Property owners are again warned that state, county, school and city taxes become delinquent after Jan. 31. All tax collections offices report a brisk run of business the past couple of weeks which is expected to continue through Monday.

It should also be remembered that Poll Taxes are due. If you want to vote in any elections the coming year you must pay your Poll Tax before February 1.

Records in the office of Tax Collector Paul Good showed that 595 Poll Tax Receipts had been issued up to Wednesday morning. Bob Edwards, chief clerk in the gas plant at Silver, also has a Poll Tax Receipt book and had issued 25 up until Tuesday. He expects to reach 100 before the final day next Tuesday.

Grand Champion lamb was shown by Benny Corley of Tennyson, with the reserve going to Dee Arrott.

Only four animals were entered in the fat calf division, but it was a contest indeed. First and fourth honors were taken by Leslie Nell Wink of Robert Lee. Jimmy Arnold of Silver won second and his older brother, Butch, took third.

## SCHOOL CENSUS

All parents are requested to notify the office of Supt. O. K. ### White Layer Cake

¾ cup of Crisco  
1 ¾ cup of sugar  
2½ cups flour  
2½ teaspoons baking powder  
1 cup sweet milk  
6 egg whites  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Method: Cream butter and sugar. Add dry ingredients alternately with the milk. Last fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites and vanilla.

### Pineapple Boiled Frosting

Combine in sauce pan 1½ cups of sugar and 1 small can of crushed pineapple. Cook over low flame until sugar is dissolved. Increase heat and cook without stirring until small amount in cold water will form a firm ball or to 240 degrees. Pour in fine stream over 2 egg whites that have been stiffly beaten. You may add Marachino cherries and coconut if you desire.

## Officials Explain Absences For 4-H Club Shows

Supt. O. K. Wolfenbarger handed two letters to The Enterprise this week which he wished partially published. He said there has been some misunderstanding about students participating in 4-H and FFA shows and he had written to the Texas Education Agency for a ruling.

In the first letter Mr. Wolfenbarger asked: "When a boy or girl in the 4-H club shows a project and has to be absent from school; are they to be counted present or absent?" Their answer was "only those students who are accompanied by the personnel of your school system attending shows and fairs and other educational affairs, will be counted present in regard to average daily attendance. Should a boy or girl in your school be exhibiting a project at a show or fair and is accompanied by one of your faculty members, then this individual would be counted present during the amount of time they are participating in the activity."

In a second letter Mr. Wolfenbarger asked: "It a student counted absent from school or taking a 4-H project to the fair, with the county agent?" Their answer was: "Students who attend the Fair in a 4-H club is not to be counted in eligible attendance. The 4-H club is an organization operated outside the school program and is not considered a part of school operations."

Wolfenbarger said of course students absent for such reason would be allowed to make up their work.

Said bids shall be accompanied by a certified check for not less than one-half of one per cent of the County's revenues of the preceding year as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, and that if his bid should be accepted he will enter into bond as herein provided, and upon failure of said banking corporation, association or individual banker that may be selected as such depository to give the bonds required by may be selected as such Depositor-check shall go to the County as liquidated damages and the County Judge shall re-advertise for bids, said Court reserving the right to reject any and all bids proposed.
