- 21/2 size can of hominy
- 1 lb. ground meat 1 medium onion
- can spanish tomato sauce
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 tablespoon chilli powder ½ teaspoon garlic salt

Fry chopped onion and meat together in about 3 tablespoons fat until brown. Then add 1/2 cup water and remainder of seasoning. Simmer slowly until meat is tender. Drain all water off the hominy. Add to the above mixture.

Put this in a casserole and grate 1/2 lb. cheese on top and place in low oven and heat until cheese is thoroughly melted.
