Wind Erosion In **Coke County Will Get Gov't Help**

Tuesday, May 11, the Board of Supervisors of the Coke Soil Conservation District, the ASC County Committee, and the Department of Agriculture employees met and discussed the new Emergency Wind Erosion Control Program setup by the President and federal cost-sharing offered to the landowners and operators through the present ASC farmer committee sys-

tem. Coke County was included in the group of counties and was allotted \$19,900.00 to assist landowners and operators to apply sound conservation practices to eight inches, Gene Gibson, soil protect the soil from wind erosion.

The program approved for Coke County include the following practices with the amount f federal cost sharing:

A. Field strip cropping, \$1.25 per acre B. Seeding high residue pro-

ducing crop after July 10, 1954, \$1.25 per acre, drilled, \$1.00 per acre, rows.

C. Pitting or chiseling grazing land, 0.75 per acre.

D. Deferred grazing, 0.25 to 0.50 per acre, depending on length of deferment period.

Application of these practices will be handled the same as other ACP practices, except this money is in addition to regular ACP allotments. Landowners and operators will make application for federal-cost to the ASC county committee.

For further information on any phase of the ACP program, contact the ASC or Soil Conservation Service office.

News Items From Coke County SCS

Robert Walker, a Coke Soil Conservation District supervisor, discovered the value of a good grass cover on the land during the recent rains.

During the last rain, Walker was in a field which he had seeded to grass in 1953. Where the surface soil was protected by a good grass cover, no soil splash or runoff occurred. Soil splash

and runoff were tremendous on chased 2000 pounds of guar seed the unprotected surface soil, Walker said.

Seeding of the grass was a part of Walker's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan.

Pitting of rangeland with an eccentric disc is paying off on the Metapeake Ranch owned and operated by B. St. George Tucker.

Penetration checks following the six inches of rain received in April showed the value of pittedpitted over unpitted rangeland. The water penetrated the soil more than 30 inches on pitted land. On unpitted land, water penetrated the soil only six to conservationist said.

One inch of water will wet about six inches of the soil pitted; therefore, the pitted land soaked up about five inches of water, while the unpitted land soaked up only about one inch. The runoff on pitted land was about one inch as compared to about five inches on unpitted land.

For the small cost of pitting, can ranchers afford to allow 85% of their rainfall to go down the river, Gibson queried. Thirty landowners in the Coke
