Texas, to have a view of the situation over the nation ince repeal. Following are some of the facts as taken from various records:

Arrests for drunkenness after repeal increased 113 per cent in twelve principal Southern cities (compiled from court records)

Convictions for drunken drivers have increased 60 per cent Governor Ely, Massachusetts).

months after repeal (New York Times, March 10, 1934).

Our highways are more dangerous and drinking is more freely indulged in than prohibition (Boston Herald, which favored repeal).

After repeal deaths from auto wrecks increased 77 percent. (United States Division of Vital Statistics).

If this keeps up we will have prohibition back in two years (Judge Scheffler, with 200 auto accident cases in Chicago Safety Court, July 17, 1934).

Traffic accidents caused by liquor in Detroit increased 164 per cent after repeal (official police traffic survey).

The year before beer was legalized in Chicago auto deaths decreased 162, but in the year following reeal increased 195 (official records, Chicago).

After trying legalized sale of liquor for four months twenty-one out of twenty-three suburban precincts of Chicago voted dry (official returns.)

Also, let us consider further that repeal has as signally fail-Il to reduce unemployment, taxation, public or private drinking, eliminate the bootlegger, save the young people or dispel political hypocrisy.

"CONSERVATIVES" EMIT A HOWL

Since time immemorial it has been the fashion for selfstyled "conservatives" in the matter of public morals to rail out at those who see clearly the picture of human wreckage wrought ly liquor, gambling and like evils, and call them "extremists," "witch burners," 'zealots,' and other terms uttered in derision.

Following Governor Allred's strong indictment of the evils of legaalized gambling in his message asking the repeal of the pari-mutuel race track gambling law, those fellows who stand always for money instead of citizenship, revenue instead of morals, rose up and began to say that he was an "extremist," that his message was an "over-emphasis" of the evils involved, and some damned his administration henceforth because of his stand on this momentous moral issue.

Good citizens applaud Governor Allred in his demands for divorcing Texas from such wide-spread evil which threatens to engulf our wealth and our character, and will back him unstintedly in his standards of righteous, unsullied government.—The Clarendon News.

GOOD ADVICE TO ALL CHILDREN

Up in Oregon the sheriff of one of the major counties has had issued cards for distribution among children. They carry point in any state and it may be recommended that attention of children hereabouts be called to the following copy:

- 1. Don't ever ride with strangers.
- 2. Always walk on the left hand side of the road, and get clear off the road when you meet an automobile. Give them plenty of room.
- 3. Don't ever cross a road or highway until you are sure there are no cars coming from either direction.
- 4. Don't attempt to cross an intersection until you are certain that there is plenty of time.
 - 5. If you see an accident go for help quickly.
- 6. Keep clear of the wreck. Let grown people give aid to the injured.

While the sheriff is doing this good work in the interest of the smaller citizens, the Oregonian of Portland suggests that he might get out another card directed to adults and that it read:

- 1. Don't ever pick up strangers.
- 2. Always drive on the right hand side of the road, and when you meet a pedestrian give him plenty of room.
 - 3. Maintain a look-out for persons crossing the road.
- 4. Have your car under control when entering an intersection and recognize the right of pedestrians to cross ahead of you.
 - 5. If you see an accident, offer help.
- 6. If you cannot be helpful, leave the wreck. Don't block the






