It should also be remembered that Poll Taxes are due. If you want to vote in any elections the coming year you must pay your Poll Tax before February 1.

SCHOOL CENSUS

All parents are requested to notify the office of Supt. O. K. Wolfenbarger, superintendent of the Bronte schools, if they have a preschool child who is not in school now, but will be eligible for the term starting next September. The annual school census is now being taken and Mr. Wolfenbarger said that is impossible for school officials to know where all the preschool children are and that is important that they be enumerated. Wolfenbarger pointed out Art. 294 of the Penal Code requiring every person having control of any child which will be over 6 and under 18 years of age next September to supply this information. He said he would appreciate all parents coming by his office if their children have not been enumerated.

In the first letter Mr. Wolfen barger asked: "When a boy or gir in the 4-H club shows a project and has to be absent from school; are they to be counted present or absent?" Their answer was "only those students who are accompanied by the personnel of your school system attending shows and fairs and other educational affairs, will be counted present in regard to average daily attendance. Should a boy or girl in your school be exhibiting a project at a show or fair and is accompanied by one of your faculty members, then this individual would be counted present during the amount of time they are participating in the activity.

In a second letter Mr. Wolfenbarger asked: "It a student counted absent from schoolf or taking a 4-H project to the fair, with the county agent?" Their answer was: "Students who attend the Fair in a 4-H club is not to be counted in eligible attendance. The 4-E club is an organization operated outside the school program and is not considered a part of school operatins."

Wolfenbarger said of course students absent for such reason would be allowed to make up their work.
