Thirty two "good" prospects are coming out for football this season, Coach Garland Black said Wednesday. The group is pretty evenly divided, so far as classification is concerned, with eight freshmen, nine sophomores, eight juniors and seven seniors.

Coaches Black and Oscar Dorsey reported that they are well pleased with the attitude and hustle that the boys have demonstrated so far. Black said "The attitude and hustle of these boys reminds me of the 1950 Pleasanton Eagles team which I coached. Those boys played ten games that season without even being scored on."

The coaches added that the squad will be pretty light in comparison with some of the other teams in this district, but

ONE KILLED IN WRECK NEAR HERE

One man was killed and two others were injured in a wreck eight miles north of here about midnight Saturday. Jose Eljio Flores of Abilene was killed when the car went out of control and crashed into a tree.

The other two men, Joe Garcia, Del Rio, and Johnnie Paddia, Abilene, suffered head and internal injuries. Both men were brought to the Bronte Hospital for treatment and Garcia was taken on to San Angelo.

It was reported that the car went out of control on a curve on U. S. Highway 277 as the men were headed for Abilene. The auto went through a fence before hitting the tree. Flores was said to have been thrown from the automobile.

Funeral services were held Monday at St. Francis Catholic Church in Abilene. Burial was in an Abilene cemetery.

SCHOOL TO OPEN HERE ON MONDAY

Supt. O. K. Wolfenbarger said this week that no changes have been made in the schedule for starting school which was announced in last week's Enterprise.

High School students may register either Thursday or Friday, Sept. 2 or 3. Somebody will be on hand from 9 a. m. till 3 p. m. on those days to register pupils and arrange their schedules.

Grade school students will not register until Monday, Sept. 6, when school officially starts. In addition to registering the little folks on that day, a half time trial schedule will be run in high school. Buses will run on Monday, and school will be dismissed at noon.

First full day of school will be Tuesday, Sept. 7. The lunchroom will be open that day and classes will begin, the superintendent said.

Wolfenbarger also said that another teacher is still needed, preferably a person with a major in mathematics. Several courses have been added this year to the high school curriculum.

Big Crowd Expected At Voting Tomorrow

A large turnout is expected tomorrow, Aug. 28, when the second Democratic Primary Election will be held. Unusual interest has been shown in the election, despite the fact that there are only two races to be voted on. Main item of interest is the governor's race in which Governor Allan Shivers and Attorney Ralph Yarborough are the candidates. No local contest are included in this second election.

In the first primary, July 24,

CITY COUNCIL ADOPTS BUDGET

The City Council, in a special called hearing Monday afternoon adopted a budget for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1955. According to the estimated receipts and expenditures, there will be a balance in the city bank account of \$2,357.54 at the end of the year. Estimated income for the city this year is \$34,986.86. Of this amount \$19,000 will come into the waterworks fund, while \$9,800.00 is due from taxes. An estimated \$500.00 will come in from miscellaneous sources and \$5,686.86 was on hand at the beginning of the year.

Expenditures are largely for the waterworks department. An estimated \$23,794.32 will be required to operate the city water system. Other expenses amount to \$8,835.00, making a total expenditure of \$32,629.32.

Estimates shown in the budget are based on a \$1.00 per \$100 valuation. Approximate valuation for the entire city is \$1,061,494.90.

The council also met in special session Monday night to confer with Clyde Boose, Sweetwater attorney, who has been employed to collect delinquent taxes for the city. Mr. Boose explained to the council that more time will be required to work up the delinquent tax roll than he had originally thought, due to the fact that records are inadequate.

He said that he would continue with the job if the council would grant him more time and if the city secretary would assist him in hunting information out of tax records. Both requests were granted by the council.

Shivers bested Yarborough by something over 18,000 votes. C. C. Holmes and Cyclone Davis, the other two candidates, polled enough votes to throw the race into a runoff. Yarborough, however, carried Coke County, by some 33 votes.

Another race which is shown on the Coke County ballot is for Place No. 1 on the State Supreme Court. Few Brewster led the ticket for this position in the first primary, followed by Alfred M. Scott. The name of Lloyd W. Davidson also appears on the ballot. He is running for a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals, but has no opponent. His name appears on the ballot because he did not receive a majority in the first primary. However, the runner-up in the race declined to run in the second primary, giving Davidson a clear field.

The two gubernatorial candidates have waged a heated battle both before and since the first primary. Millions of dollars have been spent for advertising. For the first time this year, residents of this area have seen political advertising on television. In spite of the new medium, hundreds of thousands of dollars have been spent on the older methods of getting before the voters—newspapers and radio.

A record vote is expected tomorrow, and the dopesters seem to think it will be a close race all the way.

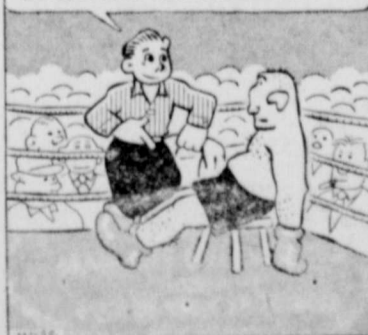

Ram Progeny Tests Begin at Sonora Experiment Station

SONORA—West Texas sheep breeders began their annual "Ram Performance and Progeny Test" Aug. 25 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station near Sonora, Supt. W. T. Hardy has announced.

"The test is a cooperative effort by breeders and the experiment station to improve potential rate of gain, length of staple and pounds of clean wool," said Dr. W. T. Magee who will supervise the research project.

"During the 224-day feeding period records will be made on grease and clean wool produced, length of staple grown, and weight gain of each ram," he added. "Rams are also scored for conformation, belly wool, skin folds and face covering."

Added to the tests will be an auction sale by breeders during the annual field day in May, sell rams tested and buyers may see both rams and performance test record.

Dr. Magee said the test is open to any sheep breeder who wants to test rams subject to registry in a recognized breed association. However, a breeder must enter a group of four rams by one sire, and breeders may enter groups from as many sires as desired. All rams remain property of the breeders.

The only cost to breeders is for feed the rams eat while on test. All production traits of rams have increased since tests were begun at the experiment station in 1948. Rambouillets, the only breed tested in large numbers, have increased in clean fleece production from 6.6 pounds in the 1948-49 test to 9.3 pounds in the 1953-54 test. Average staple length has increased from 3.36 to 3.80 inches, and average daily weight gain increased from .37 to .51 pounds a day.

At the same time production was increasing the amount of undesirable skin folds was decreasing, Dr. Magee concluded. The gains in fleece, weight and other characteristics are considered remarkable during the six year period.

TEXAS FARMERS-RANCHERS WARNED OF CIO LABOR PLANS

AUSTIN, Tex., Farmers and ranchers of Texas were warned this week that the CIO plans to organize the farm workers of Texas if its candidate wins the Governor's race.

This warning came from Governor Allan Shivers who charged that the backers of his opponents "want to turn the state government over to the same bunch that is trying to wreck Port Arthur."

"One of the first things they would do is put one of their red-hot organizers from Port Arthur in as labor commissioner. Then every time a farmer or rancher wanted to hire someone he would have to go through the CIO."

Governor Shivers said there was no doubt in his mind that the aim of the CIO after the job of organizing industry in Port Arthur and along the Gulf Coast is finished is to begin organizing farm labor in all parts of Texas.

"You can imagine what will happen

when the CIO starts dictating how many laborers are needed to plow ten acres of land, refusing to allow a man to work more than thirty-five hours a week during the harvesting season and telling how much a farmer can charge for his crop," he said.

The Shivers administration, the Governor said, has worked hard to help preserve and protect the rights of the working man.

"But as long as I am Governor, the professional labor bosses who have been sent to Texas from the East — specifically those in the CIO and its Political Action Committee — are not going to run our State Government," Shivers promised.

Shivers said the average working man in Texas appreciated good government and that they were not going to let CIO bosses and professional organizers from the East do their thinking — and voting — for them.

Franklin D. Roosevelt. The folks here at Bronte who are working on the drive have no more at stake in it than you do, so how about turning in your contribution to one of the workers or dropping it in one of the coin collectors which are scattered all over town? You'll be glad you did.

Aug. 28 — the second primary's Election Day — is the individual voter's day. And no one can tell him how to cast his ballot.

One single vote — yours or your neighbor's — can mean all the difference. That lone ballot may look pale against a million or so others. But you, or a handful like you, can swing an election either way.

It's happened before. Look at the record for that magic one vote:

A proposed amendment to the Texas Constitution providing state officials with a pay raise will be up before the state's citizens in November. It passed the Legislature by one vote.

Three presidents — Thomas Jefferson, Rutherford B. Hayes

and the second Adams — were elected by one vote.

When Hayes' election was contested, he won by one vote in special electoral commission balloting.

The man who cast the deciding vote for Hayes had been elected to Congress from Indiana by one vote — and that one cast by a man who demanded to be taken from his sick bed to the polls. (Sick Texans can vote absentee.)

A second proposed amendment to the Constitution which voters will pass on in November passed by one vote in the Senate, one in the House.

World War II's draft legislation — with the fate of civilization swinging in the balance — passed the national House by one vote.

Five states — including Texas — gained their statehood by one vote.

Your one vote is the single most powerful instrument for democracy in Texas tomorrow, August 28.
