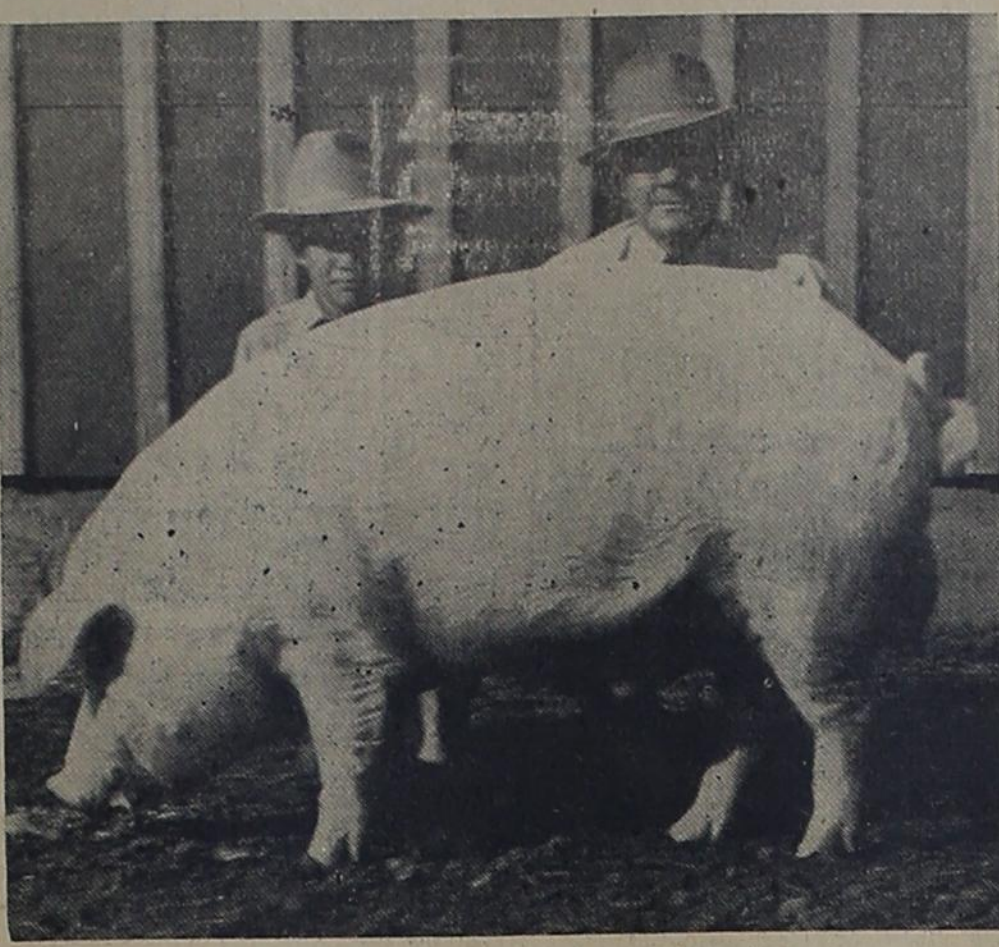
Martin Brockman received an honorable discharge from the Army at Houston, Texas Saturday. Martin has been at Bryan Field, Texas doing construction work.

METHODIST ANNUAL CONFERENCE AT ABILENE

The Northwest Annual Conference of the Methodist church will convene at Abilene, Nov. 7 - 11. This will be the 36th annual session. The Northwest Texas Conference is composed of 9 districts, Abilene, Amarillo, Clarendon, Lubbock, Perryton, Plainview, Stamford, Sweetwater and Vernon. A district Supt. presides over each district. The conference is composed of two hundred and twenty four charges. Many of these charges are circuits composed of a number of churches. Each pastor receives his appointment for one year, but there is no limit to the number of years a preacher may serve in one charge. The average length of pastorate in the Northwest Texas conference is two and one-third years, which is the longest average pastorate of any church in the Northwest Texas area.

The annual conference reported last year, 1944-44, 782 infants baptized, members received, 79996, Number Sunday School 326, Sunday School enrollment 46313, Avg. attendance in Sunday School 24026, Number of WSCS 271, with a membership of 7354. Value of church property, \$5,510,953.00.

According to the pastor, Ural S. Sherrill, who has served the local church since April 12, 1942, all item of report from this church next week will be in full.

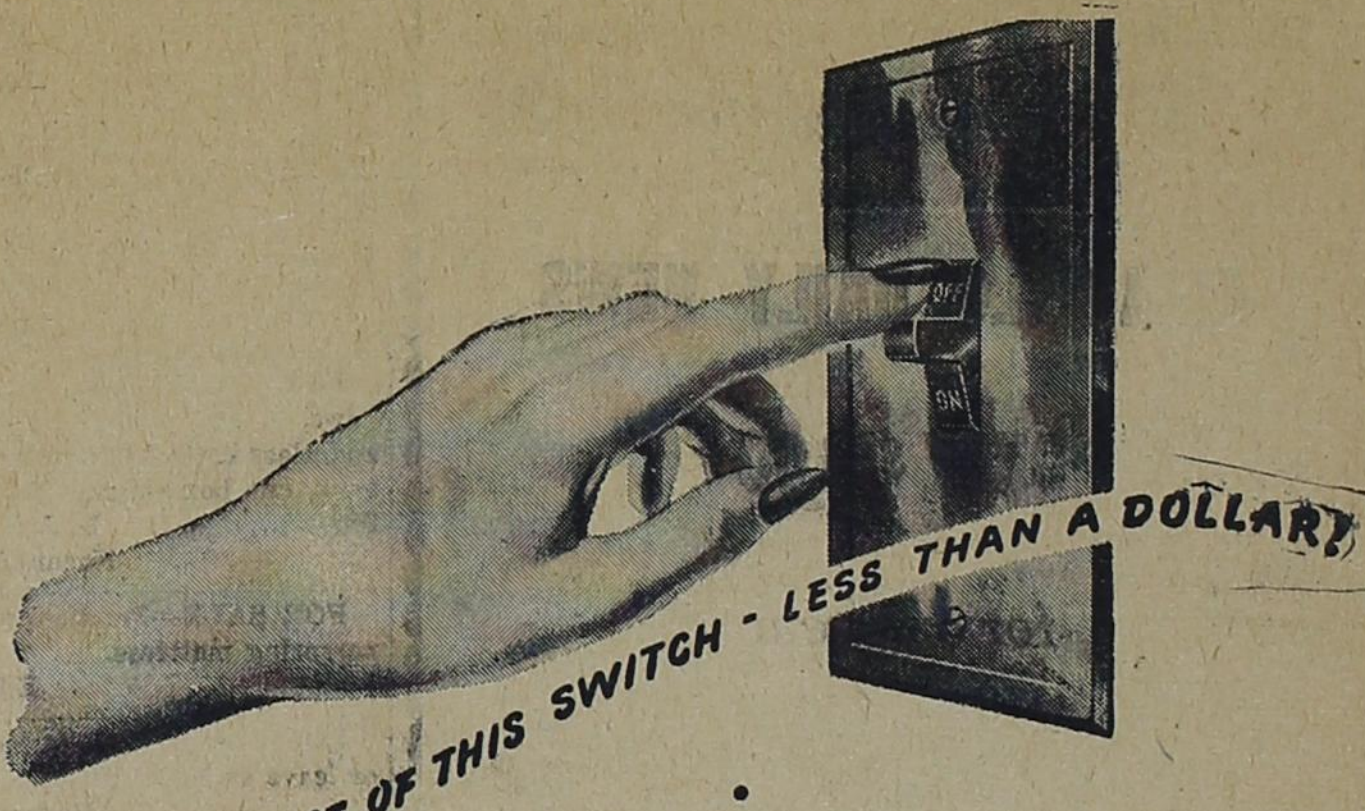

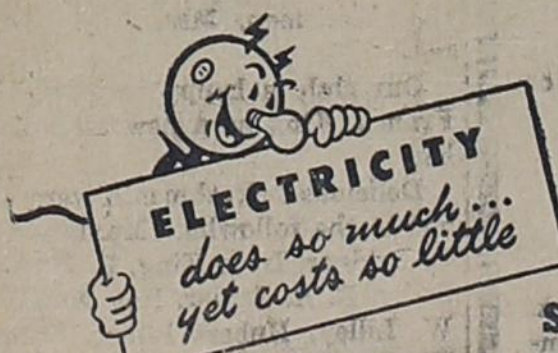
