C & C Company Wins Paving Contract with \$66,000 Bid

C & C Asphalt Paving Co. of Colorado City was the successful bidder on the Bronte paving project with a bid of \$66,415.70. The bid was let to the firm last Friday at a special meeting of the Coke County Commissioners Court. It was some \$11,000 lower than the engineer's estimate of \$77,639.90. The bid covers paving of 111 blocks in the city.

C & C is expected to start moving equipment in and begin work on the project in the next few days. The contract calls for completion of the project in 90 working days.

In a meeting of the city council Monday night, use of the surplus funds left from the difference between the \$80,000 bond issue and the amount of the contract was discussed. No decision was reached as to how the money should be used, but additional paving was seriously considered. W. W. Greif, engineer for Coke County, estimated that an additional 15 blocks could be paved with extra money.

Up to Wednesday afternoon 33 persons had signed up to have curbs laid around their property. The deadline for signing up for curbing has been extended and persons wishing to have curb and gutter laid around their property should sign up just as soon as possible.

Amount of footage to be curbed is approximately 4,000 feet. An exact count of the amount signed up for was impossible, as some of the signers did not indicate how much they wanted. Cost of the curbing is expected to run about \$1.50 per foot.

E. J. SMITH IS HURT IN LAKE FRACAS

E. J. Smith, local employee of the West Texas Utilities Company, was painfully injured last Sunday afternoon while fishing at Oak Creek Lake north of here. Smith received injuries to an ear and to the back of the head after being hit with a boat oar. He was hospitalized until Thursday.

Bronte schools will be dismissed next Friday, March 11, in order that Bronte teachers may attend the area teachers meeting to be in Brownwood.

PTA "Back To School" Night

Since the regular meeting date of the Bronte PTA falls during public school week, the meeting next Tuesday night, March 8, will feature a short session of classes called "Back to School Night" for parents. All school patrons are urged to be present.

The "Back to School" program will begin at 7 p. m. and the first 30 minutes will be called the general assembly and the regular PTA meeting will be held and parents instructed in what they should do the remainder of the meeting. A report from the nominating committee will be made and special music given by the third grade.

Starting at 7:30 a short class schedule will be run and parents will visit the classes which their children attend each day. Classes will be 12 minutes in length with 3 minutes between classes. Teachers will be in their classrooms. The schedule is:

7 p. m. until 7:30, General Assembly.

7:30 — 7:45 1st period classes
7:45 — 8:00, 2nd period classes
8:00 — 8:15, 3rd period classes
8:15 — 8:30, 4th period classes
8:30 — 8:45, 5th period classes
8:45 — 9:30 — regular school activity period will be used as the social hour and refreshments will be served in the lunch room.

High School Principal Garland Black said there will be no regular class recitation but mainly a discussion by the teacher with an opportunity for parents to ask any questions that they like. Classes will be run for both high school and grade school parents.

Black said that each student will be given a schedule before the meeting to take home to their parents. Both parents of the students are cordially invited to attend the meeting but at least one parent from each family is urged to attend.

The program will be unusual and highly interesting and everyone is urged to be present in time for the General Assembly at 7 o'clock.

Bob Wilson is owner of a barber shop here in Bronte; McGuire is in the welding and pipeline construction business; Rose is an oil field work contractor and Springer is local manager for West Texas Utilities Co.

Holdover councilmen include Mayor Ernest Ivey, Joe George Wilkins, Charlie Boecking.

Everyone is reminded that tomorrow, Saturday, March 5, is the last date that candidates may file for the offices and get their names on the ballot.

Girls Are Bi-District Champs; Play at Brownwood Today

Bronte basketball girls came from behind Tuesday night in San Angelo to defeat Sterling City and win a place in the Regional play-off at Brownwood this weekend.

Grady Baker's squad will travel to Brownwood today, Friday, and will meet the Eula team at 3 p. m. Eula went to the State Meet last year, and Baker said they are favored to win the regional tourney this year.

In the thriller played with Sterling City Tuesday night, Bronte won 36-31. They led by one point 6-5 at the end of the first quarter and trailed 17-13 at halftime. Bronte was still behind at the end of the third quarter 25-21, but turned on the steam in the final period, scoring 15 points to 6 for Sterling City. Bronte took the lead about midway in the last quarter, and except for one tie, led the rest of the way.

In the first quarter Bronte scored 6 points, Sterling City 5; in the second quarter, Bronte scored 7 points to 12 for Sterling City; in the third period, both teams scored 8 points and in the last period the locals outscored their opponents 15-6.

Mary Ann Gray dropped in 31 points for the night's scoring honors. Wanda Bell Snead made 4 points and Jo Ann Rusk 1.

For Sterling City, high scorer was B. Dunn, 12 points, Jenny Davis followed with 10 and Patsy Martin made 9.

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

Italian Spaghetti With Meat Balls

Parsley (Prefer fresh)
1 egg
1 green pepper
1 large onion
2 cloves garlic
1 lb. ground beef
1/3 pound ground pork
2 cans tomato paste
1 can tomatoes
1/2 teaspoon oregano
Grated cheese (Parmesian)
Chop onion, green pepper and garlic and fry in 3 tablespoons of Olive oil until tender. and remove them from the pan.

Prepare meat balls by mixing ground beef and pork together with one slightly beaten egg and parsley to taste. Brown them in the olive oil.

Drain off the excess fat. Add the tenced onion, green pepper and garlic and combine with the tomato paste, tomatoes, oregano and grated cheese to taste. Simmer about 1 1/2 to 2 hours.

Serve over long spaghetti prepared according to directions on the package and sprinkle more cheese on top of each serving.

Why We Must Conserve Our Soil and Water

Our America is a continent rich in natural resources. It is often called "the land of plenty," because of the wealth of fertile land, the valuable forests, the many rivers and lakes, the variety of wildlife, and the rich deposit of minerals.

But the people of America now know that their land is not so rich

that these resources can be wasted as they have been in the past. They have learned the need for conservation — the wise and careful use of these resources.

Much of the rich soil in the United States is still being wasted by improper farming methods. The plowing up of too much grassland and the cutting down of too many trees has made it impossible for water to stay in the ground long enough to help grow good crops. Instead, the water rushes off the land into the rivers, causing terrible floods, and leaves the ground so dry that the rich topsoil is blown away by the wind.

In 1908, President Theodore Roosevelt said, "When the soil is gone, man must go; and the process does not take long." It takes from two hundred to eight hundred years to build an inch of topsoil. But this inch of fertile soil can be washed away or blown away in a few years, or even a few weeks,

in regions that are flooded or are visited by dust storms if it is unprotected.

Soil without a cover loses as much as sixty tons of earth per acre per year. Water flowing over the surface washes away the thin sheet of fertile topsoil. The wind also carries topsoil. Gullies appear and serious erosion begins.

Why do not people take a more active part in the conservation of soil and water? Our most important resource is soil. Without it, plants could not grow; plant-eating animals could not live; therefore meat eating animals would perish.

Soil, like water and air, is indispensable to all life on land. Because of this fact, I can not comprehend why people are careless and thoughtless about the conservation of soil and water. To most people, soil and water are precious times, so; to better our country, do your best to conserve our soil and water.


