So far as we can determine this is the first time in the history of science that such a great number of people have had a part in developing something that will relieve much human suffering and anxiety. Certainly, we here in Coke County, have done our part and deserve to be congratulated for our generosity to the March of Dimes each year.

All this just shows what can be done when the people and somebody with the "know-how" get together. Now what we would like to see is that same kind of backing be given the American Cancer Society as has been afforded the March of Dimes in the past few years.

We can see the necessity for developing a cure for cancer just as surely as we could for polio. Numerous families right here in the Bronte community have been visited by this killer and authorities tell us that one person in every four will have cancer.

Council Turns Down Phone Company's Proposal of Rate Increase and Dial in 1957

Bronte's city council had another session with representatives of the General Telephone Company Monday night. At that meeting the company offered to install a dial telephone system in Bronte in the first quarter of 1957, or possibly sooner, if the council would grant the rate increase which they asked.

Again the council turned their proposal down. And again the council made a counter proposal which those present from the phone company said they felt sure would be rejected.

Representing General were John E. Robbins and Paul LeBlanc of San Angelo and Ted Maxwell of Sonora. They told council members that they could not schedule dial equipment for Bronte until the exchange is making them a fair return on their investment.

The council proposed that the company charge the following rates, providing Bronte would be scheduled for dial service in the first quarter of 1957:

One party business, \$7.00
Two party business, \$5.00

Polio Shots to Be Given Here Soon

Dr. John R. Harris announced Wednesday that he will give polio vaccine to all children in the first and second grades if their parents request it.

This announcement came as a result of the news made public

this week that the Salk vaccine has proved tremendously successful. The news was released Tuesday that the vaccine was successful approximately 90 percent of the time. The announcement also stated that ill effects from the vaccine were practically negligible, with only minor reactions in a very few cases.

Dr. Harris said that request blanks will be distributed in the near future and that parents who wish that their children be given the shots should sign them. Exact date for giving the shots has not been decided, as the vaccine has not yet been received.

Any Questions?

The local physician also said that he would like to answer questions which local residents may have in regard to the new serum. Anyone who has a question in regard to any phase of this program, may turn his question in to the Bronte Hospital or to The Bronte Enterprise or questions may be telephoned in to Mrs. Marvin Landers or Mrs. E. G. Collins at the Harris Clinic. It is planned to publish the questions and answers in next week's papers.

Development of the Salk vaccine has come about after years of research and study by some of the nation's foremost scientists. Most of the funds for the study which led to the serum development have been contributed by the people of the United States through the March of Dimes.

GIRL SCOUT TROOPS BEING ORGANIZED

Miss Margaret McAdams, Girl Scout District Supervisor of Abilene, was here Wednesday, April 6 to meet with a group of leaders for Girl Scout troops in Bronte. According to a report by Mrs. H. A. Springer, Miss McAdams was well pleased with the progress so far. She described the organization of a scout troop, composed of the girls, their leader and the troop committee, composed of both men and women.

Next Tuesday, April 19, Miss McAdams will return to Bronte to begin a leadership training course. The course will continue for three meetings of about three hours each. The course will be conducted in the study hall at the local high school.

All those who will be willing to serve as a leader, an assistant, are on a troop committee are asked to be present at this meeting.

Deposits Down Slightly From Last Report

Deposits in the First National Bank in Bronte were down slightly from Dec. 31, 1954, in a report dated April 11, 1955. Money deposited in the local bank totaled \$3,289,873.19 on April 11 as compared with \$3,398,672.91 last December.

Loans were up some \$50,000. The loans and discounts column in the April 11 statement totaled \$598,663.30 and last December read \$546,423.00.

Capital structure of the banking firm increased \$180,000 last December to \$189,274.00 now. The gain was in the undivided profits account. Capital stock remains at \$50,000 and surplus account still is \$100,000.

English Minister To Lead Revival

Dr. W. Myrddin Lewis of Birmingham, England, will lead the Spring Revival at First Baptist Church, Bronte, April 25- May 6. Dr. Lewis has been pastor for some 16 years of the Ward End Baptist Church in Birmingham, England. He is a regular conference speaker at Winona Lake Bible Conference, which is the world's largest Bible Conference.

He has held meetings in some of the outstanding churches both in Europe and the United States, having held three successive meetings in the People's Church in Toronto.

He will come to Bronte from a Revival Crusade with the First Baptist Church of Galveston, Texas, where Rev. John W. Salzman is pastor. From Bronte, Dr. Lewis will go to the First Baptist Church of Fort Smith, Arkansas. "But just because he is a humble servant of God's Holy Word, do we consider ourselves fortunate to have him as our Revival preacher," stated Maynard R. Rogers, pastor of the church.

LEGAL NOTICE

"An ordinance regulating the speed of vehicles upon the public streets of the City of Bronte and repealing all other ordinances and sections of ordinances in conflict herewith." It is ordained by the City Council of the City of Bronte as follows:

State speed laws applicable. — The State traffic laws regulating the speed of vehicles shall be applicable upon all streets within this city, except as this ordinance, as authorized by State law, hereby declares and determines upon the basis of engineering and traffic investigation that certain speed regulations shall be applicable upon specified streets or in certain areas, in which event it shall be prima facie unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle at a speed in excess of any speed so declared in this ordinance when signs are in place giving notice thereof.

Increasing speed limit in certain zones. — It is hereby determined upon the basis of engineering and traffic investigation that the speed permitted by State law upon Hwy. 277 is less than is necessary for safe operation of vehicles thereon by reason of the designation. It is hereby declared that the prima facie speed limits upon Hwy. No. 277 within the limits of the City of Bronte shall be shown on the attached plan which is hereby approved and made a part of the ordinance and which shall apply at all times when signs are erected giving notice thereof.



Think you've got troubles? Pick up the following letter from an Oregon cattle magazine, which we understand, got it by way of a Texas newspaper. Might be that this is just the chuckle teaser that you need, because it shows how everybody's ear can get chewed on now and again.

"Dear Sir After reading this letter, you can see what my banker thinks about my cattle business.

"Livestock are animals that are bred and raised in the western states to keep the producer broke and the buyer crazy.

GIVE TO THE AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY

According to A. J. Kirkpatrick, American Cancer Society campaign chairman, an important development has just been announced concerning a change in ACS's statement "Cancer Strikes One in Five — Strike Back."

He said that the former statement was based on computations made by the ACS's statistical research section in 1949, which showed that if the then current cancer incidence rates and the over-all death rates continued, cancer would develop sometime in approximately 20 percent of all Americans alive.

Kirkpatrick stated, "Since the former computation, the age composition of Americans has changed. Over-all death rates in most age groups are lower than they were, but the reported rates for the development of cancer are now higher.

"Using the same methods as they did in 1949, but with the later date our statisticians conclude that cancer will, if these rates continue, develop in roughly 25 percent of Americans now living. Hence our statement becomes "Cancer Strikes One in Four — Strike Back."

"This change emphasizes the necessity of striking back against a threat to all of us. The new figures mean that more than 40,000,000 Americans now living will at some time develop cancer.

"Many of them will be saved from cancer. Others will die of other causes with cancer present. However, if the present death rates continue, 24,000,000 now alive will die of this disease.

"We have a challenge and a great opportunity that if we strike back, if we use all the medical knowledge at hand, about one-third of those now slated to die of cancer can be saved.

"Physicians can save them if their disease is diagnosed while still local, and treated promptly and properly. In other words, 8,000,000 of this 24,000,000 can be saved with what we now know.

"Our hope, naturally, is that research will enable physicians to save many millions more. Happily the increase in incidence, expressed in the change to 'Cancer Strikes One in Four,' is not reflected in a like increase in death rates.

"Actually the cancer death rate in women is dropping. This, we think, is due in large measure to public and professional education — a conference recently on Cancer of the Uterus points the way to a still greater drop.

"However, cancer mortality is still increasing. Most of the increase, he said, is due to cancer of the lung. If the climbing incidence and mortality of cancer in this site can be controlled, then we should be able to alter the mortality trend in cancer in men.

"Let us remember 'Cancer Strikes One in Four' and act on the challenge 'Strike Back' " Kirkpatrick concluded.







This is how it goes:

Filled Angel Cake

Make the filling in the following manner:

4 egg yolks, beaten well.
1 cup orange juice.
¼ cup sugar
Cook until it thickens. When slightly cooled dissolve 1 pkg. gelatin in ½-cup water. Add this to the above mixture and also add:
1 cup chopped maraschino cherries
1 cup pecans
1 cup cocoanut.

Then add 4 stiffly beaten egg whites.

Fill the hollow of the cake and on top with this filling and place the 1-inch layer back on the cake and ice with your favorite icing.

157 Grocers Sue Safeway, Asking \$166,000 Damages

ABILENE, April 4 — A \$166,000 damage suit was filed in federal district court here Monday against Safeway Stores, Inc.

It was filed by an attorney representing 157 independent grocers operating in Taylor, Jones, Haskell, Nolan, Scurry, Eastland, Fisher and other near-by counties.

In addition to damages, the grocers are seeking a permanent injunction against Safeway to prevent the defendant company from "further engaging in a price war and from cutting the price of merchandises below the wholesale cost and the cost of distribution."

Highest damages sought is \$10,000 asked by Raymond F. Day, Abilene, who claims his business was destroyed as a result of the alleged price cutting. Damages of \$1,000 each are sought by the other 156 grocers.
