And we've always been a little off on the subject of trading at home whenever possible. We ran across an article the other day which we believe sums it up very well. Read it thoroughly and think it over.

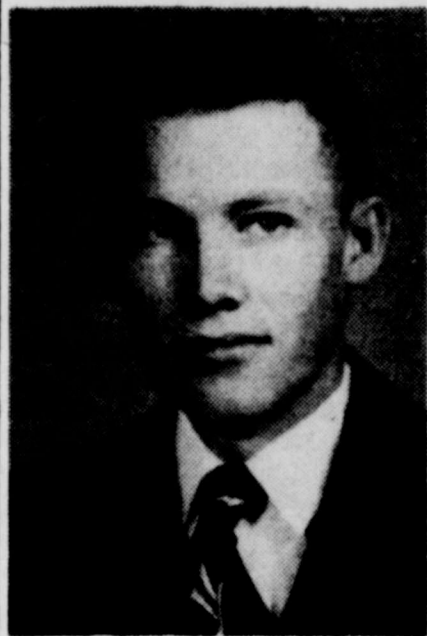
"If every new car, new suit of men's clothes, new hats, dresses, etc. for milady, shoes, radio sets, television sets, drugs, gasoline and tires, hardware, cooling plants, produce, feed, groceries, printing and other items used and needed in everyday living, in business were to be bought from local suppliers, you would notice some of these things begin to happen:

Your local printer would have to add a man or two to handle the printing; your clothing dealer would need an extra clerk, maybe more; your filling stations would put on more men; your radio and TV dealers would need more help, and could offer you better service; your hardware and other hard line dealers could and would expand their services; your auto dealers would sell more cars, more cars would require more servicing, and more mechanics and so on down the list.

"Most of these workers would come from the age bracket which is in the family-raising census category. The average family is 4.2 people, census people say. So multiply each job by 4.2 and you have a sizeable increase in our population.

"More population means more students in our schools and the opportunity to add more courses and instructors, thus making the schools better and more attractive.

Primary Election Tomorrow; Governor's Race in Spotlight

Coke Countians, along with the rest of Texas will go to the polls Saturday, July 24, and decide on their public officials for the next term. Politics has been pretty quiet in this county this year, with only some of the precinct races being contested.

However a good turnout at the polls is expected due to other hotly contested race. There are 1260 poll taxes paid in the county this year.

Locally, Justice of the Peace C. E. Bruton is opposed by Monroe McCutchen. In Precinct 4, Claude Dittmore has two opponents for

commissioner. They are E. C. Carper and Chester Derrick.

At Robert Lee, in Precinct 1, a close race is expected between Commissioner J. W. Service and Fern Havins.

GOVERNOR'S RACE HOT

Main race of interest is for the position of Governor of the state. Incumbent Allan Shivers and his chief opponent, Ralph Yarborough, have been combing the entire state, seeking votes in one of the bitterest campaigns of recent years. Observers believe it will be a close race.

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson,

senior U. S. Senator from Texas, has opposition in the person of Dudley T. Dougherty of Beeville. Opinion over the state seems to be that Johnson will have little trouble in winning this race.

Congressman O. C. Fisher is opposed by Sam Connally of San Saba. Connally has been visiting over the district during the past several weeks, meeting lots of people. Fisher has not been able to make an active campaign due to his duties in Washington.

A. J. Bishop of Winters, who is seeking his second term as representative from this district, is opposed by Robert H. Brewer of Eden.

In other state races, Lt. Governor Ben Ramsey is opposed by C. T. Johnson and George T. Wilson; Attorney John Ben Sheppard is opposed by Doug Crouch; For Place No. 1 on the Supreme Court are Few Brewster, Robert B. Keenan and Alfred M. Scott.

Sam Davis, W. C. Graves, Alan Haley and Lloyd W Davidson are seeking a spot on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Two other gubernatorial candidates, who have not campaigned so vigorously are J. J. Holmes and the perennial candidate, Cyclone Davis.

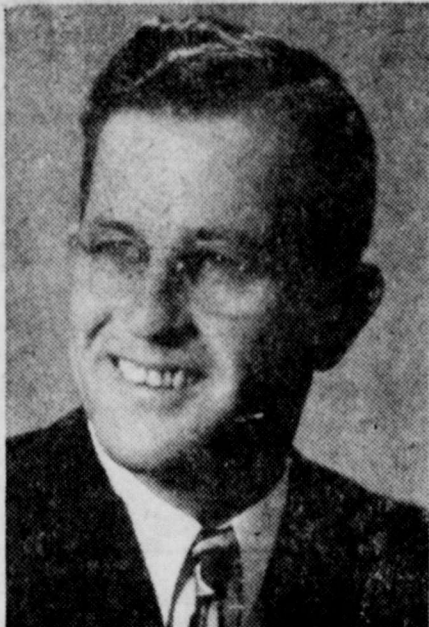

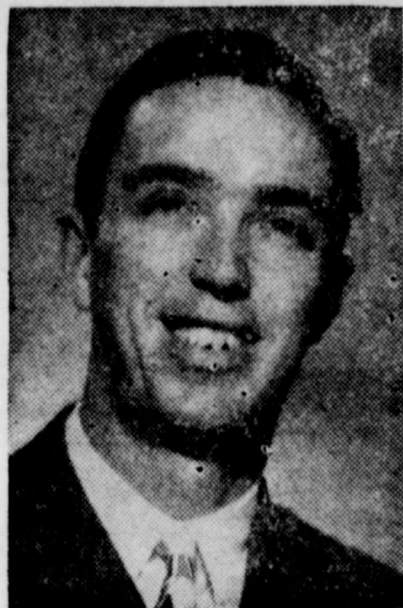

YOUR SENATOR REPORTS on Recent events are driving home — hard — the vital need for a United America.

The latest development is the rapid swing through Asia of Chinese communist leader Chou En Lai. In the course of the trip, he visited practically every important Asiatic official.

Our officials can only speculate as to the results of his discussions. But certainly, they are not a good omen for the free world!

It is obvious that the communists are seeking to bring all of Asia under their rule. The importance of that objective cannot be overestimated.

Exclusive of Siberia, nearly 1,300,000,000 people live on the continent of Asia. It is a treasure house of natural resources. It is fertile and productive — capable of enormous production in food and fiber.

Mobilized under world communism, Asia's people, resources and productivity would be formidable.

Against a threat of that magnitude, Americans cannot afford the luxury of partisan obstruction and endless dissension. A divided America will be a weakened America and in the modern world only the strong will survive.

There are two paths to unity. One is unity through fear; the other is unity through faith and confidence.

The communists have taken the road of fear. They have achieved unity through suppressing dissension. They have gained solidarity by brutally crushing any opposition.

Nowhere — at any time — have the communists ever won a free election, not even in Russia. In every instance, they have come to power when the people were confused and afraid to resist.

America must take the other path — the path of faith and confidence. We have usually found our unity by talking out our differences — by arriving at common understandings.

That kind of unity is still the most potent force in the world.

We may soon be faced with the necessity of reexamining our entire foreign policy. None of the alternatives are pleasant. But we will find our salvation if we

face the problems as Americans and not as partisans.

Reexaminations will serve no purpose if the sole objective is to prove that some policies of the past were right — or some policies were wrong. No truly American interest is guarded by that attitude.

But a searching reexamination with the objective of preserving America for ourselves and our children — will lead us out of the darkness. It will achieve our goals.

We have recently had a demonstration of the power wielded by a United America.

There was some discussion of admitting Red China to the United Nations.

Americans — with one voice and regardless of party — roared their indignation. They made it clear — crystal clear — that they would not tolerate the admission into the United Nations of a country whose leaders had been branded "aggressor" by the United Nations itself.

Those who were leading the movement to bring Red China into the United Nations have now backed away from the idea. Both the free world and the United Nations itself are stronger as a result!

The American people — through unity — achieved a goal worth striving for. That unity can be — and should be — extended to all the basic problems of saving our cherished freedoms.

There are some who substitute slander and vituperation for honest discussion of issues. There

are some who are always intolerant in their statements and in their judgements. There are some who abandon the paths of reason to go on wild emotional excursions. There has never been a time when we should pay less attention to such people and more time to logical thinking.

There will always be issues that divide us. But those issues do NOT include the safety and security of our country. Through mutual trust and confidence, Americans will unite and provide the leadership that will turn back the forces of communism.

If we are determined, this nation, under God, will survive.

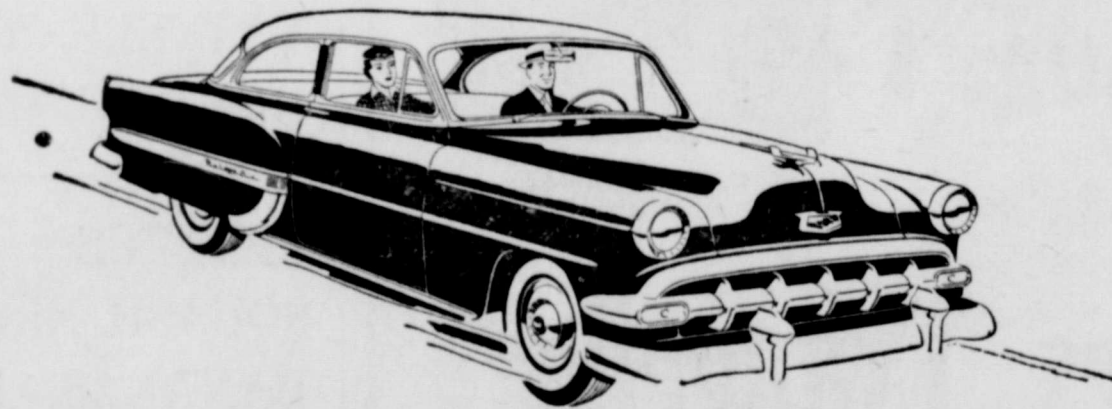

Opposition of Johnson Has Little Chance of Winning

Veteran Texas political observers grant little chance to opponents of Senator Lyndon B. Johnson in either the Democratic primaries or the general election in November.

His Democratic primary opponent is a 30-year old, one-term

state legislator (Dist. 58), Dudley T. Dougherty, scion of a multimillionaire (oil-ranching) family of Beeville.

Dougherty had an undistinguished term in Austin, but has attracted considerable attention with a "telethon" campaign and by spending more money in the first month of his campaign than all candidates for the top three offices in the Democratic primary combined. He listed \$13,417 in contributions and \$56,288.47 in expenditures in the initial monthly report.

His anti-U. N., isolationist, pro-McCarthy-flavored platform, that features drastic budget slashing in social welfare, foreign aid and military spending; high tariffs, and rigid immigration barriers, has attracted support from some out-of-state super nationalist propaganda groups that castigate both Democratic and Republican national leaderships. But that type vote has previously demonstrated as minute in Texas.

Republican primary bidders include Willard T. Holland, Houston contractor, and Carlos G. Watson, Brownsville attorney. Watson, undoubtedly the stronger, is a veteran G. O. P. organization man in Texas, former state party secretary and currently party state general counsel.

Off year Republican opposition for state office in Texas is still not considered a serious threat. Even the Eisenhower upset in 1952 failed to make any dent the Democratic monopoly in state and local offices.

Little active national party support can be expected for any Texas senatorial candidate except Johnson, who is a vigorous campaigner regardless of weight of opposition. And that is a wise caution in this politically volatile state.

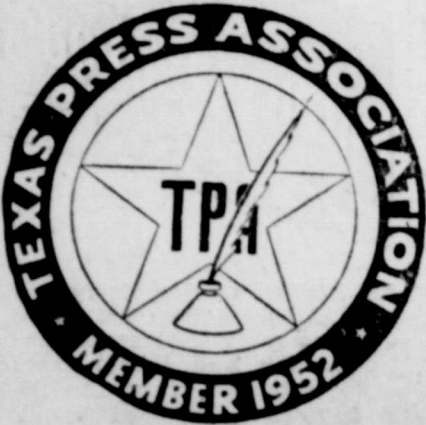

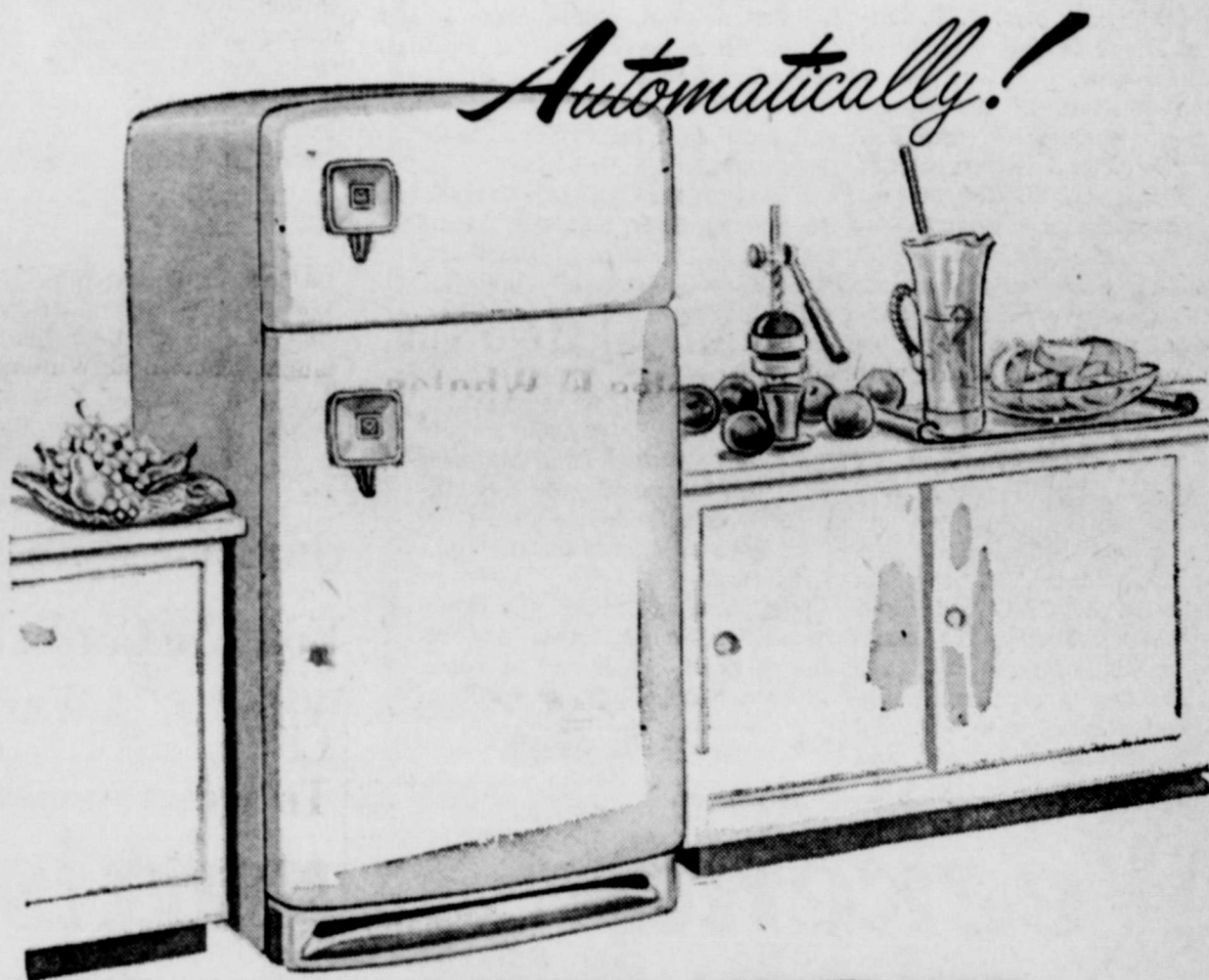

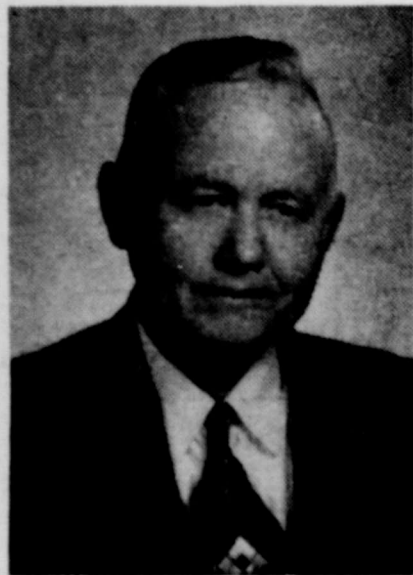
