Location for a 6,500-foot rotary Cambrian wildcat has been staked three miles southeast of Blackwell.

It is C. L. McMahon, et al, No. 1 A. S. Hendry. Site is 794 feet from the northwest and 1,244 feet from the northeast lines of J. Holleman Survey 305.

BRONTE FIELD

Humble No. 6 Olive Mae Keeney in the Bronte field was coring this week, beginning at 4,572 feet. Plans were to core about 50 feet. Formation being cored is Capps, in which there are no producers in the Bronte Field. A core sample brought in Tuesday had

TEST IN CITY IS DELAYED

It was reported here this week that a protest has been filed with the Railroad Commission in regard to issuing a permit to Barney Carter of Tyler to drill a test well in the City of Bronte.

Mr. Carter had announced plans to re-enter the hole located behind the Bronte Tractor Co., on the property of L. T. Youngblood. Plans are to test the well and possibly drill it to a greater depth.

A hearing on the matter has been set for the near future. At that time the Railroad Commission will decide whether or not to issue the permit.

Thos. D. Humphrey & Sons, Ltd. of Dallas have filed application to drill a 5,400-foot rotary wildcat four miles west of Norton. It will be the No. 1 J. E. Gentry.

Operations on the project will begin at once.

Location, on a 634-acre lease, is 2,333 feet from the south and 2,350 feet from the west lines of 804-J. C. Taylor survey, Abst. 933.

The prospector is 5/8-mile east and slightly south of Humble 1 Gentry, wildcat failure abandoned March 4, 1951, at 5,456 feet.

It is also one mile west and slightly south of Currey, Shield & Currey 1 Mackey, recently-completed Cross Cut sand discovery finalized for a daily potential of 111.36 barrels of oil from between 4,239-44 feet.

CAMBRIAN OUTPOST

Humble Oil & Refining Co. has filed application to drill a 7/8-mile south outpost to production in the two-well Bronte (Cambrian) field, two miles south of Bronte. It will be the No. 7-B James L. Brunson.

The project will be drilled to 5,500 feet with rotary, with operations beginning when location is approved.

Location on a 119.69-acre lease, is 6,090 feet from the northeast and 1,792 feet from the southeast lines of 331-N. Eastland survey.

The Bronte (Cambrian) field produces from pay between 5,313-346 feet.

NORTHEAST WILDCATS

Applications have been filed to drill two rotary wildcats in north eastern Coke County.

Union Oil Co. of California, Midland, will drill its No. 1 Lou Whiteside et al, a 6,750-foot test, 8 1/2 miles west and slightly south of Blackwell.

Operation on the prospector will begin June 28.

Location, on a 1,780-acre lease, is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 293-1A-H&TC.

The project is 3/4 mile east of Dudley T. Daughtery 1 Whiteside, wildcat failure abandoned Feb. 8 at 7,120 feet on elevation of 2,526 feet. The project recovered 400 feet of oil and 800 feet of gas, mud, oil and salt water emulsion on a drillstem test between 6,600-630 feet in the Marble Falls, top unreported.

Mrs. J. R. Daughtery & Dudley T. Daughtery of Beeville will drill their No. 1-A. R. Whiteside a 6,500 foot test, eight miles west-southwest of Blackwell.

Operation on the test will begin July 1. Elevation is 2,394 feet.

Location on a 40-acre lease, is 467 feet from the north and west lines of 290-1A-H&TC.

It is two miles east of the No. 1 Whiteside and 2 1/4 miles east northeast of Laan-Tex 1 Reid, wildcat failure abandoned Feb. 10, 1953 at 6,812 feet on elevation of 2,138 feet. The Ellenburger was topped at 6,710 feet.

The project was re-entered and drilled to 4,235 by Laan-Tex as the No. 1-O Reid, but was abandoned Feb. 14 after finding sulphur water in the Swastika.

Katz 2 Rawlings was drilling late this week at 5,850 feet in lime and shale.

Wrather 1 McCutchen was drilling Sunday in sandy lime at 5,045 feet.

Fair and Warmer Describes Weather The Past Week

DEMOCRATS MAKE PLANS FOR PRIMARY

Coke County's Democratic Executive Committee met here Monday afternoon to arrange certain details concerning the Primary Election set for July 24. R. B. Allen of Silver, County Democratic Chairman, presided over the meeting.

Texas election laws provide that members of the County Committee shall meet a month prior to the primary to apportion among the candidates the cost of holding the elections, to determine the order in which candidates names shall appear on the ballot and select officers to be in charge of the elections in various precincts.

The committee assessed all district and county candidates 4 1/4 per cent of one year's salary, and precinct candidates (commissioners, justices of the peace and constables) 3 per cent of a year's salary.

All candidates have been notified of the amount which has been assessed, and it is necessary that assessment be paid on or before Saturday, June 26.

The Democratic primary election sub-committee will meet Monday, June 28, to prepare the ballot, Chairman Allen states.

Trustees Make Plans For Bond Election

Members of the Bronte School Board of Trustees voted in a meeting Tuesday night to accept the bid of Columbian Securities Corp. of Texas, San Antonio, on the sale of bonds for a new elementary school building. Should voters in this school district vote bonds for constructing the new building, this firm has offered to buy them and charge slightly less than 2 1/4 percent interest. This figure is exceptionally low, Supt. J. L. Carroll said, and the school is fortunate in securing such a low bid.

Trustees also voted to authorize a bond election to issue bonds in the amount of \$250,000, providing citizens of the district present a petition, with sufficient names, asking for the election. This is the amount recommended by the citizens committees which studied the school situation here.

Wilson and Patterson, architects of Fort Worth, have drawn a plan for the proposed school building. It consists of 12 classrooms, an auditorium which will seat 600 persons, a cafeteria to

seat 120 persons, adjoined by a modern kitchen, a sick room, teachers' work room, principal's office, clerk's office, superintendents' and board members' office, supply room, book room and modern rest rooms. Four of the classrooms for primary grades would have separate rest rooms, a boys' rest room and girls' rest room, serving two rooms each.

Supt. Carroll said architects have agreed to have a drawing of the proposed building ready in time to run in next week's Enterprise.

It is expected that the petition calling the bond election will be circulated in the next few days. Supt. Carroll said that board members are hopeful that a large number of qualified voters will sign the petition.

Trustees also voted Tuesday night to hire two custodians to care for the school plant. Pay for the jobs was set at \$40 per week. Carroll said that anyone interested in the jobs should make application to him or to a board member, preferably to him.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

A Board of equalization was also appointed, consisting of D. K. Glenn, Ben Brooks and Claud Gentry, with Austin Sandusky as alternate. This board will meet July 28 to consider any complaints which tax payers may have in regard to their school taxes.

A budget hearing for making plans for next school year will be held some time after July 4, Carroll said. Exact date will be announced later.

Next meeting of the school board will be Monday of next week. At that time it is expected that a representative of Harlow & Sons, San Angelo auditors, will be present. The firm recently completed an audit of the finances of the local school and will present their findings to the board.

Water Use Up To 323,000 Gallons

Bronte water users reached a new high in their consumption of water this week when 323,000 gallons were pumped into city mains on Monday. Water Supt. Otis Smith said that so far as he can determine this is the most water Bronte residents have ever used.

Pumping and filtering equipment has been working overtime in an effort to keep water in the standpipe, Smith said.

A story in The Enterprise about a year ago, right after water from Oak Creek reservoir was being used here, said that an all time high was reached here one day that week when 247,000 gallons of water were used. From those figures it can be seen that water consumption is about 75,000 gallons daily higher than last year.

Reports on four samples of water sent to the State Health Department have been returned. All the reports were good, showing the water to be free from harmful bacteria. Samples were taken at the residences of J. L. Carroll, Robert Forman, Pete Reyes and at the city hall.

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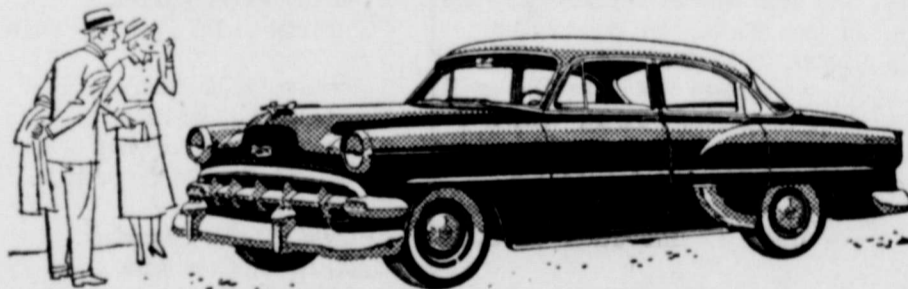

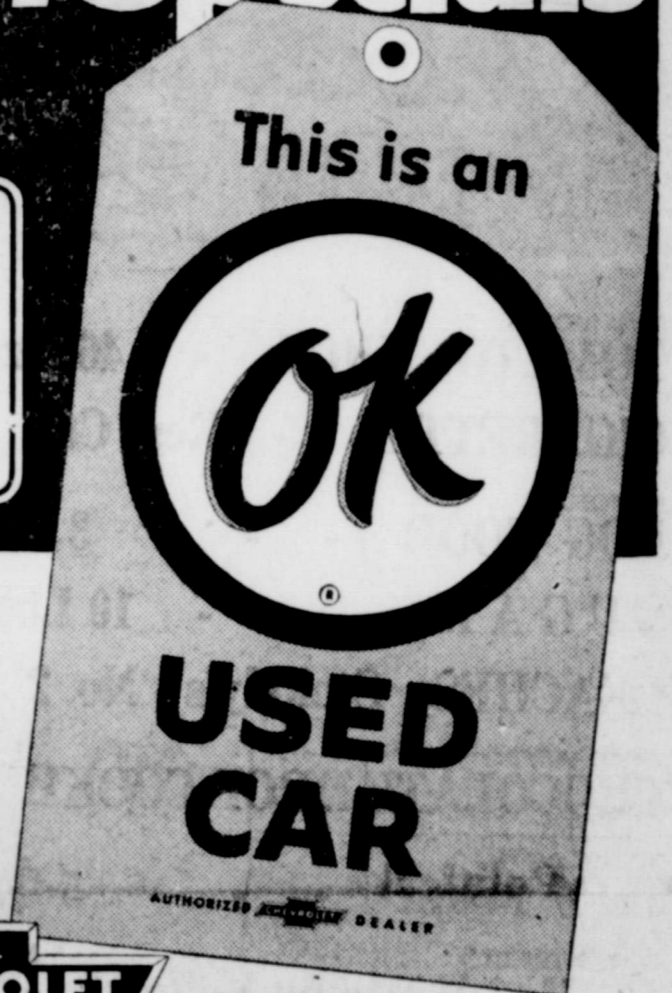

PARTY HAM LOAF FOR SPECIAL DINNERS



Add to the enjoyment of this spicy ham loaf by serving it with hot mustard sauce, freshly baked corn bread and goblets of thirst-quenching beer.

For special occasions, bake a ham loaf in the shape of an angel food cake and serve it with decorative, grilled pineapple slices circling the top and sprigs of fresh parsley tucked into the sides.

It's easy to duplicate the illustrated loaf. Just remember that lean ham is essential to avoid excess shrinkage. Cooked ham left from your own roast is ideal. Otherwise, buy precooked ham and grind it yourself to make sure that the fatty portion is omitted.

PARTY HAM LOAF

(Makes 8-10 servings)

1 quart soft bread crumbs
1 No. 2 can pineapple tidbits
2 eggs

2 pounds lean ground smoked ham
1 pound ground veal
1 medium onion, chopped
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
 $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon pepper

In a large mixing bowl, combine all ingredients and mix well. Pack into a greased 9-inch tube pan; press down. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 2 hours. Pour off drippings. Allow to stand in pan about 5 minutes, then turn into serving plate. For garnish, saute or broil canned pineapple slices until lightly browned. When ready to serve, place broiled pineapple on top of unmolded ham loaf and tuck sprigs of fresh parsley into sides of loaf.

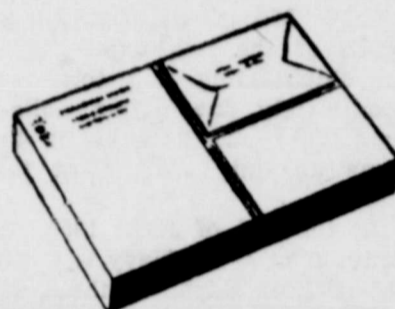

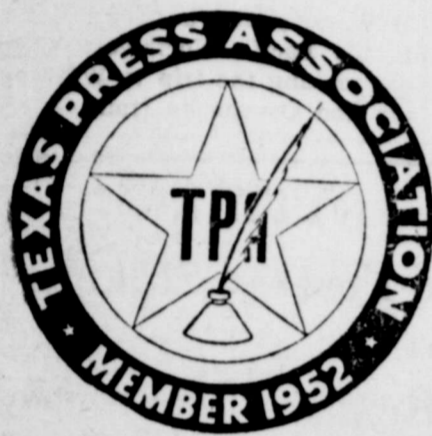

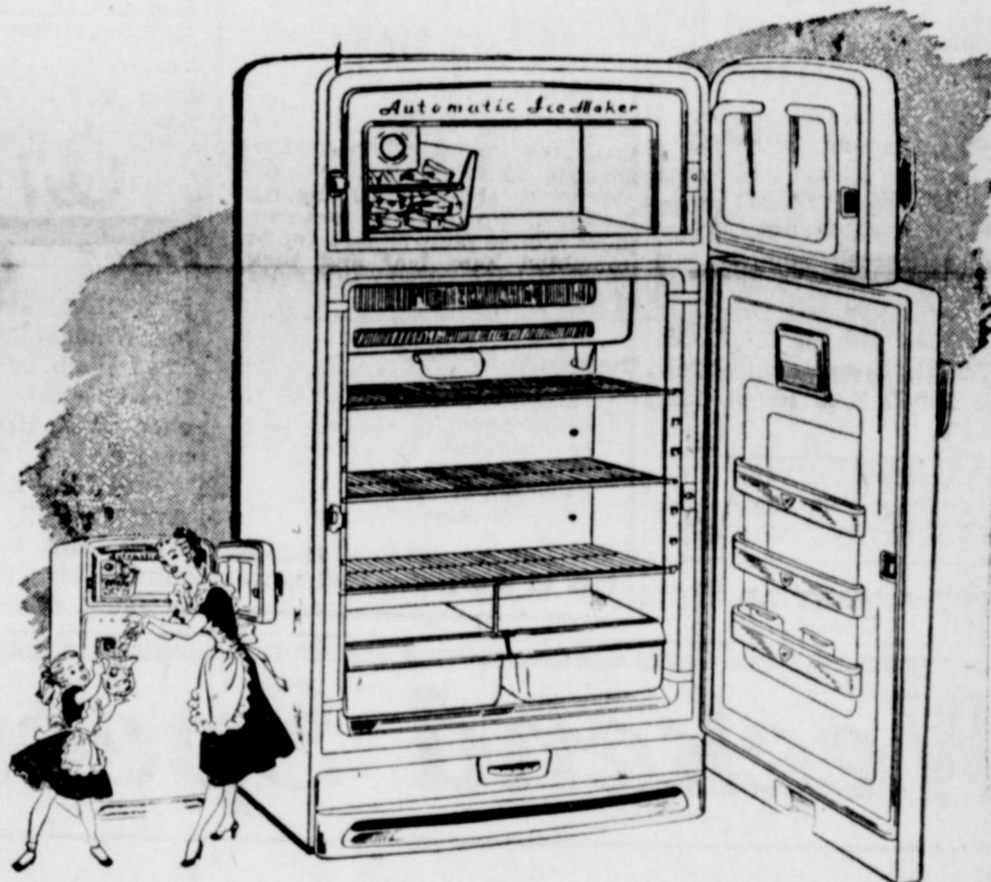
